Editor's Note:

Players from our area did exceptionally well at the 2005 Canadian National Team Championships in Montreal in June. Joan Eaton, Barbara Clinton, Diana Gordon, Beverley Kraft and Linda Lee were on the winning CWTC team with Francine Cimon of Montreal. David Lindop and Michael Cummings took the Senior Teams title with Billy and John Bowman from Ottawa. George Mittelman, Arno Hobart and John Carruthers, along with Allan Graves (Vancouver) and Joey Silver and Boris Baran from Montreal took the CNTC title.

The Open and Women's teams will play off with Mexico in July (as *The Kibitzer* goes to press) to decide the qualifier for the Bermuda Bowl and Venice Cup respectively, to be held later this year in Estoril, Portugal. The Seniors team has qualified for the Seniors Bowl in Estoril already since Mexico is ineligible.

Diana Gordon's feat is especially notable. She was winning her 18th Canadian Women's Championship / Trials, having lost precisely one knockout match since 1975. Additionally, Diana has won the Canadian Open Pairs and finished second in the CNTC.

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Master Point Press -New Kid on the Block

Perceptive readers will have noticed that over the past few years or so, Master Point Press, based in Toronto, has been putting out a steady stream of high-quality bridge books. If you've acquired any bridge books in the last few years, it is a near-certainty that some of them have been MPP titles.

The creator of MPP, Ray Lee, grew up in the UK and moved to Canada in 1969



to take up a lectureship in chemistry at the University of Toronto. In the 1970s he became involved in bridge journalism and was the bridge correspondent for

the *Toronto Star* for seven years and editor of *The Kibitzer* for three.

In the early 1990s, with the help of a small group of friends who acted as their editorial board, Ray and wife Linda launched a new national bridge magazine, *Canadian Master Point*. Contributors included locals Fred Gitelman, David Silver, Michael Schoenborn, and Eric Kokish, as well as internationals such as P.K. Paranjape, Marty Bergen and Allan Falk.

Meanwhile, Ray's real-life career had become book publishing, the bulk of it spent as CEO of Collier Macmillan. It was therefore but a short step to the idea of publishing in book form some of the material that had appeared in CMP magazine. Thus in 1994, Partnership Bidding by Toronto's Mary Paul (a book of questionnaires to

assist in the discussion of system agreements) made its appearance, and Master Point Press was born.

The big change took place at the end of 1996, when Ray decided to concentrate full time on bridge publishing, and make Master Point Press into a serious business. How serious has it become? Well, just nine years later, Master Point Press has more than 125 titles in print, and can list Eddie Kantar, Jeff Meckstroth, Alan Truscott, Larry Cohen, Julian Pottage, Jeff Rubens, Alan Sontag, Zia Mahmood, Michael Rosenberg, Marshall Miles, Tony Forrester, and David Bird among its authors.

Less than two years after that decision, the company scored a huge success with its new books for 1999, winning both American Bridge Teachers Association Book of the Year awards – Eddie Kantar's comprehensive two-book series *Modern Bridge Defense* and *Advanced Bridge Defense* took the advanced trophy, and 25 Bridge Conventions You Should Know by Britain's Marc Smith and first-time Canadian author Barbara Seagram won the student material accolade.

The company is proud to have won three subsequent ABTA Book of the Year awards, as well as the inaugural IBPA Book of the Year award in 2004 for Julian Pottage's *Play or Defend?* Its books have been translated into French, German, Japanese, Polish, Chinese, and Danish and are sold in more than 20 countries.

MPP also tries to publish high-quality books by newer writers, including many previously known mainly for their shorter articles in bridge magazines: Paul Thurston, Marc Smith, Nick Straguzzi, Barnet Shenkin and Mark Horton are examples.

"The Internet is a critical part of our business," says Ray. "Our web site is very important; we receive orders from customers all over the world by email, and most of our authors send us their manuscripts in the same way. We have held lengthy author-editor conferences online using chat software, and we routinely send out page proofs to authors and proofreaders as pdf files. We have seven or eight authors whom I have never met or spoken to except

via email before their book was published – yet the whole process works extremely smoothly."

What does the future hold for MPP? They've just published their first non-bridge title (*The Pocket Guide to Chess*, by Globe & Mail columnist Jonathan Berry); if the chess book goes well, they may follow it up with books on Go and other mind games.

As if he's not busy enough these days, Ray also teaches a course entitled, "The Business of Book Publishing" at Ryerson University in Toronto.

District 2 Election Rates to Be Hard-Fought

The upcoming election for ACBL District 2 Director (in August of this year) should be very close. Jonathan Steinberg has held the position since he defeated Doug Drew in the 1990s. Steinberg's opponent this time is Joan Eaton, recently retired from Ontario Power Generation Corporation and eager to make a contribution to the game she loves.

Eaton will have a tough time unseating Steinberg, who has a solid record as

a solid record as an administrator, and counts his good working relationship with ACBL CEO Jay Baum as one of the main reasons for his success. It is largely the rough Steinberg's ef-

forts that the ACBL treats Canada's Junior Teams equally to those from the USA, this time outfitting all three ACBL teams with jackets and paying their entry to the 2005 World Junior Bridge Team Championship in Sydney, Australia. Steinberg was also instrumental

in revamping the caddy pay scale and getting the ACBL to allow multi-site finals for our district events.

Joan Eaton is one of Canada's most successful woman players. She has won three Canadian Women's Team Championships and two North American Championships. After a long and

rewarding career in water resource management with Ontario Power Generation Corporation (formerly Ontario Hydro), Eaton feels

ready to use her administrative, management and negotiating skills serving on the ACBL Board. Her experience with conflict resolution on various Canadian and American water control boards equips her to deal with ACBL politics.

The electors for District Director are the Board members of those Units comprising ACBL District 2. Regardless of which candidate wins, the District will be well-represented.

A Feared Opponent Joey Silver, Montréal

No one can deny that discipline and technical mastery are essential components if you are aspiring to be a great player. These should be your constant goals. However, if you are to truly become a force to be reckoned with, you must inspire fear in your opponents. The truly great players know this. Don't you feel intimidated playing against Hamman et al? Yes, even you do. One way to become a feared opponent is to keep your opponents off balance. A well-timed and unpredictable manoeuvre that hits home is something your opponent will not soon forget.

An opportunity came up in the last quarter of a Vanderbilt quarterfinal. My team was 20 IMPs down to a team of Swedish internationalists who were playing in good form. Nothing much happened on the first two boards; time was running out and my opponents were playing with confidence.

Finally, Board 3 gave me an opportunity to change the tenor of the match.



The auction has told you that RHO is a passed hand with 5-5 in the black suits and LHO has a balanced 12-14 with three spades. You know they are bidding a tight game. You also know that trumps and clubs, a critical side suit, are both breaking badly. Armed with that

information, you double and lead a heart. The full deal is:



Partner plays two top hearts and declarer ruffs. Declarer plays the ace of clubs and a club to my ten and I force declarer with another heart. A club ruffed by the spade eight is over-ruffed by Partner's ten, and he exits with a diamond to declarer's ace. Now a spade finesse is taken to Partner's king. Partner returns a spade, declarer looking rattled when I show out. Partner can now ruff the fourth diamond and I make my last club in the end game for plus 300. This translated into 10 IMPs when our partners were plus 170.

Mathematically speaking, my double gained only 3 IMPs. But it reaped a more important dividend a few boards later, when our opponent, obviously shaken by the previous setback, took an extremely conservative view with his cards and missed a cold vulnerable game. The tide had turned. When it was all over, our team was playing in the semifinals the next day.

It is essential to develop a good ear and listen to your opponents – they will often tell you when they are stretching. You must pick your spots, of course, and use good judgment, but you will know that you are reading the table well when you start to do some selective doubling without the trump stack. That is one of the ways to become a feared opponent.

You Never Forget

My son Colin is a fine bridge player who competed for Canada in two Junior World Championships a few years ago, but these days, with a wife, a house, a new baby and a demanding job, he has little time for bridge. Lately, however, he has played a few hands online. He was complaining to me about being a bit rusty when we decided to play together the other night, but we had a wonderful session and he showed me that he still played a great game. At the end of this hand I could only say 'bravo'.

Colin held:

What would you bid? Colin decided eventually to bid four spades, trying for the cheapest game. The opening lead was the five of clubs and this is what he saw:



Colin could see that Mom had done it to him again with the four heart bid. I should have reopened with a double which would have given him the chance to bid three no trump. The first piece of bad news occurred at trick two when West ruffed the club return with the spade four. West returned the nine of hearts to Colin's queen. And now Colin got the really bad news when he played the spade five to dummy's ace. East followed with the two but West showed out!

Colin had lost two tricks already and it looked as though he couldn't avoid two trump losers. Do you see any way to save the day?

From the auction and play it appeared that East was 5=3=1=4. Colin counted his possible winners. He had already made two tricks. He could score two more clubs while East followed, plus a diamond, and another heart. That gave him six tricks. If he could make four trump tricks, perhaps he could make East's trump tricks disappear.

Colin played the eight of clubs to the queen and then cashed the heart ace, throwing a diamond from dummy. Now he ruffed a heart with the seven of spades, cashed the ace of diamonds and king of clubs while East followed. Colin had seven tricks in and needed three more in this four-card ending:



When Colin led the jack of clubs, East had no response. If he ruffed low Colin would ruff with the spade eight and score the spade king and queen separately, so East ruffed with the ten. Colin over-ruffed with the spade king and played a diamond. East had to ruff this and now was endplayed into leading a trump into dummy's queen-nine tenace.

Since he was a bit rusty Colin couldn't remember the name for this type of play, but he could still remember how to execute it!

Counting - Is It Worth It? David Lindop

(For newer players – abridged and reprinted from Better Bridge with permission of the editor, Audrey Grant.)

Nothing is more valuable for developing one's skill as a bridge player than counting. However, one must learn how to count. Practice counting in groups of four numbers that add up to thirteen. This is the way the suits are divided in every bridge hand. Equally important is that every suit is divided among the four hands around the table in a similar manner.

For example, the heart suit may be divided 5=4=3=1, with one player holding five hearts, another holding four, another three, and the fourth player having a singleton. Thinking of the cards in groups that add up to thirteen is very useful. If we know how many hearts are held in three hands at the table, we can quickly determine how many there are in the fourth. All hand patters add up to this magic number of thirteen.

We can extend this analysis to discover the exact distribution of the hidden hands around the table. If we know a hand contains two spades, five hearts and one diamond, we can figure out that it contains exactly five clubs. And once we know the distribution of one of the hidden hands we can figure out the distribution of the other.

Let's get started. You are South.

West leads the ace of hearts and wins the trick as everyone follows suit. West then plays the king of hearts upon which East discards the two of clubs. How are the hearts divided around the table? We started with two in dummy and three in our hand. East started with one. That leaves seven for West. The hearts are divided 7=2=1=3 around the table. We must not forget that East has also discarded one club—watch the defenders' discards carefully.

West has also been counting and knows we have a heart left. West leads another heart. Since we know East has no more, we try ruffing with dummy's jack. Not good enough. East over-ruffs with the spade king. That's our third loser and we cannot afford any more. We must locate the missing diamond queen.

East leads the three of clubs. We win the ace as West follows suit and we start drawing trumps. East follows to the first round but discards a low diamond on the second round. How are the spades divided? East followed only once as we were drawing trumps, but that doesn't mean he started with only one spade. Remember, East over-ruffed with the spade king on the third round of hearts. So, East started with two spades. Since

we started with four in dummy and four in our hand, that leaves West with three. The spades are 3=4=2=4 around the table. We have to draw one more round of trump to eliminate West's last spade. East discards another club.

Let's review what we know so far. West started with exactly seven hearts and three spades and at least one club. East started with one heart and two spades. East followed suit to one round of spades and discarded one diamond and two clubs.

We've only played seven tricks, but already we know eleven of West's thirteen cards. Does this tell us where the queen of diamonds is located? Not yet. West could still have it, although we might begin to suspect that East is more likely to hold that card.

Can we get a clearer picture? Yes. It can't hurt to take our remaining club winners. Both defenders follow suit when we cash the club king, but West discards a heart when we continue with the queen. Thus we now have a complete count on West's cards. Since West started with three spades, seven hearts and two clubs, there is only room in his hand for one diamond! West's hand pattern is precisely 3=7=1=2 and East's must be 2=1=5=5.

Now our picture of the unseen hands is complete. Here is the complete deal:

We can play dummy's diamond king to see exactly which diamond West holds. If it's not the queen we can lead a low diamond and finesse the ten, winning the trick. It's sure to win because West will have no diamonds left.

Let's play another deal. Try to build a mental picture of the hidden hands as the play progresses.

Against our four-heart contract, West leads the king of spades. East overtakes with the ace and returns the nine, West winning the queen. West exits with the nine of diamonds to our ace. We play a low heart to the king, starting to draw trumps. Everyone follows and the king wins. We next play the jack of hearts and West discards a spade as East wins with the ace. East plays back the diamond queen, we discard a club, West follows with the three and we win the king.

Have you been counting as play progresses? If so, our picture of West's hand is almost complete. We know he started with seven spades, one heart, at least two diamonds and at most one club.

Neither defender has shown out of spades, but both the auction and the play suggest that West started with seven and East with two. This is an *inferential count*. We infer from the opening three-spade bid that West has seven spades. East has relayed confirming evidence by

overtaking the king with the ace and returning the nine. There would be no need to do that if he held three. Indeed, it would be dangerous, for West would think he held only two.

That spades are 7=2=2=2 around the table is a reasonable assumption to make, but it's not 100%, as the count in hearts was in the previous deal. This time, in hearts, West showed out on the second round. We started with four in dummy and five in our hand, leaving three for East. Both defenders followed suit twice in diamonds.

We don't know who has the missing queen of clubs. What can we do? Look for more information. We draw East's last trump as West discards another spade. Then we trump dummy's last diamond in our hand. East follows suit, but West discards another spade. Does that tell us anything? Yes! By playing diamonds we've found out how to handle the clubs!

Since West started with exactly seven spades, one heart and two diamonds, he must have three clubs. That leaves only one club for East. Similarly to our first deal, we have located the missing queen simply by counting the unseen hands. We play the club king, and when East follows suit with the nine, confidently finesse dummy's jack. This is the actual layout::

Again, our effort is rewarded.
