

Viktoria Renaud Wins 2006 Kate Buckman Award

Eight years ago Viktoria Renaud was an enthusiastic bridge player when the club she played at was going to close. Where was she going to play? She went home and asked her husband what he thought of buying the club. Since Chuck NEVER says "NO" to Viktoria (good marital policy there, Chuck), the rest is history.

"How hard can it be?" Viktoria asked herself." "Thank God for 'unconscious incompetence," she eventually thought when she found out.

At the time of Viktoria's takeover, the club had four weekly games with two to eight tables per game. She figured that twenty tables weekly would cover expenses and that she could play for free. During the very first game she had, five cars were vandalized in the parking lot ... not an auspicious start.

Viktoria's first goal was to foster cooperation among the area clubs. For starters, she closed down the Wednesday evening game, which was competing with another club in Hamilton. Next, she took her Teacher Accreditation and the Club Director's courses.

Viktoria enjoyed teaching very much, but found that most students returned to the 'kitchen table' after taking classes. She needed to bring in new players to the club. Just at that time the ACBL introduced Easybridge! She was among the first to get accredited and thanks partly to this program, today Viktoria runs seven regular games and three workshops weekly with between six and fifteen tables each.

Viktoria's club also offers several special games: a regular monthly 'party night'; the club also participates in the world-wide games and world-wide charity games. She says that the club has a wonderful and loyal membership; the members 'own' the game, help out, contribute and enjoy the camaraderie. During the August blackout three years ago, one of their members walked up 18 flights of stairs in the dark to help a 90-year-old player fill her oxygen tank.

In 2005, the club was very proud to achieve three-star designation. Each year the club manages to turn a profit that it uses to subsidize the Silver Point games in the Niagara & District Bridge Association.

Five years ago Unit 166 helped to bring back the sectional tournament to Hamilton and Viktoria chaired that tournament. The tournament is noted for its Saturday hospitality, all of which is donated solely by the club members.

Three years ago, the club started an annual bridge trip to Mexico where they stay at a beautiful resort, have fun together during the day and play bridge in the evening.

Viktoria feels very fortunate to have a hobby she loves which has turned into a wonderful business that she enjoys every day. She is humbled by the Board's decision to give her the coveted Kate Buckman Award and would like to thank all those people who helped her on the way, especially her husband (players come to the club for his coffee), Gord Akitt, Vijay Jhamb, Carolle Lyons and Marti Ronemus.

Flo Belford Named 2006 Audrey Grant Award Winner

Florence Belford started playing bridge many years ago after she took some bridge lessons at Huron Park in Mississauga. Her introduction to duplicate bridge was in 1978 when she moved to Parry Sound and she was hooked immediately. When she moved back to Milton the next year, Flo was very keen to continue playing duplicate bridge and convinced her bridge friends to try it. They started playing at Bill Coats's club in Acton and continued there until it closed.

Flo began teaching school bridge about 12 years ago when she taught bridge as an extra-curricular activity at a school in Grimsby. The program was very successful, and the next year Flo taught bridge at schools in Grimsby, Burlington, and Georgetown.

When she began teaching elementary school full time, Flo ran a bridge program as an extracurricular activity in her school. The first year she decided to take some of her bridge students to compete in the 0–5 game at the Royal York Hotel at Easter, she took four students. The next year, she took twelve students to the tournament.

As a result of these forays, Patti Lee asked Flo to take over the role of Junior Player Coordinator for Unit 166. Flo then started to recruit bridge teachers and schools. Each year, the number of schools and students involved increased. Initially, the bridge lessons were offered only as an extracurricular activity. Two years ago, as a pilot project, she taught the bridge lessons weekly during classroom math periods at her school. The students and teachers really enjoyed it. Somewhat surprisingly, the classroom teachers found

the opportunity for social skills development as beneficial as the application of their math and logical thinking skills. This year, other schools also offered the bridge lessons during class time, while many others continued to provide the lessons as an extracurricular activity. There were 20 bridge teachers and 25 schools with students from grades four to high school participating in the program. total. there In approximately 900 students involved in school bridge this year. Six hundred of these students participated in the special student game at the Toronto Regional in April. This is a very exciting and noisy event as the students meet and chat with their opponents and enjoy the opportunity to apply their developing bridge and social skills.

The success of the school bridge program is due to the efforts of many people. Flo would like to recognize the dedication of the bridge teachers, the support of the school staff, the flexibility of the tournament directors, and the assistance by Unit 166 and District 2. Most importantly, we have to recognize and appreciate the students' enthusiasm.

New CBF Director

Jim Priebe has retired as Zone 3 CBF Director and has been replaced by Nader Hanna. Nader's contact information can be found in the Unit 166 Board of Director information section.

600 Students at Toronto Regional

The school bridge program in Unit 166 (Greater Toronto Area) was very successful this year, with approximately 900 students participating. The schools involved were in Brampton, Mississauga, Huttonville, Oakville, Burlington, Toronto, and Unionville, with students from grades 4 to high school. The bridge lessons were offered in various formats - to gifted classes as an enrichment activity, to regular classes in math periods, and as an extracurricular activity at lunchtime.

Our bridge program runs from November to April. We wind up the year with a special student game held at the Toronto Regional Tournament in April. This year, due to the large number of students, we had to schedule this game over two days, having half the schools attend each day. In total, we had 600 students play in this event; 72 tables on Wednesday and 74 tables on Thursday. It was an exciting event to watch and listen to. The young players were enthusiastic and chatty and thoroughly enjoyed the opportunity to play in a tournament and meet students from other schools.

Many thanks to the many volunteers who helped us with the scoring, and to the directors, who did a terrific job.

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TROUBLES WITH DOUBLES

by Barbara Seagram

(Another in our series for newer players.)

When your opponents have opened the bidding, in order for you to bid a suit, you must have a decent quality 5-card suit. If you have only 8-12 points (definitely not much of a hand) then you must have a sterling quality suit, one that you desperately want your partner to lead such as: A K 9 8 5 or K Q 9 8 7, i.e., 2 of the top 3 honours, OR a 5-card suit with 3 of the top 5 honours, e.g., Q | 10 8 6.

If you have 13 or more points, you do not have to have such a great quality suit, but you still must have five cards in it.

So what in the world do you do with the following hand?

Suppose the opponent on your right has opened the bidding with one club. If you bid one spade, you will be promising a good 5-card suit. What's more, partner will inevitably have a singleton spade and a bunch of hearts. Bidding hearts or diamonds is equally wrong. The solution is to make partner pick the suit, by making a takeout double. You say double and now partner is **forced** to bid.

Note that the fewer cards that you own in the opponents' suit, the more cards you will have in all the other suits. Partner is being *forced* to bid, so the more cards you have in the suits partner will choose from, the more useful your hand will be as a dummy.

RESPONSES TO THE TAKEOUT DOUBLE

When partner makes a takeout double, you must respond and may not pass.

However, if your RHO (right hand opponent) makes a bid, then the pressure is off and you no longer need to respond. If you do respond after an intervening bid, you are now promising 8+ points.

Since you are forced to respond to the takeout double, no points are required. The takeout doubler wants to know your best suit and your point count. On the following hands, your LHO has opened with one diamond and your partner has made a takeout double. RHO has passed.

This is a dreadful hand! But you will nevertheless bid one spade. When you as responder to a takeout double bid your best suit at the **cheapest** level, you will have 0-8 points.

Bid two spades ... this shows 9-11 points and at least four spades.

Bid four spades ... you must have a 5-card major to jump to game. You have 14 pts and partner has at least 13. Go for it!

Bid one no trump. This shows 8-10 HCP and a stopper in the opponents' suit. Note: When you find yourself about to respond to a takeout double in a minor suit, stop and consider whether you could bid no trump instead.

With 11-12 HCP and stoppers in the opponents' suit, bid two no trump. With 13+ HCP, bid three no trump.

REBIDS BY THE TAKEOUT DOUBLER

♠AK98 ♡A873 ◊6 **♣**]843

What do you bid with this hand on the following auction?

RHO	You	LHO	Partner
1 ♦	Double	Pass	♠
Pass	??		

It is your turn to bid again ... and you should pass!

I know you don't want to! But you have already promised partner that you have at least an opening bid (13+ pts). You have also promised that if you are the doubler with only 13-15 points, you will have at least adequate trump support for all the unbid suits. Do you have anything more than that? No - so you pass. Only with extra values (16+ points) can you take another bid.

...and another thing...

If your RHO opens the bidding with one diamond, what will you bid with this hand?

With this hand, you must **pass** and not say "double" since the odds are high that partner will bid hearts. You will now be forced to say pass (see above regarding rebids by doubler with 13-15 pts). Your hand will become the dummy and partner will not be happy with your trump support.

Remember that with only 13-15 points the doubler must always have adequate trump support for *all* of the unbid suits, not just *most* of them. You are forcing partner to bid with as little as:

★432 ♡ 5432 ♦ 432 **♣**432.

Can you ever pass the double?

4432 ♥ A 87 ♦ Q J 1098 **♣**84

LHO Partner RHO You I ♦ Double Pass ??

Yes, on this hand you can now pass as you plan on beating them in one diamond. This comes up once every 5 years (if you

play a lot of bridge) and in order to pass partner's takeout double, you must have at least three sure trump tricks and an outside trick such as an ace or a kingqueen combination.

If you only have their suit, but your hand is not suitable for passing the double, you have a problem:

♠ 865 ♥ 983 ♦ K 10876 **♣** 106

LHO Partner RHO You I ♦ Double Pass ??

If you pass, you will now be converting partner's takeout double to a penalty double; the opponents will probably make one diamond ... They will score lots of points for doubled overtricks and the insult of being doubled. Partner will not understand. Remember that once you have lost partner's trust, it takes years to regain that trust! Bid one heart and hope for the best! If Partner bids again, showing a big hand, then you can bid no trump.

Vulnerable in Hearts

A Memoir of Fathers, Sons and Contract
Bridge
By Sandy Balfour

This is not a bridge book, but a book in which bridge is a central and unifying theme. Throughout the book, while reflecting on family relationships, bridge is a constant presence. Spurred on by his father's death in 2003, Sandy Balfour has written an entertaining look at both his own life, growing up in South Africa in the 1970's, and his father's life, from his first 14 years in Scotland and then in South Africa.

Against the background of Vanderbilt's 'invention' of Contract Bridge in 1925, Culbertson's dominance of this new game, the British ACOL response to Culbertson, and the massive popularity of the game both before and after World War II, Balfour writes of his father's world - his childhood, playing bridge with his family, the advent of the war, and his evacuation to South Africa in 1940. He writes of the big bridge events of the time - the Bennett murder and acquittal, the Culbertson-Lenz and Culbertson-Buller matches - wondering what his father thought of it all at the time.

Balfour's childhood - in the 'golden age of apartheid' - is seen through a child's eyes.

He and his siblings are taught bridge by his father, and play with the family regularly, always in set partnerships and always with his father's maxims in mind ("one down is good bridge"). In turn, he teaches his son, and during a trip to Scotland to see the family's roots, they play in pubs in the evening with other patrons.

This is an enjoyable and well-written book, looking back at a time when bridge was an integral part of so many lives and influenced so many people. In fact, I'm going to give it to my own father - a history buff - because it so well describes the fascinating history of both the game and the times.

Card by Card

Adventures at the Card Table By Roy Hughes

Roy Hughes published his first bridge book, Building a Bidding System, in 2005. It was so good that it was nominated for, and narrowly missed winning, the International Bridge Press Association's Master Point Press Book of the Year Award. It was a 'system' book, but rather than touting a particular style or system, it explained the factors that need to be considered in order to construct one's own bidding system.

So, did Hughes suffer from the 'sophomore jinx' with his second effort? The answer is definitely not. Card by Card is a totally different book from the first, and is rather more classical in nature. Hughes looks at 68 deals, analyzing them with the 'over my shoulder' technique

popularized by Terence Reese. The deals come mostly from Hughes' own experience, with a smattering from other sources. Most have never before been seen in print, and all are fun.

One of the deals borrowed from another source is the following:

- ♠ A J 10 6
- ♡ A Q J 7 4
- ♦ 62
- ♣ K J
- **★** K 9 8 2
- ♡ K 5

- ♣ A 10 5 3

You reach seven spades, the lure of the four-four fit being too difficult to resist. West leads the four of spades. Plan the play.

In the 1977 Bermuda Bowl in Manila, declarer played the jack of spades from dummy and East followed suit with the three. Declarer followed up with the ace of spades and ... East showed out! The imaginative opening leader was Mike

Passell, whose team won the event. Hughes points out an improvement: following up with the ten of spades rather than the ace, intending to run it if East follows low. This would lose only to a lead from queen doubleton or third from West, an extraordinarily unlikely scenario. That would be too tough a game!

This is a very well-written book, and Hughes' informal style makes for easy reading. You could read this book either as a straight narrative or as a teaching tool. Either way, it is an entertaining follow-up. I look forward to Hughes' next effort, which will be a bridge biography of Murray and Kehela. It seems there's no danger of Hughes becoming caught in a rut.

By the way, Card by Card has been nominated, and is on the shortlist, for the 2006 Book of the Year Award.

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COUNTING TRICKS

(Part 2 - Suit Contracts) by David Lindop

Continuing our series for newer players. Reprinted from Audrey Grant's Better Bridge with permission of the publisher.

In the last issue, we looked at counting at no trump contracts. Our primary technique was to count winners. When we are in a suit contract, we often focus on losers rather than winners, but counting tricks can be just as useful.

West leads the diamond king against our four-heart contract. We win with the ace of diamonds (no duck here when the opponents can take three club tricks!) and can count nine sure tricks: two spades, six hearts and the diamond ace. After drawing trumps. where is our tenth trick coming from?

Dummy's spade jack is the only possibility. If West has the queen of spades, we can take a successful finesse. That's a better chance than hoping the queen falls under the ace and king. So, we cross our fingers, lead the three of spades, and finesse dummy's jack.

The result? If West has the queen of


spades, the finesse works and we make the contact with ten tricks. If East has the spade queen, the finesse loses and we go down three tricks. We don't get a single spade trick. The defenders win the queen of spades, then take two diamond tricks and three club tricks. Now that's excitement!

One more deal. This time we are in four spades after the following auction:

West leads the five of hearts. Should we try the heart finesse or not? Let's count our tricks. We have four spade tricks plus the two red aces. It looks like we have to find four more tricks.

Let's count those spade tricks again. If we use dummy's spades to trump our diamond losers and the spades in our hand to trump dummy's hearts, we'll get eight spade tricks! Together with the ace of hearts and the ace of diamonds, we have ten tricks with no finesses! We just have to take them. Here's the full deal:



Win the ace of hearts. Take the ace of diamonds. Lead the three of diamonds and trump with dummy's eight of spades. Trump the heart two with the spade seven. Repeat three times. That's the first ten tricks on a *crossruff*. All we had to do was count our winners when the dummy came down!

THE KOBAYASHI MARU by Cam French

This deal comes from an on-line game where the players all designated themselves as experts. The evidence may not support such a claim. You be the judge.

For starters, you are presented with a horrific scenario. The opponents are vulnerable, you are not, it is IMP scoring and, with you as East, the auction proceeds:

Partner has made a takeout double asking you to bid one of the majors. From your point of view, the opponents almost surely have game, and anything you bid will be doubled and harshly punished. So for now, you decide on pass. No one is saying this is right, but two clubs doubled is not game, and surely any bid you make will be doubled and go down more than the value of their game.

Sadly, the opponents know this too, and to your horror the auction continues:

Certainly this is a terrible choice. Now they are in game, and overtricks (which seem likely from your hand) are looming. Do you run or sit it out?

This is the bridge equivalent to Star Trek's training exercise, the Kobayashi Maru. There is no way to win. Every choice meets with disaster. The true intent of the Kobayashi Maru is to see how one copes with adversity, not to see if you can succeed, as there is no chance to do so. As Captain Kirk (the only cadet to defeat the scenario - by

hacking into the computer) said, "It is a test of character." So, recognizing this for what it is, you have a choice. You go for the number, or the opponents score a huge plus. If only you could get partner to go for the penalty instead of you - that would be fitting. What to do; bid and get killed or sit it out?

The sad part is, partner's bid was dreadful. Expert or not, you be the judge. The whole hand:

On the hand in question, East chose to pass and the contract was made with three overtricks (worth 400 apiece) so you can do the math. What's the moral of the story? Like Mulder, "Trust no one." And of course, how we cope with adversity is part of who we are.

My mom used to say, "If you never go for a number, you are not bidding enough." She was right. On this hand, West was bad. Okay, frightful (East was too! –Ed.). Get over it. Switch to a new game, make a mental note to only play against this person, and move on. Deal with it with dignity, not anger. Remember, on-line bridge is like computer dating. You may be paired, but you are unlikely to connect.
