

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Fred Andreychuk Wins 2007 Kate Buckman Award

Congratulations to Fred Andreychuk of The Bridge Centre of Niagara, the 2007 winner of the Kate Buckman award. This award is presented annually to the person in Unit 166, "who adds most to other's enjoyment of the game of bridge". The award is named in honour of the late Kate Buckman who started and ran the highly successful Kate Buckman Bridge Studio for many years.

Following is the letter that was sent by Niagara District players in support of Fred's nomination for this award.

"If cloning human beings were ever to become possible, we'd recommend any area that wants a dynamic invaluable contributor to their bridge community apply for a Fred Andreychuk of their very own.

Since his initial foray into the world of duplicate bridge in the 1970's, over the ensuing 30 years Fred has ably served as:

- President, St Catharines Duplicate Bridge Club from the early 1980's until its amalgamation with other St. Catharines area bridge clubs to form The Bridge Centre of Niagara in 2001
- Board Member, Niagara District Bridge Association initially as the representative of the St. Catharines Duplicate Bridge Club and more recently as the representative of The Bridge Centre of Niagara.

- Chair, Niagara District Sectional Tournament for the past 7 years.
- Co-Chair, Canadian Bridge Federation Bridge Week 2004 held in St. Catharines in June, 2004.
- Chair, Niagara Falls Regional Tournaments in 2001, 2004 and 2006.
- Member, Steering Committee, Founding Member and Charter President of The Bridge Centre of Niagara. Without his leadership, dedication and organizational skills, it is doubtful that The Bridge Centre of Niagara, now the premier place for bridge in the Niagara Region, would ever have come into existence. Under his guidance, membership at The Centre has grown from 201 in 2001 to well over 300 today.
- Member, Unit 166 Board of Directors since 2002."

By the looks of this résumé, maybe Fred has already been cloned. How else could one person do so much? And he does all this in his typical self-effacing style that delivers maximum enjoyment to others while drawing minimal attention to himself.

While he's always been there to get the necessary jobs done, to help provide bridge venues and programs for countless participants, Fred has always done so in such a fashion as to thoroughly earn the moniker "Friendly Fred". At the table, in meetings, or at post-session gettogethers, no one presents a more welcoming and congenial persona than our Fred – a thoroughly deserving winner of the 2007 Kate Buckman Award.

Pat Teeter Wins Audrey Grant Award for 2007

In 2005 The Board of Directors of Unit 166 decided to create a new award to recognize the contribution and excellence of the bridge teachers in the unit. We are proud and grateful to have so many of these gifted and dedicated people within the unit. Further to deciding to create such an award, the Board decided that its first such presentation should go to Audrey Grant and that the award should be named after this elite bridge teacher. The award was presented to Audrey during the 2005 Toronto Regional. The 2006 winner was Flo Belford.

The winner of the Audrey Grant Award for 2007 is Pat Teeter of The Bridge Centre of Niagara.

This is the letter that was sent by Niagara District players in support of Pat's nomination for this award:

"Organized bridge is alive and thriving in the Niagara Region and one very significant factor contributing to this healthy state of affairs has been the indefatigable teaching of Pat Teeter. She is a graduate of the ACBL Teacher Accreditation Program and a Certified Game Director, as well as a Silver Life Master.

In a full and part-time career spanning four decades, Pat has dedicated herself to bringing our great game to life for more than a thousand beginners whose initial fonts of wisdom may have been authored by Goren, Silverman or Grant, but

lovingly delivered in Pat's inimitable style. She started with the Joy of Bridge then progressed to the Club, Diamond, Heart and Spade series when they became available in 1989. She was one of the first Two Star teachers for having successfully taught more than 100 students in each of the Club and Diamond series. (ACBL Bulletin, June 1989.)

After many years of informal teaching and tutoring in her home, she started her own club ("Pat's Bridge Club") in 1984, which she ran very successfully until 2001. She then amalgamated Pat's Bridge with other St. Catharines bridge clubs to form The Bridge Centre of Niagara, where she is currently the Head Teacher.

In addition to the teaching and playing aspects of the game, she also promotes the social aspects. Over the years, she has organized several "Battle of the Sexes" (men's teams versus women's teams), combined with dinner and bridge. potluck suppers, Christmas and New Year's parties, a "tacky dress" bridge party, to name a few. She goes out of her way to make the social aspects of a bridge club as important as the learning and playing. Many of her students have remarked how much they enjoy this aspect of belonging to a bridge club.

As a nurturing force par excellence, Pat has hand-held these countless beginners through their bridge infancy and introduced them to club duplicate with results in both quantity and quality that give ample testimony to her teaching skills. Over the years, she has brought an estimated 500 new members into the ACBL, many of whom are now Life Masters.

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
The CNTC Winnipeg May 26-June 2, 2007 Andy Stark

As always, after Bridge Week is over, there are only a few happy bridge players; the rest of us are miserable and close to giving up the game. This year was no exception. Many GTA players congregated in Winnipeg at the end of May to face off against players from all over Canada. At stake was the right to represent our country at the World Championships to be held later this year in Shanghai, China.

The winners of the CNTC are a sextet with a unique multi-cultural symmetry about them. One pair, Jeff Smith and David Sabourin, is from Ottawa; another pair, Hervé Chatagnier and René Pelletier, is from Québec City, and the third pair, Waldemar Frukacz and Piotr Klimowicz is from Poland.

Actually, Waldemar is now living in Ottawa while 'Klimo' hails from Edmonton. The Polish-Canucks, also known as the "Plucks," were plucky indeed as they played 18 of the 21 round-robin matches and, get this all 264 boards of the playoffs. I think every bridge player at the CNTC can attest to the fact that defeating Frukacz and Klimowicz is even more difficult than correctly spelling their names.

Here's an example of Waldemar's excellent declarer play technique. Try it yourself by covering the East-West hands. The contract is three no trump; the opening lead is the heart nine.




Quick, one hundred guesses as to what system the Poles were playing and the first ninety-nine don't count. You got it, the Polish Club. The auction was one club by South, three spades by North, three no trump by South. Klimo told me the three-spade bid is the Polish Transfer, meaning, "Partner, you play this; I'm too tired." Seriously though, since three no trump would show a balanced 15-17, this is how they show a balanced hand with 13-14 HCP.

Waldemar ducked the lead of the heart nine and won the continuation. He then played a spade to the queen in dummy and continued spades by playing low from both hands, West's ace catching air.

West exited a diamond. Waldemar won the ace in dummy and crossed to his hand in hearts. He tabled the queen of clubs; West covered with the king and dummy's ace won. Waldemar then played a club back to his jack noting the fall of the nine on his right. It was now a simple matter of knocking out the ten of clubs to promote the club six.

The elegance comes in the well-timed ducks. Ducking a heart is essential as it can often disrupt the defenders' communication. The duck of the second round of spades is something every aspiring player should know about. You can infer that West has the ace when the queen of spades holds. Therefore, hope that it is now singleton (or doubleton) and duck on the way back. Knowing when to duck can pay huge dividends.

Yet, Waldemar was not through. He added insult to injury by taking advantage of West's mistake. Watch what happened when West, after winning the ten of clubs, played his last club (and not a diamond); here is the four-card ending:




On West's three of clubs exit, dummy pitched the nine of spades and East was squeezed - if he discarded a spade, declarer's five would be worth a trick,

while if he threw a diamond instead, the jack of diamonds would grow in rank. So, Waldemar made an overtrick when the declarer at the other table went down two in three no trump! That was a win of 11 IMPs. As Klimo told me, "Waldemar played an absolutely perfect game as declarer throughout the whole tournament."

Board 23 of the final session in the round-robin was my favourite of the event. Although our team had no chance of qualifying for the knockout round (quarterfinals), we still wanted to finish strongly and avoid the cellar. (You have to take your inspiration wherever you can get it.)

Board 23. Dealer South. Both Vul.



I was South and passed as the dealer. West passed and so did North, my partner, Roy Hughes. East opened the bidding one heart and I overcalled two no trump - the normal Unusual Two No Trump, the bid that shows at least 5-5 in the minors. Note that only when describing a bridge convention do you get to use the words, "normal unusual." Our game is so weird.

West raised to four hearts and Roy competed with five diamonds. East was not done, and trotted out five hearts. I, on the other hand, was done, and so I passed. West passed and Roy, flashing his customary superb bidding judgment, bid six diamonds. East was still not done, and doubled most vociferously . . . well, as vociferous as one can be while tabling a red card from a bidding box. Admittedly, snapping a piece of paper onto a bidding tray does not carry the same resonance as standing on one's chair and bellowing, "DOUBLE"; still, from my side of the screen the double sure seemed to indicate that blood was about to spill.

The king of spades was led and there was Roy in six diamonds doubled. Take a look at all four hands - not a bad spot, eh? Well, I didn't know that and so I excused myself to stretch and get a glass of water, leaving my friend, Lyn Stevens to maintain the dummy. When I returned I asked her, "Well, were you

a good dummy?" And Lyn replied, "I was an excellent dummy." Now that has to be good news.

Making six diamonds doubled with an overtrick is a cool 1740, so we won the board and went on to win the match. But did you notice what is so special about the deal? It's not very often you see this: two passed hands bid and made a slam.

After the event was over our team got together to commiserate and drown our sorrows with Manitoban micro-brew and a splendid new red from South Africa called, "Goats Do Roam." (Yes they do: all the way back to Toronto with their tails between their legs). In discussing the above deal, John Rayner remarked that an East player on top of his or her game would have known what to do. After three passes, East should reason, "Hmm, this is a nice 16-count with a robust heart suit but it feels as if the opponents have a slam their way; I think I'd better pass this one out!"

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Play of the Hand Reading the Lead (Leads Against Suits) David Lindop

The latest in our series for the newer player. Reprinted from Audrey Grant's Better Bridge with permission of the publisher.

Like they do against no trump contracts, the defenders also have guidelines for leading against trump contracts:

- Top of touching cards
- Fourth highest but don't lead away from an ace
- A short suit hoping for a ruff.

Again, we can use that to our advantage.



Against our slam, West leads the nine of diamonds. What can we read into that? It's a little unusual for a defender to lead the suit opened by the dummy, especially when we have all the high

cards in the suit. It looks as though West has led a short suit, hoping for a ruff.

After winning the first trick, we would usually be tempted to lead the queen of spades and take a finesse if West follows with a low spade. We'd make an overtrick if West had the spade king. However, West's opening lead has warned us that the full layout may be something like this:



If we try the spade finesse, East will win the spade king and lead a diamond for West to ruff. We'll have gone down in our cold slam. Instead, we should draw trumps as quickly as possible by playing the ace and a second round of spades. East wins the second round, but it's too late for the defence to obtain a diamond ruff since West will have no trumps left.

What if we don't take the finesse and West has the spade king after all? We play the ace and a second spade to West's king, but West has no way to get to the East hand to obtain his ruff. We draw West's last trump when we

regain the lead. We have merely dropped an overtrick as the cost of insuring our contract – a small price to pay.

Let's try another deal:

West leads the queen of spades against our four-heart contract. We apparently have three spade losers and a club loser. We can't do anything about the ace of clubs, so we'll have to avoid losing three spade tricks.

Our normal plan would be to lead toward dummy's spade king, hoping that West has the ace – a 50% chance. But West's opening lead changes all that. What are the chances that West holds the ace of spades? Against most experienced defenders the chances are almost zero.

There's that guideline about not leading away from an ace at a suit contract. West might lead the spade queen from a holding including the ace-queen-jack-ten against no trump, but against a suit contract, most

defenders would lead the ace or choose another suit.

So, we should assume that East holds the spade ace. Do we still have any chance of making the contract? Sure we do. We can hope that East has a singleton or doubleton ace and the full deal turns out to be something like this:

We play a low spade from dummy at the first trick. West's queen wins as East plays the four. If West continues with the spade jack, we should again play a low spade from the dummy. On the diagrammed deal, East has to win the ace and our king is a winner.

We were lucky on this deal to find East with a doubleton ace of spades ... and also the ace of clubs. Then, West could not regain the lead to give East a spade ruff. Still, we made the most of our chances by reading West's opening lead as the top of touching honours, but not from an interior sequence that included the ace.

The Fountain of Youth Bev Ross

Bert started playing about ten years ago and has amassed over 1000 master points mostly by playing in club games - he has attended only two tournaments. Donnie takes it less seriously and plays only in limited games. Both are terrific people and in reasonable health.

Tales of the King/Jack Terry Bradley

Dickens' opening words in "A Tale of Two Cities" were, "It was the best of times; it was the worst of times". The same can be said of my experiences while defending with the doubleton king and jack of a suit bid by the opponents on their way to three no trump.

Tale #I - "The best of times"

Playing in an open match point game at the usual venue (John Rayner's Mississauga Club), I am dealt the doubleton king/jack of clubs - the rest of my holding is not relevant to the story.

Declarer was on my right and had bid clubs - the final contract was three no trump. After fielding my neutral lead, Declarer leads a club from four small on the table, partner plays a card that shows three of the suit, and declarer goes into the tank, finally playing the ten. In tempo, I played the king!

After regaining the lead in his hand, Declarer could not wait to get to dummy to lead another club to take the 'marked' finesse against my partner's jack. The two club tricks plus three more made for a result of down one and all the match points. I can't say for sure that he would have found the successful play of dropping the king if I had routinely won the ten with the jack, but why give him the chance?

Tale #2 - "The worst of times"

Same venue, same holding in clubs (doubleton king/jack): but this time the game is IMP's and our opponents are the affable club owner himself and perennial Richmond Trophy contender Andy Stark - we are not talking chopped liver here!

Again the contract is three no trump, but this time declarer (John) is on my left, so my king-jack holding is trapped in front of the club bidder. He leads a small club from three to the ten in dummy and I (in tempo) play the king. My thought was that John would play partner for the jack and lead up to the ten-small left in dummy to

establish the ten as the game-going trick.


Such was the not the case, however, John went back to dummy and led another small club, capturing my jack with the queen. Have you ever noticed how the better players are not so easily deceived? Well, at least I caused him to consume a few brain cells for the rest of the match.

While I was discussing the attempted deception play with my partner after the hand, John's only comment was, "Did you have the jack of clubs mixed in with your spades?"

The opening lead of the club two went to the four, ten and jack. Joan (RR) cashed the ace and king of diamonds and played the heart jack. I rose with the king, cashed the ace of clubs and led another heart to Linda's (HH) ace, cutting declarer off from her hand and ensuring us two more club tricks at the end for one down.

Linda continued this plan by leading the spade jack to dummy's ace, ensuring no entry to the West hand. Joan followed this by the cashing the king and queen. Declarer then called for a "spade", followed by an "Oh s**t".

Since we know these two well. Linda said, "Don't worry, play whatever you want" but Shirley (SB) insisted. "No, it was a called card."

Unfortunately, playing my part as the unlucky Armenian, I had failed to unblock the seven-six of spades. As I won the trick with my seven, I realized to my horror that Joan had just accidentally made three no trump as I was forced to lead a red card to her hand. The thought that she would throw me in had never occurred to me.

And you thought this only happened in fiction!

(Although in Mollo's menagerie, the Hideous Hog would have known exactly what he was doing with his feigned magnanimous offer, Linda was completely generous and innocent, and had not realized the consequences. Nor had Shirley.)

A Two-Edged Sword
Stephen Cooper

Here are two deals from the final of the Toronto Team-of-Four League which helped us to victory. You hold:

> **♠** — ♡ A 9 7 6 5 4 3 ◊ J 9 7 2 **♣** J 5

and you see partner open one spade. Your vulnerable-vs-not opponent overcalls two hearts. You smoothly pass, but partner, sadly, re-opens not with double, but with three clubs. To your surprise and delight, overcaller now bids three hearts! Do you take a piece of it with your seven trumps over the bidder?

Three hearts is cold! The opponents' cards are:

You can't stop declarer from running four diamond tricks (with the help of the finesse), ruffing one club with the two, and scoring four more hearts with his king-queen-jack-ten-eight.

(This didn't actually happen - your partner played three clubs, down two)

A little while later, I held:

♠ K 10 6 5 4 3 2 ♡ K 6 ◇ 7 5 **♣** 8 5

In first seat, not vulnerable vs vulnerable, I passed to await developments. It went one club on my left. Partner bid two diamonds (weak), and it goes two spades(!) on your right. You pass, and it goes two no trump on your left.

No, the following did not happen, but let's say the bidding continues three diamonds on your right, three hearts on your left, and three spades on your right. Finally, you can't resist! Can you? If you double three spades, they, too, are cold for that contract, despite another 7-0 trump break! (In reality, at the other table, the defence did make nine tricks in spades, after my hand opened a normal non-vulnerable three spades, and the takeout double was left in. Their cards:

Three of a major (doubled? redoubled? on the second one to compensate for the slam?) is cold on both hands despite (or is it thanks to?) the 7-0 trump breaks!

I love this game.

Ok. Here's one of my big gripes about the ACBL. I realize the ACBL has to show a profit. I do remember there was a time not so long ago when the ACBL books didn't impress the shareholders! When I was playing in tournaments trying to accumulate the required points for Life Master, you played in the A section to get gold. B section was red and black and C was black. Nowadays, and strictly to honour the profit line, we have these milksop stratified events and numerous knockouts that award more points than deserved.
