I play bridge, teach bridge...and play golf. This year in Penticton's CNTC, I had the opportunity to marry all the passions at once.

A bit of history perhaps. On and off, I have been teaching Carol, aka "Lady Golf" on BBO, for the last year or so. She is a rising intermediate player who lives in Golden, BC. One problem she has living in Golden is that she has no local bridge club and must travel far to play in a live game. She has played only once in a 'live game'; other than that, the entire sum of her bridge experience has been on the Internet. Having no idea of the scope of BC's interior. I invited her to Penticton to watch, meet some of Canada's best players, and with any luck learn a thing or two. She came.

She was there to watch our team on the first day. In chatting, I found that she had won her district's golf championship the previous week (I'm so jealous) so her nickname was wellsuited.

During our team dinner, she observed, "I can't believe how badly you treat yourselves." She went on, "The best lesson I ever had at golf was to treat yourself with respect. Treat yourself as you would treat your partner. If you make a mistake shrug it off. It happens to everyone".

In golf, if we mess up we say to ourselves, "You moron, how can you be so stupid!" All that does is lessen your self-esteam and promote more poor play. She said, "You guys treat your partners great and yourselves like garbage...STOP IT!"

So here was Carol hoping to learn something about bridge from Canada's best players and instead she taught us something. Cool!

THE 2009 CAVENDI\$H

Every year there is a big money Cavendish (Calcutta auction format with IMP pairs scoring) held in Las Vegas. Most of the best players in the world are lured to the seven-figure prize pool. The entry fee is a steep \$2,500, and unless you are household names of world repute, you should assume that you will also pay the minimum auction fee of \$12,500 too (every pair is auctioned off to the highest bidder).

This past May, the biggest auction prices were for Levin-Weinstein (\$61,000); followed by Rodwell-Hampson (\$55,000); then Helgemo-Helness (\$50,000). The 'bargain basement' included former winners Fred Gitelman and Brad Moss at 'only' \$26,000.

Form held up pretty well with Levin-Weinstein finishing first – returning over \$217,000 to their investors, and Rodwell-Hampson (last year's defending champs) coming in second for around \$137,000. Fred and Brad came seventh, and the Norwegians

came eighth – all yielding a profit for their 'owners'.

The opportunity to butt heads with opponents of such a high calibre over five long sessions is very compelling, and were it not for the sobering minimum outlay of \$15,000 – I would recommend it to many of our best pairs as a way to sharpen their games. The following hand was one of the gems from the main event, featuring stellar performances from Brad Moss on defence, and Stevie Weinstein on declarer play (Steve was this year's winner and the only player to have won this event six(!) times).

Fred led the heart six, and Moss was allowed to win the queen. He shifted to a diamond, which ran around to dummy's ten. Weinstein could count nine tricks if he could get the spade

king off the table while retaining a spade in his hand to get back to the dummy's long suit. So he made the routine play of the spade queen from dummy.

Brad Moss made the standard expert duck from king-nine offside! In tempo, of course, otherwise what is the point? Now Weinstein was in trouble. He knew either opponent was capable of ducking the spade queen, and there was a risk now of only one or two spade tricks and down many in three notrump.

He travelled to his hand with the diamond ace and led another spade. As smoothly as Brad Moss had ducked the spade queen, there must have been some kind of 'tell' at the table that clued in Weinstein. Steve is an expert poker player with huge credentials in big money games — he lives for these moments! He played the spade ace from dummy, dropping Brad's now stiff king! Weinstein then claimed eleven tricks, citing a squeeze endplay on Fred's hand for all the marbles - a gain of 212 IMPs.

The 'tell" might have been from Brad OR Fred. Top players are very good at sniffing out key card locations from body language, eye movement, spot card plays, and sometimes plain old intuition.

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PETERBOROUGH GRAND COUP

David Sabourin, Dave Colbert, Mike Cafferata and I were playing at the Peterborough Sectional when the following deal came up during the KO final against the formidable team of John Rayner, John Duquette, Martin Hunter, and Susie Cooper.

We play that two notrump slows the auction down after a jump shift, so three diamonds showed some values. I was worried about two heart losers so signed off in five diamonds and David took the push to six diamonds based on my jump shifting.

It appears that making the slam requires holding the heart suit to one loser. Alas, I soon discovered that diamonds broke 5-0!

Martin lead the club queen which I ran to my ace. The diamond ace revealed the 5-0 trump break. A low diamond went to the queen, then I ran the diamond eight which Susie ducked (covering wouldn't help). The spade six to my queen (noting Susie's play of the spade nine, playing upside down count). Now a heart up - Martin popped his ace (ducking would not help as long as I put in the jack) and returned a club to dummy's king (hoping that Susie would ruff for the setting trick? No luck).

It was clear to me that Susie held five diamonds and two clubs. Was she 4-2 in the majors or 3-3? Based on her carding and my table feel that she was being honest, I played her to be 3=3=5=2. I now played the spade king, overtaking with my ace and cashed the jack. Going with my gut feel, I played a heart up finessing the queen! The heart jack won the trick. I cashed the heart king, pitching my good spade ten to reach the two-card ending where the dummy had a heart and a club, Susie has the trump jack-nine and I had the trump king-ten over her to bring home the slam.

The other table played in three notrump so we won 10 IMPs on this board. I would like to say that we won the KO but the Rayner team played very well and won the match and the event.

Our move from the downtown area to the airport caused much conversation. Some of the comments shared with me included the following:

- You have a great spirit/ atmosphere.
- Your directors ease novice nervousness.
- We need definitive bus schedules.
- It's a nice place to play; good lighting, temperatures vary a little too much.
- In and Out parking is great!
- This is the Toronto Regional, NOT the Toronto Airport Regional.
- · Playing in the hall is distracting.
- This location is so remote that few, if any, international players will come.
- This location is great; much better than before.
- The rooms cost less, parking is cheaper, entries are cheaper and the playing space is better. Good job!
- Everyone has been terrific. Thank you to the volunteers.
- The schedule is not good. People who've been KO'd need to be able to get back into a new KO.
- Stop catering to the whiners. This is a good venue.
- Bridge lectures would be better at noon.
- I wish it was downtown but I understand why it's not. Oh well, I'll get used to it.
- People aren't friendly enough.

- It's too crowded at the entry table.
- and my personal favourite
- Dear, we seniors pee a lot. We need to be closer to the washrooms.

Generally speaking, comments and reactions were positive. Thank you to all who took the time to complete the evaluation forms, spoke to Board members or Directors or made their views known. Thanks also to those who took the time to phone or email me after the tournament. We will try to address as many of your issues and consider your recommendations as we work to improve the tournament.

A few other pertinent pieces of information include: 1258 people registered. Of these, 130 travelled more than 100 kms. These "out of towners" played an average of 3 days while locals played an average of 2.5 days.

We were "up" by approx. 50 tables. Factors that have an impact include:

- · last year's NABC in Detroit
- Easter in April versus March (snowbirds are home)
- Passover was in the middle of the tournament this year decreasing numbers
- Gatlinburg followed this year's event and this always hurts
- Some boycotting of this venue hoping to precipitate a change back downtown
- Some Torontonians don't have cars ... transit is problematic

KUWAITI BRIDGE

The following hand was dealt some years ago at a rubber bridge session in Kuwait:

I was South on the deal, partnered by Petrine Pahlawan. The player occupying the West position was Mrs. Allos, an inexperienced player, but her partner was an Egyptian expert, Marcel Zananiri. Marcel was the person who taught Omar Sharif to play bridge and partnered him in several international contests.

My partner and I reached a small slam in notrumps, West having overcalled spades during the auction. The opening lead was the deuce of clubs and I played small from the table, unexpectedly winning the trick with the jack. I figured that if I could win four tricks in hearts and take a winning spade finesse, which was highly probable, I could make the slam.

Thus I led a low heart from hand, East winning and surprisingly returning a spade. I won the trick with the nine

on the table and played a heart to my ace, getting the bad news. Now I had no alternative but to squeeze West in spades and hearts, having already rectified the count by ducking a heart at the second trick.

By playing all my good minor-suit tricks, with the aid of the club finesse, East at the end had either to discard a spade giving me an extra spade trick or a heart, baring the queen.

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MAVIS COLE 1933 - 2009

West leads the heart seven against your slam. East follows with the two (reverse count and attitude) as you win the ace. You play a club to the king and another back to the ace, West discarding the four of diamonds, encouraging, on the second of these.

You cash the heart king and West discards another diamond! Uh oh.

How do you now plan to take twelve tricks?

You are South. Your partner leads the spade queen against six diamonds. Declarer wins the king in hand and plays ace, king and a third club (seven, eight, ten from partner, upside down count and attitude), ruffing with the diamond six in dummy.

Intermediate/Novice Corner...

Play of the Hand by David Lindop THE FEAR FACTOR

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As declarer we encounter many situations where there is a danger our contract will be defeated, perhaps by several tricks. In such situations, this isn't the time to freeze. A card must still be played the same day it's dealt, so we have to do something, and we might as well hope for the best. Consider this deal where we reach four hearts after East's preemptive overcall:



Our first thought is likely, "What an awful trump suit! Why did I bid my shabby heart suit?" Perhaps we are in the right spot, however, three no trump has only eight top tricks, five clubs has three heart losers, and there's no guarantee that we could defeat three diamonds.

Anyway, the auction is over and our task now is to make the contract. The good news is that we don't have any losers outside hearts. The bad news is that we'll need the five missing hearts to divide 3–2 if we are to have a chance.

Having decided that, we should win the ace of diamonds and immediately lead a heart. It won't help to ruff a diamond at trick two, and we can't afford to start taking winners in spades and clubs until at least two rounds of trumps are drawn. We have to hope the full deal is something like this:



Suppose West wins the jack of hearts as East follows with the ten. West leads another diamond, which we trump. We are left with two low hearts

in dummy and three low hearts in our hand. The ace, king and queen of hearts are still outstanding. Sure we're worried that if we lead another heart one defender will have all three hearts and draw our remaining trumps and lead a diamond. We might then go down several tricks. We must put such negative thoughts aside and lead another heart. We've already decided the only way we can make the hand is if the defenders' trumps are divided 3–2.

East can win the second round of hearts with the king and lead another diamond, but now we are in control. The only other trick we lose is to West's heart ace. If we had tried to take the spade or club winners early, East would have ruffed and we would have lost four heart tricks instead of three.

When we need a favourable lie of the cards - a 3-2 heart division on this deal - we should assume things will go our way and play accordingly. If it we go down, at least we gave it a try. Partner can't ask for more.

In this next deal, we are in three no trump and West leads the king of spades:

♣ A 5 ♥ K 9 8 ♦ K J 7 6 **♣** J 8 4 2

♠ J 7 ♡ A Q 3 ◇ A Q 8 2 **♣** K 7 6 5 We have eight sure tricks: a spade, three hearts, and four diamonds. We need only one more. We might be able to get that from the club suit; if East has the ace of clubs, we can lead toward our king. West's spade lead looks ominous, however. The defenders have nine spades between them, so one defender will have at least five spades. After we win the ace of spades, it looks likely that they will be able to take four spade tricks if we let them gain the lead with the club ace.

Perhaps we should simply take our eight winners and hope something good happens at the end. Hoping for a misdefence, however, is giving into our fears. Instead, we should take a confident approach and assume the cards lie favourably.

The best play is to win the spade ace and immediately lead a low club, planning to play the king if East plays low. This could prove disastrous if the defenders win the ace of clubs and take five or six spade tricks. It could be even worse if West has the club ace and they get two or three club tricks in addition to the spade winners.

On the positive side, East might have the ace of clubs and play low when we lead a club from dummy, allowing us to steal a ninth trick with the king. Or the full deal might be like this: (See top of next page)

If this is the layout, East can't defeat us even by winning the ace of clubs and returning a spade. The spade suit is blocked and East has no entry for the long card in the suit. The opponents can take only three spades and the club ace, unless we panic and take our eight top tricks first. Then East's jack of hearts would be established as a fifth trick for the defence.

SOLUTIONS TO TEST YOUR SLAM PLAY

(See the problems on page 22):

This slam occurred at the Bermuda Regional and it is a matter of visualization: cash the heart queen, discarding the jack of diamonds and run clubs. In the five-card ending (you need the spade queen onside to have a chance), West must either throw a spade, allowing you to take four spade tricks with the finesse, or blank the ace of diamonds, setting up the seven and five in the dummy after you play the king!

John Diamond made the brilliant return of a heart into dummy's acequeen. Why brilliant? It took away an entry for the impending trump coup that was executed at the other table on the jack of diamonds return. Had North's singleton diamond been the ten or the jack, Steve Weinstein (declarer) would have been able to trump coup Diamond. As it was, the jack-ten combination foiled that plan.

"Nice defence," Weinstein said.
