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## Newer Players' Corner



## IT'S YOUR LEAD; NOW WHAT? by Barbara Seagram

Getting the defence off to a good start involves finding a good opening lead. This gives you a head start at beating the contract. First you have to select the right suit to lead and then you have to choose the right card in that suit so that partner knows what to expect from you, i.e., what else you hold in that suit. Very often, partner has not bid, so you have to make all these decisions based only on the opponents' bidding and on your own holdings.

Honour sequences are the best leads in bridge. New players like to bang down aces at every opportunity, thrilled with the idea that they are winning a trick. BUT an ace can only take one trick. Rarely will you beat the contract by just cashing aces and kings. You are seldom dealt enough of these and you must learn the art of turning lesser cards into tricks.

Hence, with king-queen-jack-fourth, lead the king; once you have driven out the ace, with luck you will later score the queen and the jack in that suit. With queen-jack-ten, you lead the queen. I think you get the idea.

With king-eight-four-two, using standard leads, you lead the two. This is called leading the Bottom of Something. Partner will expect you to show up later with at least a jack in the suit led.

Traditionally, holding nine-five-two, you lead the nine. We call this leading scheme the Top of Nothing. The acronym B.O.S.T.O.N, standing for Bottom of Something; Top of Nothing should help you to remember these concepts.

Top of nothing leads, however, can cause problems. If you have raised her suit and you lead the nine, she will know that you cannot have a doubleton or else you would not have raised her suit. Thus she knows it is top of nothing. Fine, but if you have not raised her, then when you lead a nine (or a high spot card of any sort), she will wonder if this is a doubleton.

It is more important for her to know that you have three or more of the suit led (even if small ones) than for her to know whether you have an honour. Thus, you should lead a small card with three or more small ones in a suit that partner has bid and you have not raised.

Let's see how this works in real life:

\* South makes this bid only because her partner has already passed, so there is no danger of missing a slam.

West leads his partner's suit, the spade two. East wins the queen (win from the bottom but lead from the top!) and cashes his spade ace. When everyone follows, he knows that West cannot have a doubleton (or he would have played high-low). This means that South only has two spades. East must not now play his spade king. He must shift to the jack of diamonds. Poor declarer is doomed. She will lose two diamond tricks now and two spades, no matter what. Down one.

If East had thought that West may have had only two spades, he may have now tried to cash a third round of spades. Declarer could now ruff this, draw trumps and discard a losing diamond on dummy's extra club winner, making the contract.

West has to decide what to lead. When you cannot figure out what to lead, decide what not to lead first. It is almost never right to lead a singleton trump and you should avoid leading suits that are headed by aces unless you also hold the king in that suit as well. That makes West choose the leftover suit, a club. While the sequence is less than perfect as an opening lead, you must lead top of touching honours with this holding - the club queen.

East must win with the club ace. While it is usually right to lead partner's overcalled suit, a quick glance at dummy to your right will reveal that this cannot beat the contract. The king of hearts is in dummy and alas, there are four hearts there. Declarer thus only has one heart.

East should now shift to her singleton eight of diamonds. West wins with the

ace and leads another diamond (the nine preferably), giving partner a ruff. The nine of diamonds is a holler for East to lead back the higher ranking of the two remaining suits, i.e., a heart. East leads the three of hearts after ruffing. West wins the ace and leads yet another diamond for East to ruff. Down two!

If East woodenly leads partner's suit at trick two or leads a second round of clubs, declarer will draw trumps, ultimately drive out the ace of diamonds and make the contract.

Defence is the most exciting and challenging part of the game. Always try to think how you can beat the contract. But do try to communicate effectively with partner to let her know what your holdings are in the suits you lead. This will make partner's life easier.



You sensibly pass throughout and partner leads the diamond nine. You must form a plan. Any ideas? Decide what you'd do before reading on.

After the lead of the nine of diamonds, you pause to assess your side's chances. There are only 15 HCP outstanding, and unless South has shaded his one notrump opening, he'll have every single outstanding high card point. You also know from declarer's one notrump bid that he does not have a singleton heart. You can be sure that partner would always lead a singleton heart in preference to a diamond from what

appears to be great length. This was the full deal:



The only holding left for partner is a heart void! Partner is due for a heart ruff or two, but you need to be careful not to cash the heart ace first. If you do that, partner will get his heart ruff, but you've set up the heart suit for club pitches. You must hold on to your ace of hearts to control the suit and ensure a club trick.

Thus at trick two, you must lead the heart three to ask for a club return. In practice, when West ruffed and returned a club, declarer took his only chance to make the contract and finessed. After winning the club king, the ace and another heart put declarer down two.

One last point – you ought to win the first trick with the diamond ace to take away any possibility of partner returning a diamond after his heart ruff.

This defence gains you 10 IMPs in a Swiss match as at the other table, the defence to the same contract was not as stellar.

## Ignorance Is Bliss By David Cohen

Playing in the Sunday Swiss Teams at the Toronto Regional against Brenda Bryant on my right and Francine Cimon on my left, I picked up this spotty collection: ♠A108652 ♡K107 ◇104 ♣J7. Brenda passed in first seat, and I chose not to open an undisciplined two spades in second seat, vul vs vul. The full auction was:

The two of hearts was led and this was the dummy that I got:



Not exactly the dummy I expected, but counting my losers, I could see one diamond, assuming the ace was on my left, and whatever spades I had to lose. Either one spade (if Kx or Kxx is on my left), two spades if the king is on my right, which is doubtful if I can trust the third seat opener to have a reasonable opening and hold most of the I3 outstanding HCP's on this deal. So I am pretty happy with the contract.

After the opening heart lead, I realize that there may be a problem with the contract as RHO probably has only one heart and will get at least one heart ruff, and maybe two if she returns a diamond to West's ace after the first ruff. So, after asking myself what could go wrong, it looks like I need to get trumps off the table immediately.

The normal play would be to play a small spade towards dummy's queen, but since you are pretty sure that the king on your left will win this trick, you will then suffer a heart ruff, a diamond to the ace and the killing final heart ruff, you know that it is dangerous to make that play. The best play is to bang down the spade ace and continue with a small spade towards the now bare queen. This will pick up the spade suit for two losers on every 3-2 and most 4-1 breaks of the suit. So I know that this play is clearly with the odds.

Unfortunately, most 4-1 breaks does not mean all 4-1 breaks. For me, this was the full deal:



After I cash the spade ace, Francine wins the second spade with the king, cashes the diamond ace, and waits to get her jack and nine of spades to set the contract.

At the other table, my hand was held by Paul Thurston (playing with Jeff Smith), who chose to open a Multi Two Diamonds with my hand, meaning 'I have a weak 2 in one of the majors'. This shut our teammates, Jan Stewart and Andrew Risman, out of the auction entirely. The bidding continued:

Jeff asked Paul to transfer to his suit so that the contract could be played by Jeff's hand. Looking at the tenaces in the North hand, it seems right to play it from that hand. (To declare from the South hand, North would respond four diamonds: 'Bid your

suit.'). Paul and Jeff also got to four spades, but didn't have the knowledge of the bad split and possible pending ruffs in hearts as the West hand was shut out of bidding her heart suit after the two-diamond opening.

But, now that Jeff didn't have the same information about the hand that I did, he played the more normal way of playing the spade suit of low from his hand toward the queen which, as you can see from the layout, picks up the suit for two losers. And he scored up his ten tricks.

So many articles discuss making discovery plays, finding out what you can about the hand, before making a critical decision. Or using the auction to help you play the hand right. Well, I had the perfect information about this hand and it caused me to fail as that 10% chance layout of the cards smacked me...whereas my opponent at the other table, who didn't have that information, could do nothing but fall into the right line of play for the lie of the cards.

We lost this match to the eventual winners by 3 IMPs, losing 13 on this board.

It's times like those, in which we all manage to have a good laugh, that remind me how lucky I've been to run such an incredible club.

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# The Fourth Quarter By John Carruthers

Playing in a close match is always fun and tense, specially when it's for a national title and representation in a World Championship. That was the case for SILVER (John Guoba-Marty Kirr, Joey Silver-John Carruthers) and BARAN (David Lindop-Robert Lebi, Jurek Czyzowicz-Dan Jacob) as we headed into the fourth quarter of our match for the 2012 Canadian Senior Team Championship in Montréal this past May. BARAN led by 15 (99-84) with 16 boards left...

The first board of the set was my favourite of the week:

Jurek (noboby calls him Czyzowicz, which is rather difficult for English tongues) led the king of spades, which Guoba won with the ace to lead a trump. Jurek won his ace, took the spade queen and and the club ace and everyone went on to the next board. Down one, plus 100 to North/South.

Lebi produced an auction designed to get him doubled in five diamonds. He had to think it had a play. Nevertheless, with his strong defence, he took a big chance that we'd compete further. As it happened, we had no game and if our high cards had been distributed a little differently, he would not have had a second chance.

The first three tricks were card for card the same at at the other table. Both Jacob and I played our spades in the order five, six. Having seen the two, three and four, Silver interpreted my six as it was meant, suit preference for clubs. Thus he trustingly underled his club ace to my king (why torture partner for even a second or two with the jack or queen?) for a spade ruff. Down two and plus 300 to North/South.

Should Jurek have risked the contract to find the same defence? Perhaps he should have - Jacob had

played his spades in the same order I had.

The 5 IMPs to SILVER narrowed the BARAN lead to 10 IMPs (99-89).

The second board of the set was my least favourite of the match. I held ♠— ♡AKQ10763 ♦54 ♣A1085 and bid four hearts over a one notrump opener on my right. I went two off against my own...four spades! Partner held ♠KQJ98765 ♡— ♦Q86 ♣Q4 and with the notrumper on lead, that could not be beaten. Thirteen IMPs to BARAN, which had its biggest lead of the match, 23 IMPs (112-89).

On Board 51,we bid a good non-vulnerable four hearts missed at the other table. Game was makeable on a club finesse, a club lead, or some other rather unlikely combinations, but could have been beaten doubledummy on an impossible-to-find defence. BARAN 112-95.

Board 52 offered something more substantial to both teams:

Kirr made a very astute (and timely) weak jump overcall. He traded on both his partner's passed hand status and the knowledge that his side had no heart fit. Six spades is a pretty dreadful contract, but with four finesses onside (the heart king is onside in either hand; all you have to do is guess it!), there are a couple of ways home. You might amuse yourself in finding them (Deep Finesse can help!).

Guoba led the nine of diamonds to Kirr's ace and the diamond queen was ruffed in the dummy. Jacob overtook the spade queen with the king to draw trumps (oops!) and found that he could no longer make his contract. His plan had been to play West for both rounded-suit kings, drawing trumps, finessing a heart, then playing the ace and ruffing a heart. If all went well, either the heart king would come down third or the West hand would be squeezed in hearts and clubs. When trumps went 5-1, he was down one, minus 100.

At our table, Lebi once again bid less than Kirr, giving us the room to explore before settling in three notrump. No one thought anything of it and both pairs were surprised to learn of the swing. On a diamond lead ducked to my king I took a heart finesse and took nine tricks for 12 IMPs, closing the gap to 5 IMPs (112-107).

The next three boards gave us three more IMPs in extra undertricks and overtricks (112-110). On Board 56, we contrived to declare three notrump from the king-doubleton heart side (opposite two small) and made II tricks, while the other table declared it from the two small side, got a heart through the king at trick one and lost the first six tricks. That was II IMPs and a 121-112 lead, our first lead in the match since Board 28.

Over the next four boards, SILVER scored 5 IMPs (for a small plus at each table on a competitive deal) and BARAN scored 8 for a doubled overtrick in a lucky 23-HCP three notrump with a few cards onside. With four boards to go, that made the score 126-120 to SILVER.

On Board 61, Silver made a partscore at both tables for 6 IMPs, then a lucky lie of the spade suit on Board 62 allowed Lindop to play  $\bigstar$ K 1064 opposite  $\bigstar$ A987 for no losers to make three spades (which they were in). Unfortunately for BARAN, the same fortunate lie allowed Guoba to make three notrump (which they were in) for another 6 IMPs. SILVER led 138-120 with two boards to go.

The penultimate board offered BARAN the chance to more-than-halve the gap:

It's not clear who should have bid more on the Guoba-Kirr auction it's difficult to fault either. Nevertheless, six clubs is a pretty good contract and Guoba would have made it if Jurek followed his partner's advice (command?) and led a spade.

At our table, I was on lead. I had little to go on - hearts and clubs were out - partner had declined to double three diamonds or four spades. Since four spades would have been easier to double than three diamonds and was Silver's last chance to help me, I chose the diamond ten. Lebi could not handle it with the 4-I break and surrendered one down.

That gave SILVER 11 IMPs and a 149-120 lead with a board to go. This last

was a push in three notrump with overtricks so the final margin was those same 29 IMPs.

Marty Kirr-John Guoba and Joey Silver-John Carruthers were thus going to Lille to compete in the World Championship. They augmented the team with Michael Roche and John Rayner, with Katie Thorpe as NPC. Lest you think I had something to do with our choice of NPC, it must be said that it was Joey Silver who stated, "I insist on Katie as our NPC." No one demurred.

From the "Tarheel" Regional in Raleigh, NC...a strong 12-team Bracket One KO found my team in a tough three-way against Boyd/Robinson and the Hampton team (Hampton, Gavin Wolpert, Steve Weinstein, and two young Poles (Buras/ Narkiewicz). Daniel Korbel and I were playing against Boyd/Robinson. We were having a flat-to-slightly-plus set when, on the last board of the first half, Boyd opened a strong notrump on my right. At unfavourable I was looking at: ♠Kxx ♡|x ♦ ♣A|T8xxx. While one normally bids over a strong notrump with a decent sevencard suit plus a singleton, I didn't like the colours so I passed. Now is a good time to place your bets on what the final contract will be. Hint: you won't collect!

The auction continued pass on my left to Daniel, who held a decent 4=4=5=0 hand. He had two choices: show a hand with both majors (two diamonds) or show a four-card major and longer minor (double). He wisely chose the latter. Peter Boyd then bid two clubs (natural!). I calmly suggested doubt, held my breath and started to breathe again after Daniel passed. I was defending two clubs doubled!

At this point we were a little behind timewise. Dave Berkowitz and Alan Sontag had walked over and were watching us. Berkowitz saw the following dummy \$10xxx \$109xx \$108xx \$x\$, looked at Korbel's hand, looked at Boyd's hand, then took out his wallet, pulled out a \$20 bill and said to Boyd: "I bet you don't make it"! Then he pulled out a second \$20 bill and offered \$40.

Final result: down four, plus 800. We defended two clubs doubled, but actually made three!

## **LAOS**

### By Barbara Seagram

Patti Lee and Barbara Seagram recently spent ten days in Laos. After three nights in Vientiane, the capital, we travelled to Luang Prabang, a town in north central Laos, then by boat to Muang Ngoi. We visited several very remote, primitive villages. Steve Rutledge, our contact, and his friend Mike Yap work independently in Laos at their own expense. Rotary groups have donated money to their cause and they have just won the civic award for philanthropy in Port Hope, ON. Their charity is called "Adopt a Village in Laos". They have built five schools and have made substantial improvements to a rural hospital. They have installed 440 water filters to date in remote villages. Each family in the village gets a water filter.

The following is from Steve: "Hygiene is important among the rural villagers. What little money they are able to make generally goes to basic health care mostly caused by poor hygiene and poor drinking water. In Pha Yong Village, just before I distributed water filters to each of the 84 families (plus two for the school), I asked the 84 families, all sitting in front of me, how many of them had had diarrhea over the previous six months - literally every hand went up. I asked the same question three months later (after the water filters had been put in place), and only two people put up their hands. They were easily able to recognize the improvement in their lives and money could now be spent on education for their children or a multitude of other things that would improve their basic living. Most rural villagers make less than \$30 per year. The water filters cost \$65. This includes hygiene training, transportation, delivery and distribution to the villages. We generally provide water filter systems for every village in which we are doing major projects like schools, new water sources, school or village toilets etc.

The Bridge Fokes club concentrated on teaching bridge and bringing new and former players into duplicate bridge.

Richard's method of teaching made learning a complex game, very interesting and fun, and therefore his students kept coming back for more. A significant portion of London bridge players were brought into our game through Richard's efforts. Over 1000 people have taken bridge lessons and a significant portion of those continued to enjoy the game.

As a director, Richard was unique in many ways and you never dared to question his ruling. I found this out one day when Richard countered my call, which he perceived as frivolous, by dumping his bottle of cold water over my head.

Richard was also a pleasure to play with as a partner, or against when he was part of the opposition. He always had a smile on his face and story or lesson to offer.

Richard introduced his wife, Anna, to bridge. Anna was not only Richard's favourite bridge partner, but Anna soon became an accomplished player in her own right. Anna was also Richard's teaching assistant on the many bridge cruises where Richard was the bridge teacher and organizer.

Richard was a kind, generous and thoughtful manager of his bridge club. If someone was less fortunate and unable to pay, Richard would invite them to play for free. On Thursday evenings during the dinner game, Richard would often seek out people near the club and invite them in for dinner.

As an example of how thoughtful Richard was, a club member (Robert) with over 1000 MP had not enough gold masterpoints to become a Life Master. Rob's father, an avid bridge player, was very ill at the time. Richard got a team together (Anna, Rob and me) and we played in a Detroit Regional

team game. We not only got enough gold for Robert to become a Life Master, we won the event. On the way home, we stopped to eat and Rob called his dad to give him the good news. Rob's father was extremely happy and that was Rob's last conversation with his father, who passed away that night.

Richard, a friend to so many people, will be profoundly missed. Rest in peace, my special friend.
