



Editor's Note:

The Americans made it a clean sweep at the recent World Championships in Monte Carlo, winning the Bermuda Bowl, the Venice Cup and the Senior Bowl. They also won bronze in the Bermuda Bowl and Senior Bowl.

Canada's Women's Team, competing for the Venice Cup, was a model of consistency, having never been out of a qualifying spot for the Quarterfinals at any time. There we lost to the US2 team, which was in turn beaten by the US1 team, the eventual winners, in the semifinals. Congratulations to our locals Barb Clinton, Joan Eaton, Diana Gordon and Beverley Kraft.

The Canadian Open Team's Bermuda Bowl was a heartbreaker. They were 14 Victory Points ahead of US2, safely ensconced (we thought) in eighth place with one match of the round robin to go. Then, disaster! They were beaten 20-10 by a strong Polish team, themselves a qualifier. This allowed the US2 team the tiniest of openings, which they stormed through, winning a 25 VP blitz in their last match. For the Wolpert brothers, Darren and Gavin, and teammates, it was a disappointing finish to what had been a promising campaign.

2004 marks the fiftieth year of publication of what is now the Kibitzer. We started life as 2 1/2 pages of mimeographed foolscap in 1955. See the editorial history beginning on page 13.

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Unit 166 Elections

Unit 246 Constitution Update

This year our Board of Directors formed a committee to review and make proposed changes to our Unit's Constitution. This committee consisted of four members of the Board of Directors, with Craig Barkhouse as chairperson and Danny Schamehorn, Marilyn Kalbfleisch, and Janis Halbert as members.

The committee met and reviewed the current Unit Bylaws (which currently act as our Constitution), and came up with some changes to reflected our current state of affairs. We then presented these changes to our Board of Directors for feedback.

Now, we are presenting our proposed changes to you, our members, for consideration. The changes we are proposing include (but are not limited to):

- changing it from Bylaws to a Constitution (with a date added for reference);
- changing the Article on Dues from "Annual dues shall be in the amount fixed by the ACBL." to "The Board shall have no power to levy any special assessment, dues, or fees of its members.";
- changing when the Annual Meeting can be held from August-September to September-November;
- changing the number of Board Members from thirteen (13) to fifteen or sixteen (15 or 16) to be flexible. We also propose changing the requirement to have a designated number of people from our geographical areas as this was too restrictive when finding volunteers. Rather, we have added a statement under the Article entitled "Board of Directors" that reads, "Whenever running an election or filling vacancies by appointment, the Board shall ensure that each area of the Unit is represented by at least one (1) Director, unless there is no willing candidate.";
- changing the minimum number of meetings from four (4) to three (3) per year;
- removed the phrase "The Unit Board of Directors shall be the sole judge of its membership."; and
- adding the Secretary to the list of Officers.

Copies of the current Bylaws and of the proposed Constitution are available at our Unit Website http://members.rogers.com/unit246/index.htm or by contacting Janis Halbert at (705) 424-7948 or Paul Janicki at (905) 471-5461.We will be voting to accept/reject the proposed Constitution May 1, 2004, at the new Markham Sectional. All Unit 246 members are encouraged to attend this meeting.

Music was an important part her life and we could count on her to remember the lyrics to almost anything.

A love of books led Martha to volunteer with the London Public Library, where she was Chair of that Board when she died. She loved and respected the game of bridge, was always competitive, was always eager to learn, and believed firmly in fair play.

Martha made many friends through work and other activities, and these friendships were never sacrificed to the numerous demands on her time and attention. Her greatest passion was her family, her husband Dwight Bender, parents Don and Mary Tevlin, sister Joan, brother Mike and his wife Nicole and their two sons—Martha's beloved nephews Luke and Joe. She was so proud of all her family's achievements and loved sharing stories of their activities with her friends.

Martha made so many contributions to so many areas but her real legacy may be in what she has done to encourage and develop the volunteer and charitable communities of Southwestern Ontario.

50 Years and Counting!

How many of the faces on the cover did you recognize? If you know all those people, and what they have in common, it probably means you are at least middleaged! They are the former Editors of the Kibitzer (initially called the Bulletin). In chronological order (left to right and top row to bottom), they are: Bill Luscombe; Bob Chow; Bill Crissey; Sami Kehela; Doug Drew; Al Lando; Ray Lee; Robin Wigdor; Nancy Hart; John Carruthers; John Armstrong; and Susan Bracken.

In 1955, the Ontario Bridge League merged with ACBL Unit 166. Eric Murray was both President of the OBL and Merger Chairman of ACBL Unit 166. In his own words, "I called a meeting with myself, proposed the merger, and agreed unanimously with the proposal. I found I got along very well with myself!"

A new Bulletin was produced as a service to members, the first being two and half foolscap pages in length. Bill Luscombe, the Globe & Mail's Bridge Editor, and Bob Chow, the Editor of the Toronto Chinese community's newspaper, were installed as co-editors.

In the first issue of this new Bulletin, a report from the President of the new Ontario Unit of the ACBL (the same Eric Murray) stated, "There has been a tremendous load of work to avoid during the amalgamation and I have successfully avoided writing many important letters – apologies to the would-be recipients."

The first issue of the publication bearing the name "Ontario Kibitzer" appeared in 1959 under Bill Crissey's aegis. A kibitzer, it was noted, "is a person, although not a player, who offers suggestions and gratuitous advice to card-players." Editor Crissey implored his readers to send him interesting bridge anecdotes which would not "rate the attention of Messrs. Moyse or Frey," (The Bridge World and ACBL Bulletin Editors respectively). He claimed that, "we are not as discriminating or discerning."

In 1960, someone named Sam Kehela took over the editorship. He was distantly related to the Sami Kehela who played with Eric Murray so successfully for decades. Kehela reported on the 1960 Galt tournament as follows: "It was a bad day for the Pittsburgh Pirates (losing a World Series game to the New York Yankees) but a good one for the Toronto Bruces (Gowdy and Dwyer), who won the Open Pairs. On the very last board of the night they arrived at a contract of 6 No-Trumps which was a laydown for 9 tricks.Their confident bidding (?) certainly convinced the opponents, who gallantly sacrificed in 7 Spades. This wellintentioned manoeuvre was defeated to the tune of 1,500 points, which proved to be somewhat more than the value of the vulnerable game. The culprits fled, pursued wildly by runner-up Eric Murray clutching a lethal cigar in each hand."

In reporting on the 1961 Canadian Nationals, Kehela allowed as he gave "a trial to a rising young apprentice." He continues, "Now I am not an admirer of artificial conventions but when playing with the inventor of one, I am wont to humour him. Thus we had boldly written on our card 'Murray 2 Diamonds'."

Sami goes on to describe the bid's chief virtue as its never coming up and describes what happened when it did arise on the first board of the evening session. After the bidding had begun I No Trump by Murray, Pass by opponent, 2 Diamonds by Kehela (demanding Partner's better major), "This was followed by three contented passes," and Murray laid down his hand with a flourish and "expansively lit one of his cheap cigars. One look at my face, contorted with hate, stirred the chords of memory, and the Great Man was seen to blench."

Replying in an early issue to criticism that the Kibitzer was too Toronto-centric, Kehela responded that he had repeatedly asked for contributions from the hinterlands, resulting only in the receipt of a postal-order for two dollars!

Sam was replaced in 1964 by another distant relative, Sammy Kehela, who stuck it out until the end of 1968. As Doug Drew stated when he took over from Kehela, "His insistence on quality material and the consistent excellence of his own writing has made our magazine unique among unit publications in North America."

Drew took over in a caretaker role until a more permanent substitute could be found. That person was Al Lando, who began his stewardship in July 1969. Lando introduced a number of innovations during his tenure as editor. One of the more significant changes was to make the Kibitzer more of a magazine-style

publication than a newsletter, introducing colour card-stock covers and actively soliciting more articles.

It was also during Lando's time that the number of tournaments in Ontario increased dramatically from the handful per year in the Sixties. The Kibitzer increased in size as well, and the concept of a Managing Editor was introduced, Ray Lee becoming the first such in 1972. At the same time, the Ontario Kibitzer became the District 2 Kibitzer, reflecting the growth of bridge in the area and the formation of the all-Canadian Ontario-Manitoba District.

A District-wide publication was not supported by all Units in the District, however, and the decision was made to support the newly-formed Canadian Bridge Digest and cease publication after the January 1975 issue. Cost was cited as a problem as well.

The Ontario Unit (166) Board of Directors had taken a lot of heat from the membership when the Kibitzer folded, and it was revived as a Unit publication in the old newsletter format in August, 1976, with a staff of four: Robin Wigdor as Editor, Catherine Thorpe as General Manager, John Stevens as Production Manager, and 'Doc' Howes as Advertising Manager.

Beginning in 1977, eight pages were set aside for articles in an insert known as the Dorbitzer, a dorbitzer being, appropriately enough, a junior assistant to the chief kibitzer. Ray Lee was installed as Editor of the Dorbitzer. John Carruthers took over from Lee in late 1978.

Carruthers instituted an interview series, the first of which was with Eric Murray. That interview earned the ACBL award for "Article of the Year" and the Kibitzer

was awarded the ACBL "Unit Publication of the Year" kudos.

When Robin Wigdor was forced to resign in 1980 due to career pressures, the Unit inveigled Nancy Hart to take over. Nancy tendered her resignation a year later and John Carruthers was 'promoted' to Editor of the Kibitzer. No new Dorbitzer Editor was named and the insert was melded with the main publication.

John Armstrong took over as Editor in 1984 and ushered in many significant changes, the greatest of which were technological. The advent of desktop publishing and later, email, meant that all editorial duties could be performed on a computer, with the editor never leaving home or office.

Another Armstrong innovation was the numbering scheme of the Kibitzer, still in place today. Previously, there had been a new Volume I each time there was a significant change; for example from the Bulletin to the Kibitzer (1961) and from the Unit 166 to the District 2 Kibitzer (1973) and back to the Unit 166 Kibitzer (1976).

Armstrong reasoned that Volume I should be 1955, when the publication first

appeared, and each volume should be numbered consecutively after that, regardless of the political machinations present at the time. Thus Volume 31 (1985) followed Volume 9 (1984)! The current volume follows that scheme and is Volume 50.

Armstrong became the longest serving Editor, and imprinted the Kibitzer with his own brand of irony. He called his home office "World Headquarters" of the Kibitzer and installed his catchphrase, "You send; we print. You no send; we no print," on the cover. After 17 years of service, Armstrong retired to great fanfare and a presentation from the Unit 166 Board of Directors.

Susan Bracken was a departure from most previous Editors, in that Susan was a professional editor (Bob Chow and Ray Lee were the others), and only secondly a bridge player. All the others had been bridge players who did an editing job. Sadly, Bracken's run was short-lived, as she had to resign in 2003 due to ill health.

Which brings us to the current Editor, John Carruthers, recycled after 19 years on the sidelines. And how things have changed! The Kibitzer has expanded to 40-48 pages per issue, and it is produced entirely with desktop publishing software, then uploaded via the World Wide Web to a server at the printing house for production and mailing. Even the mailing list is an electronic file obtained from ACBL Headquarters in Memphis.

What do the next 50 years hold in store for the Kibitzer? Perhaps it will be fully electronic. Perhaps it will be in video format. Perhaps the reader will be able to design his or her own Kibitzer from the available material. One thing is certain: the readers of 2054 will find the Kibitzer of 2004 antiquated.



THE LEAD OUT OF TURN Debbie Bennett

Continuing the series on the courtesies, proprieties, and rules of the game.

Back to our bridge game. The Director has passed out the boards and instructs us to shuffle, deal and begin play. I'm not sure if everyone is aware of the fact that the Law Book (Law 6C) states:"A member of each side should be present during the shuffle and deal unless the Director instructs otherwise." It is in everyone's best interest to comply with this rule.

We are informed as to how many tables there are in play, the number of boards per round, the length of time allotted per round, and whether or not there will be a skip in the movement. We have 14 tables in our Section (A) and 13 tables in Section (B). There will be a skip after the 7th round in our section. When there is an even number of tables, there will generally be a skip (unless a Director uses a relay and by-stand). We will play all pairs except the one skipping us.

This is a regular game and there are no hand records. It is my experience that when hand records are used, e.g., club championships, STAC etc.), the most common cause of a fouled board is the hands being placed in the wrong pocket after the deal. Please check to make sure that the hand record faces the proper direction. The auction will be completely different if a hand pre-empts in front of an opening bid as opposed to overcalling with a pre-empt after an opening bid is made. At least the opener has begun to exchange information to his/her partner. ALL players are responsible for the boards made at their table and severe penalties can (and should be) issued to the offenders. I would be willing to bet that there would be a lot fewer instances of fouled boards if penalties were always enforced.

The first round is uneventful. The Director calls the round and asks the North/South players to move the boards. Pairs go up, boards go down. Players that have not finished playing the last board of a set are asked to pass boards they have completed in order to keep the game moving.

Our new opponents arrive, we say "hello" and take our respective hands out of the pockets. My partner and I have a delicate auction after an opening two club bid and reach a slam in clubs. Minor suit slams can be difficult to bid. No trump slams score higher and most pairs would opt to play in that strain. Minor suit slams score either very well or very poorly. Some people are of the opinion that there is no point in being in a minor-suit game. You rarely earn matchpoints so you might as well bid a slam, "JUST IN CASE IT MAKES". I have a long club suit but my partner will be declaring the hand since he bid clubs first.

My LHO forgets that his partner is on lead and tables his opening lead face up. It is imperative that the Director be summoned as soon as an irregularity has occurred. An opening lead out-of-turn is probably the most common reason a Director is summoned. We raise our hand and call "Director please." It is best not to call the Director on a first name basis. The opponents may think you are going to get a favourable ruling because you are a friend of the Director. It is for this same reason that you should NEVER MAKE YOUR OWN RULINGS! This is what Directors are paid for, to restore equity. Let them do their job.

There are five options under Law 54 (FACED OPENING LEAD OUT OF TURN):

I) Declarer may spread his hand and become dummy

2) Declarer may accept the lead and play will proceed in the proper rotation after s/he sees the dummy

3) Declarer may require the lead of the suit from the proper hand. The lead outof-turn is picked up.

4) Declarer may forbid the lead of the suit from the proper hand. Again, the lead out-of-turn is picked up.

5) Declarer may tell the proper hand to lead anything they want. The illegal card

becomes a major penalty card to be played at the first legal opportunity.

Further lead penalties could occur depending whether it is the offender or their partner gaining the lead while the penalty card is still tabled.

When the hand is over, we chalk up a score of +1370. It's too early to know how this board will score but I suspect it should be well above average. Playing in no trump will require some good guessing and a favourable opening lead whereas clubs was much simpler.

The night is young and we've already had some excitement. I wonder what the rest of the evening has in store!






