Sheardown will be inducted into the Hall in the Atlanta Summer NABC. Second, Gavin Wolpert and Vincent Demuy have won the National Open Swiss Teams in the Fall NABC in Orlando. And third, Eric Kokish has once again coached the Nickell Team to victory, this time in the Reisinger, again in Orlando. Congratulations to all of them.

What do Audrey Grant and Barbara Seagram have in common? More than you might think. Read about them on page 10.

Perhaps the Kibitzer will develop a reputation opposite to that of Sports Illustrated. An SI cover is viewed by many as the 'kiss of death' to a career - on the other hand, our Fall 2003 cover of the Kibitzer featured Gavin Wolpert and Vincent Demuy, who subsequently came second in the Spingold and won the National Open Swiss Teams. Toronto's Dynamic Duo

There is little question that the two most successful, dynamic entrepreneurs in the world of bridge are right here in Southern Ontario. It will come as no surprise to anyone who knows them that they are Audrey Grant and Barbara Seagram. That they have succeeded in what some still view as a male-dominated environment says a lot for their drive and determination. The two have the utmost respect for each other and their accomplishments.

Audrey came into the bridge world in the early 1970's where she encountered an ex-high school sweetheart, Ted Horning. They were soon an item, and as Ted was about to take the plunge into full-time bridge professionalism, Audrey joined in.



They opened a bridge club together, and although Audrey retained her profession as a high school teacher, she had been bitten by the bug.

Audrey's curriculum vitae currently reads like a compendium of jobs for bridge

professionals: bridge club owner, lecturer, columnist, publisher, author, cruise director, educational consultant, editor. Player? Although a Life Master, with all her business interests, Audrey has no time to play the game. She generates so much work that husband David Lindop had to give up his job as a computer professional some years ago in order to support the Grant Empire.

These days the empire includes Better Bridge, the umbrella firm that organises the lecture tours, the cruises, the magazine and everything else Grant. Business partnerships with the ACBL and Baron Barclay Books, the world's largest vendor of bridge supplies keep Audrey busier than ever. She has sold more bridge books than anyone whose name is not Sheinwold.

Barbara discovered bridge a little later, in

the Eighties, and soon became a force

with her dynamic teaching style. When the Kate Buckman Bridge Club became available. Barbara leapt at the chance to buy it, and has continued Kate's legacy of bringing thousands of new players to the game. Together with



husband Alex Kornel, Barbara continues to maintain Kate's as the most successful bridge club in Toronto. Uniquely, Barbara engages such illustrious player/writers such as Eddie Kantar, Marty Bergen, Bill Root and Mike Lawrence to come to Kate Buckman's for lectures.


Barbara has also taken up the pen, and together with such illustrious writers as David Bird, has published many successful bridge books. She is also a popular cruise host, escorting bridge trips all over the world every year.

Some of the similarities between these two extraordinary women are understandable: they are both driven, have little time to actually play bridge, have extensive business and teaching expertise, are incredibly diversified, and both maintain a workload few could match.

There are some eerie similarities however: both are married to husbands who prefer to work in the background and let their wives take centre stage; both have retained the name of their first husband; and both have adult children. They live in the same neighbourhood in north Toronto. Both have won Unit awards for distinguished service: Barbara won the Kate Buckman Award as the "person who contributes most to others' enjoyment of bridge," and Audrey will in 2005 be the initial recipient of the award named in her honour, the Audrey Grant Award, for "professional excellence."

We are fortunate to have them.

Percy Sheardown Elected to Bridge Hall of Fame

After years of quietly campaigning behind the scenes, Canadians were delighted to learn that one of their own, Toronto's Percy Sheardown, known to all as "Shorty," had finally been elected to the ACBL's Bridge Hall of Fame. Percy will be inducted into the Hall next summer in Atlanta, during the Summer North American Bridge Championships. The election to the Hall was long overdue in the opinion of many.

The announcement that Sheardown had won the von Zedtwitz Award was made in the Daily Bulletin of the Orlando NABCs on November 28. The von Zedtwitz Award is given to an outstanding player who has been out of the public eye for many years. Percy joins Eric Murray and Sami Kehela as the only Canadians to be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Sheardown was winning countless bridge events even before the advent of masterpoints. He won his first North American championship in 1936 - the Chicago, now known as the Reisinger, the toughest event in bridge. He became a Life Master in 1948, the first Canadian to make the grade.

"Percy Sheardown was the greatest player Canada ever produced," said Ralph Cohen of Memphis, a mighty good Canadian player in his own right. "Sheardown was one of the greatest players in the Thirties, Forties and Fifties. He was brilliant. He was also a fine teacher, and he was a mentor to many of Canada's leading players."

Cohen recalled kibitzing Sheardown in a Spingold in 1947. "He played with two women as partners, Charlotte Sidway and Mildred Cunningham. He was absolutely imperturbable. No matter what happened, he never made a wrong bid, never made a wrong play. His performance was awe-inspiring."

Sheardown represented Canada in two Olympiads - 1960 and 1968, winning the bronze medal on the latter occasion. He won two Chicagos, two Spingolds (back-to-back), the Life Master Pairs and the Fishbein Trophy plus many other titles back in the early years of contract bridge.

Most of Sheardown's triumphs in the Fifties and Sixties came with long-time partner Bruce Elliott, including the Spingolds, Chicago and thee Olympiads. Shorty died in 1993.

Doug Wilson's sudden and untimely death has deprived Unit 246 of one of its 'character' players...and a darn good one.

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Lessons from Early Retirement Andy Stark, Lethbridge, AB

This is a long-winded, hot-aired account of my 2000 year, during which I didn't work, got fat, and had a ball playing a ton of bridge. I am sure it is much too long to put in the Kibitzer, but perhaps there is one aspect or episode that might strike your fancy. (While it's not published here verbatim, this is pretty much as Andy wrote it. -Ed.)

Just over four years ago, on the third day of the National Open Swiss Teams in Birmingham, I picked up:

★ K 4

♥ Q | 8

♦ A Q 7

♣ A Q 9 7 3

My partner, John Duquette, opened the bidding with one heart. I responded two clubs and he re-bid two hearts. I raised to three hearts and he cue-bid four clubs. I bid four no trump, Roman Key Card in our methods, and John showed two controls without the heart queen. I then placed the contract by making what I thought was the 'normal bridge bid.'

A friend who was kibitzing at the time decided to leave the table just as we were replacing our bids back into the bid boxes. But before she left, before she saw the dummy or even the opening lead, she whispered, "But this is IMPs, Andy." Well, exactly, I thought. Plus scores are good at IMPs, too. Especially in slams.

I don't remember fretting about my decision at the time; it just felt like the right thing to do. I bid six no trump - not to be a hand hog - but to protect the spade king. Maybe the tip-off was that partner cue-bid clubs and not spades. It sure sounded to me like he held the king

of clubs along with his values in the red suits. If it were Challenge the Champs we'd be chalking up a perfect 12, wouldn't we?

It took a long time in the year 2000 to get to where it felt like there was a flow to my bridge game. I had decided to shirk all responsibilities and go 'on the trail' that year - kind of like replacing a year from my retirement and living it in my Thirties. I attended all the Nationals and numerous Regional tournaments throughout the US and Canada. The hardest part was constantly lining up partners, making travel accommodation arrangements, and above all, staying focussed at the table. I don't know how the pros do it.

Then again, my goal was different than theirs: "Neither an employer nor an employee be." I played every deal with a regular partner or friend, all in an attempt to wrest the Richmond Trophy (awarded annually to the top Canadian master point-winner in a calendar year) away from Ken Gee. Thanks to my friend Liz Randall who, luckily for me, saved over 50 of my emails from that year, I can now document some of those lessons learned during my Year on the Trail. Here are just a few.

I. Great plays can make you look silly. I once read about how Michael Rosenberg made an impossible three no trump contract. He had attacked his weakest suit in an attempt to feign strength, thereby prompting the opponents to break another suit for him. Duly impressed, I couldn't wait to give that play a try; and so, just a couple weeks later, playing with Don Brock in a club game, I found myself in three no trump, looking at only eight tricks.

Mulling over the whereabouts of trick nine, the Rosenberg Ruse finally dawned

on me, so with ten-five of hearts in dummy opposite the jack-nine-three in hand, I boldly called for the ten of hearts. My LOL RHO pounced on that little ol' ten with her big bad ace and proceeded to cash four more heart tricks to scupper the contract. Donny B took it as well as he could have; in fact, he still loves to tell that story today, even to the good folks who have already heard it seventeen times.

2. Bridge is a game of logic. Playing with one of my all-time favorite partners, John Rayner, I needed to play the following trump holding for two losers: Q J 8 7 5 3 opposite 9 6 2. Due to entry problems, I needed to get the trumps going at trick two by playing from my hand. I had never encountered this problem before, so I felt satisfied in working out to play a low trump from hand towards the nine, thus catering for a singleton ace or king. I was

prepared to look silly if the ten were singleton but the odds were 2:1 in my favor. It didn't matter what I did if the trumps were divided two-two, so I felt pretty good about my play.

Well, after playing the three from hand at trick two, it went four-two-ten. I won trick three and played a trump from hand. It went king-six-show out. What a putz. Rayner couldn't restrain himself from one of his famous vociferous smoke-tinged chortles, and this suit combination play became the focus of the post mortem in the bar afterwards. If I recall, the final consensus was: "Yes, bridge is a game of logic, but . . . just do the right thing."

3. Do the right thing. While playing against two friends of mine, John Ross and Martin Hunter, in the Toronto Hart House Sectional, I got a chance to figure out a cute little maneuver with this trump

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combination: Q J 10 8 6 3 opposite A 4. Needing to play for no losers, I started with the ten from hand, and Hunter immediately covered with the king. I won the ace in dummy and finessed for the nine on the way back to my hand. Hunter showed out. It was especially rewarding to win 12 imps with this result. The declarer at the other table had tabled the queen so he didn't know to finesse for the nine on the way back to his hand. And there were no trump coups happening either.


4. Never knife. In a Montréal Regional, I played with former Bols winner Bernard Marcoux. We had arranged to play in a Swiss Teams with a pair from Ottawa, but the morning of the event we got cut – 'knifed,' as it were. Luckily, we got added to a team-of-four that was happy to have us. Even after losing two matches in the first half our team found itself contending for the win after reeling off the next four matches.

Any bridge player who has ever been around knows what's coming next: we drew the knifers in match seven. This was the key deal.

Bernard sat west and was on lead against three no trump. Clubs had been opened on his right, hearts bid on his left. He chose the passive lead of the heart seven. It went four-five-jack. Declarer played a club to the queen and a club back to his king. Bernard won the ace of clubs, cashed the ace of hearts and exited with a heart. Declarer won in dummy perforce and cashed the thirteenth heart. I pitched a diamond while low spades were discarded by South and West.

Next, declarer tried a spade to the queen in his hand but Bernard won the king and exited with a spade. My jack forced the ace. Declarer cashed a club, got the bad news and was soon conceding down one.

At the other table, our teammate, Nicolas l'Ecuyer, declared three no trump from the North side. A low diamond was led. Nic won the ace and played the queen of clubs. When it held, he played the queen of hearts. It held too. He then played a low heart to the jack, which lost to west's ace. A heart was returned. Nic popped the king (good move), dropping the ten, and then he cashed the last heart. East pitched a diamond, dummy a club and West a small spade. Nic then played a club to the king, which lost to the ace and back came a diamond. Nic won the diamond king. Needing three tricks and with the lead in North, here was the fivecard end position:



After much thought, l'Ecuyer made the only winning series of plays: spade to the ace, jack of clubs cashed, club exit.

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North was end-played, forced to give a trick to the queen of spades at trick thirteen. Bravo.

Thanks to this result we went on to win the match by 7 - and really, what better retribution than a starkly served stripsqueeze and endplay? Alas, we did not triumphantly go on to win the Regional event. We placed second, but it sure felt like a win. Smiles and handshakes all around: a combination of our six-match winning streak and yes, just a smidgeon of *Schadenfreude*.

5. Bid 'em up. Another great deal with Rayner came up in a Niagara Falls Regional. As dealer, I picked up:

♠ —

♡ A K Q J 10 9 6 4

◇ —

♠ K O 9 7 3

What would be your choice of opening bids? It's IMP scoring and everybody's vulnerable. I chose six hearts. My LHO overcalled six spades and Rayner

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doubled. We beat it two tricks. At the other table, the player in my seat also opened six hearts, but my teammate, Doug Ross, doubled. Then he and his partner, Danny Boye, proceeded to collect 500 themselves. Team total: a cool grand.

6. Go with the flow. By the time the 2000 Fall Nationals came around I was feeling both mentally drained and yet, conversely, sharp as a tack. How else to explain it? Battle weary, but ready to go. Duquette and I had teamed up with Doug Heron and Bob Gwirtzman and entered the Open Swiss. We survived the first cut by finishing in the top ten the first day. We fell back a bit on the second day but managed to hang on by winning our final match by I IMP. Starting the third day in thirteenth place we drew the team we had finished against the evening before.

But instead of eking out another I IMP victory we won by 46.

I will never forget comparing scores at the end of round two, a match we handily won by 35 IMPs for another 20 Victory Points. As I left my team to agree on the score with our opponents, I heard Gwirtzman utter in his quintessential Brooklyn accent, "This is scary."

Scary is right because round three saw us draw Benito Garozzo et al. But we gained two 10 IMP swings, lost an IMP on another board and pushed the other four for a 20-1 VP win.

What a head rush - we went from thirteenth to second in three moves; it's like stampeding into the enemy's headquarters, guns-a-blazing, finding the general with his knickers down and not having a clue what to do. Unfortunately for us, we freaked out. In our fourth match we lost to the leaders, (got thrashed actually). But in the evening, a tie, a small loss and another win gave us hope of finishing fairly high up in the standings of a National event. If we could blitz our final opponents we could finish as high as third.

We drew George Rosencranz and a bevy of professional players as opponents for the last match, so it looked bleak. But again, Duquette and I were playing with confidence and our teammates were bringing back solid cards. A few boards into our match, Duquette opened one heart with the west hand and we bid up to six no trump:

♠ J 8	♠ K 4
♡ A K 10 7 4 3	♡ Q J 8
♦ J 2	♦ A Q 7
♣ K 10 4	♣ A Q 9 7 3

The opening lead was made and pretty soon I was claiming twelve tricks. Sure enough a heart slam would have been doomed by a spade lead; and that is exactly what the Brooklyn Bomber found at the other table to beat six hearts. Thanks to this result we won our last match.

It wasn't the first-place finish we were hoping for, (dreaming for actually), but it was a stellar day and we finished on a high note—a solid fourth overall. The field was rife with professionals and excellent players. My Year on the Trail was pretty much over, save for a Regional in California, and I would go on to my second consecutive second-place finish in the Richmond race, again to Kenny Gee.

If I could offer one last piece of advice, something I learned during 2000, it would be this:

7. Play up. While there are days where you might fear the young hotshot or the wily veteran who always seems to deal you nothing but bottom boards, you will never feel the pure joy that bridge has to offer unless you get in there with the lions and offer them the chance to take a piece of you; because on some days those lions aren't lions - they're pussycats - and you will take a piece of them. Give yourself a chance to feel the adrenaline rush.

Peter Mollemet 1943 – 2004

Longtime ACBL employee Peter Mollemet died of heart failure Nov. 18 in Memphis. The 61- year-old Mollemet, who had battled heart problems for years, arrived for work at ACBL Headquarters Thursday morning complaining of shortness of breath. He was taken to a Memphisarea hospital, where he died shortly thereafter.

The unexpected death sent shock waves through the ACBL family, particularly in the office at Memphis, where Mollemet was well liked for his dry wit and easy-going manner.

Mollemet was best known to ACBL members for his decades of service as a tournament director, especially in District 5 (western New York state and Pennsylvania, northeast Ohio and northern West Virginia) and District 2. His directing career began in 1975. He achieved the rank of National Tournament Director in 1988 and was the area field representative for Districts 2, 4, 5, 11 and 12.

Mollemet's role with the ACBL changed in March 2001, when he relocated to Memphis from his native New York to become the Internet Services manager. He was instrumental in helping to organize the enormous content of the ACBL web site. Mollemet's dedication to his work was evident even as he departed for the hospital, enjoining fellow employees to make sure the Orlando Daily Bulletins were taken care of. Tributes from around the ACBL poured in, and many recalled Mollemet's preferred style of humor as the intelligent wise-guy.

Henry Cukoff: "My good friend Peter died today, the reason still unknown. As always, he had kept whatever was bothering him a secret. That was typical Peter."

Sol Weinstein: "Peter and I practically lived together during the late Eighties and the early Nineties. The masterpoint system needed fixing, and we did the fixing at my house."

Jonathan Steinberg: "He was super reliable. If you sent him a problem in the evening, you'd have your answer in the morning — every time."

You Can Fool Some of the People David Lindop

(From Better Bridge - reprinted by permission of the Editor, Audrey Grant. Continuing the series aimed at newer players.)

We may be model citizens in our daily lives, but when we sit down at the bridge table we need to have a little larceny in our hearts. Sure it's fun to bid to a sound contract and make it using good technique, but there can be an added thrill in getting to a poor contract and making it by pulling the wool over our opponents' eyes.

We can't usually afford to be deceptive during the bidding or defence because we may mislead our partner. When it comes to declarer play, however, we can have a clear conscience. "One of declarer's greatest assets is that he has no partner," declared Victor Mollo and Nico Gardener in Card Play Technique.

Let's look at how we can lead the opponents astray, starting with this three no trump contract where West leads the four of hearts to the jack.

The good news is that we get to win the first trick with the heart queen. The bad news is that we still need a ninth trick. That's easy enough to develop in spades, but if we lead the spade king, East will grab the ace and return his partner's suit.

West can take enough heart winners to defeat the contract.

How can we persuade East not to take the ace of spades? A common guideline for the defenders is second hand low (See Winter 2004 Kibitzer - Ed.). If we lead a spade from dummy, perhaps it won't be so obvious for East to hop up with the ace of spades. After winning the queen of hearts, we should play a low diamond to dummy and lead a spade toward our hand. If East plays low, we win a spade trick and scamper home with our contract.


Which spade should we lead from dummy? The ten has a lot of appeal. It adds to the illusion that we are taking a finesse rather than trying to steal our ninth trick.

Will East be fooled by our little deception? Who knows? For all he knows, we may have to guess spades for our contract.

Here are some tips for making deceptive plays:

- I. Always play confidently. Do not look worried or make negative remarks about the bidding.
- 2. Make the deceptive play as early as possible. Don't give the defenders a chance to exchange a lot of information., or to figure out how many tricks you have.
- 3. Try to create an illusion. The art of being deceptive is to hide our real purpose by making the defenders think we are doing something else. Like a magician, we want to divert the audience's eyes at the crucial moment. On our example deal, by going to dummy and leading a spade, we hope to create the illusion in East's mind that we are planning to take a finesse.

Let's look at another example. This time we find ourselves in four spades with four top losers. Fortunately, West leads the four of diamonds:




There's not much we can do about the three club losers, so we need to get away without losing a heart trick. We could play three rounds of diamonds to discard one of dummy's hearts, but that won't do any good. Now the opponents will be sure to take their ace of hearts and wait around for their club winners.

Our best chance is to win the diamond lead and play a low heart. If West plays low, we win dummy's queen, draw trumps, and now play our other diamond winners to discard dummy's other heart. We can then ruff our remaining heart losers in dummy.

Can we lull West into playing low on the first round of hearts? Maybe, but we have to be careful to win the diamond lead with the king, not the ace or queen. If we play the ace, West may place East with the kingqueen-jack, thinking his lead has struck gold, and rise with the heart ace to continue diamonds. And if we play the queen, West will know we have the ace and king as well (East would play third-hand-high on our lead).

Let's see if we can work some magic on the next deal. (See top of next coulmn.)

Once again we reach a contract with four top losers. This time it's four hearts, and West appears to have the defence off to a good start by leading the king of clubs. How can we throw in a little misdirection?



If we follow with the three of clubs, West will take the ace next and we'll have no way of avoiding two spade losers. Instead we should try the effect of dropping the queen of clubs at trick one. West may be aware that we could be making a deceptive play, but may be reluctant to play the ace of clubs for fear of our ruffing it and setting up dummy's jack.

Will it work? It sure can't hurt to try. If West takes the bait and switches to a diamond, we are home free.

On this next deal, West leads the queen of hearts against our three no trump. Do we have any chance?

We have eight top tricks and it's hard to imagine where our ninth is coming from. West's lead makes it unlikely that hearts are breaking favourably. Should we run our eight winners and hope the opponents discard poorly?

No way, not when we can lay a trap for West. Instead of winning the first trick, why not try the effect of ducking the heart in both hands. Look at it from West's point of view. He may belive his partner has the ace of hearts and he has made the killing lead. If West continues the attack on hearts, we'll surprise him by taking three heart tricks and nine tricks in all.

If West doesn't fall for our little subterfuge and switches to a spade, we'll go down an extra trick, but that will be nothing compared to the euphoria we'll feel if West does make a misstep.

Poor West. It's lucky for us that we haven't been the one holding those hands against a declarer with a larcenous streak. Although I'm certain we wouldn't have been fooled...at least not all of the time.
