NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

August 31, 2009

The aims and objectives of the Unit are as follows:

- 1 To preserve and promote the best interests of competitive contract bridge.
- 2 To co-operate with and assist the A.C.B.L. in the promoting and conducting of bridge tournaments.
- 3 To prescribe rules of eligibility for participation in tournaments held under its auspices and to deal with reports of dishonest, unethical or improper conduct of participants in such tournaments and to take appropriate disciplinary action.
- 4 To promote the development and organization of affiliated clubs within the Unit.
- 5 To promote and support the A.C.B.L. education programme within the Unit.
- 6 To conduct such other activities as may be in keeping with its principle objectives.

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles and reflect the following policies:

- a) Unit 166 of the A.C.B.L. follows the deferral method of fund accounting for revenue.
- b) Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost and are amortized on a straight-line basis over 5 years.
- c) Volunteers contribute services at all Unit run bridge tournaments. Because of the difficulty of determining their market value, contributed services are not recognized in the financial statements.
- d) There are no related party transactions.
- e) Unit 166 of the A.C.B.L. is a non-profit entity under the Income Tax Act (Canada) and, as such, is exempt from income taxes under section 149(1)(f).

NOTE 2 - SHORT-TERM INVESTMENT

The short-term investments consist of TD Canada Trust Guaranteed Investment Certificates that mature on September 30, 2009 and June 13, 2011.

The suspense account represents unreconciled differences from tournaments during the year. The differences are still being investigated.

NOTE 5 - ASSOCIATION RESERVES

In 1973 Unit 166 decided to establish a Reserve Fund into which the Associations in the Unit would deposit their excess surplus funds over an agreed amount. These funds are to be invested and held to credit of the various Associations. The Fund was established in 1974. At August 31 the fund was made up as follows:

LIBBY BRAWN -MY STORY

Libby Brawn has been the driving force of Unit 249 for two decades. Her board-mates wanted Libby to be recognized publicly for all her hard work and entusiasm over the years.



Growing up, the laughter from the room where my parents were playing bridge always made it sound like terrific fun. It wasn't until my 20s however that I started to play. Arriving in London with a job and a place to stay, but knowing no one, I joined the University Women's Club. Bridge soon became both a great way to make new friends and one of many activities I came to really enjoy.

In 1971, a novice duplicate game was started by Keith Moses at the Y. No experienced duplicate players were allowed and I was hooked, or to use my husband's

expression, obsessed. As a stayat-home mom with three small boys to deal with all day, playing bridge in the evening became my main recreation, or perhaps my escape!

In addition to my regular games and tournaments, when possible, my involvement in Duplicate also came to include administration and teaching. I became a Certified Club Director and worked two or three times a week. I was given permission to hold Intermediate/ Novice tournaments for those with up to 300 points. It took a long time for me to become a Life Master as my opportunities for gold points were quite limited.

When Unit 249 was formed in 1991, I was asked to be the Corresponding Secretary and continued in that role until 2008. During those years, I eventually held all the Board positions except Treasurer, When London had their first Regional in the 1970's, I was involved with the prizes, and continued to be for several years until I became the treasurer. While a member of the District 2 Board. I had the honour of being both President and the Coordinator for the Grand National Teams, I was elected to the Board of Governors of the ACBL and was most recently appointed to the National Charity Committee.

My first teaching job was for Fanshawe College in 1975 and it was quite an experience. The

lessons were all out of town at night in small centers, and the places chosen were not especially suited to teaching. We didn't even have card tables! Not having taught before, I found it both challenging and rewarding, and really enjoyed seeing others discover their passion for the game that I enjoyed. Because the lessons were three hours long we all needed to break them up, so I took lemonade in hot weather and cocoa in cold.

After taking Audrey Grant's lessons on how to teach bridge and implementing her books, teaching became much easier and I'm sure my lessons became more effective! It was gratifying to have people come back after taking the Club series and want more. I eventually became an ACBL 3-Star Accredited Teacher. Over the years, I have taught for the City of London Parks and Recreation, Western Alumni, the London Hunt Club, The Bridge Fokes, and Fanshawe College extension.

I was privileged to join the American Bridge Teacher's Association, ABTA, where they gave me the rank of a Master Teacher. Their conventions drew the best players and teachers in North America. Once again, not content to just join, I became the Secretary.

2010 AUDREY GRANT AWARD WINNER ENID ROITMAN

Enid retired in 1998 after a thirtyfour year teaching career during
which she taught primary grades
and English as a Second
Language to both children and
adults. For twelve years she taught
bridge as an extra-curricular
activity to students at West Prep
Public School. During this time she
organized "Bridge Buddy
Tournaments" in which kids were
paired with experienced players for
an afternoon of duplicate bridge.

Enid is grateful to the many bridge players, including many of Toronto's top players, who eagerly volunteered to play with the kids. These tournaments, held at the Kate Buckman Bridge Studio or at the January Sectional and the Easter Regional, also included children of Toronto area bridge players and students from other schools.

Enid was the Education Liaison for Unit 166 for seven years and the Tournament Chair for the January Sectional for six years. She was on the planning committee for the last two Nationals held in Toronto. She was the Volunteer Chair and ran the Partnership Desk at the Royal York for both of these tournaments.

Since 1998 Enid has been teaching bridge primarily at the Fairlawn Neighbourhood Centre as well as a number of private groups. She also spends several months each year teaching bridge on cruise ships.

In 1996 Enid was appointed to the ACBL Goodwill Committee and was the 1998 winner of the Kate Buckman Award. She is honoured and thrilled to be the recipient of the 2010 Audrey Grant Award.

2010 KATE BUCKMAN AWARD WINNER HAZEL WOLPERT

Hazel Wolpert is this year's recipient of the Kate Buckman Award. This award is given annually by Unit 166 to honour someone who has given significantly to the world of bridge. Last year, Hazel won the Audrey Grant Award for excellence in teaching bridge.

Hazel began her bridge career when she was seven years old and was playing duplicate seriously by the age of fifteen. When she moved to Canada from Johannesburg as a young adult she began teaching bridge for the board of education. Hazel shared her passion for the game when she offered to teach a group of kids how to play. Her own son, Darren,

was in the group and soon became an avid bridge player. Her other son, Gavin, was not interested and vowed never to play bridge - he is now a bridge professional. Hazel continued teaching bridge and influencing many, many players who are now enjoying the game. She gives generously of her time by volunteering to give miniseminars at bridge tournaments throughout the province.

Eventually, Hazel opened her own bridge studio and it is now one of the most successful clubs in North America. Other highlights of her career are:

- winning the Canadian Women's Team championship and going on to represent Canada in Turkey in the 2004 World Bridge Team Olympiad
- having both her boys Darren and Gavin represent Canada on the same team
- proud mom when Gavin and Jenny (his wife) won the Blue Ribbon Pairs in 2005
- proud grandmother of Danielle Allie Wolpert who will no doubt be an international champion before too long. She is already on tour.

Hazel's students say that she is a kind, giving, knowledgeable teacher who is ready to help anyone at any time. She is often called upon to be a guest teacher and is always willing to do so.

Hazel is indeed a very worthy recipient of this award.

AN INTERVIEW WITH FRED GITELMAN

Fred Gitelman, formerly of Toronto, now residing in Las Vegas, is one of the most famous bridge personalities in the world. He is the inventor and developer of BBO (Bridge Base Online), the premier free web site that broadcasts top bridge events from around the world.

Fred has also had, at the relatively young age of 45, a fabulous playing career, with wins in the U.S.Team Trials, the IOC Grand Prix, the Cavendish Invitational, the Forbo-Krommenie Nations Cup, and silver medals in the Bermuda Bowl and World Junior Team Championship, as well as numerous CNTC and NABC wins. Most recently, he won the Jacoby Swiss Teams at the Spring Nationals in Reno.

As if this were not enough success, Fred has also been named the ACBL's Honorary Member of the Year and the International Bridge Press Association's Personality of the Year.

Kib: Your first taste of international success came at the World Junior Championship in 1991, where Canada came in second to the USA. At that time, did you intend to make a career of bridge?

FG: I actually have two different bridge-related careers: writing bridge software and playing bridge professionally. In 1991 I had just started working full time on writing bridge software, and I was already certain that I wanted to make it into a real career (provided that I could actually make a living doing it, which was far from certain at the time).

Playing bridge professionally has never been anything more than a part time job for me. Almost all of the professional bridge I have played over the years has been in the context of playing on sponsored teams in the big events at the NABCs. I didn't start doing that until 1997, and in 1991 I did not foresee myself ever becoming so 'serious' about competitive bridge, let alone getting paid to play on contending teams in the toughest events. I suspect that was because I am not a particularly competitive person by nature. Also, it did not occur to me that I was anywhere close to being good enough to be paid serious money to play.

Kib: In a 2002 interview, you stated that creating BBO was a bit of an accident. Tell us about this 'accident'.

FG:From 1991, when I started writing bridge software, through 2001, when the accident now known as BBO took place, my company derived all of its income from selling educational CD-ROMs for bridge. It occurred to me that we might eventually end up selling just the data files for download over the Internet (instead of CDs). This would have several advantages for both our company and our customers, but I had to learn how to write a program that would send messages over the Internet to make it possible to do this properly.

The first thing I did was create what became the "Bridge Library" on BBO. I started adding features - online bridge, chat rooms, VuGraph theatre, etc. That is how BBO was born. It took only about two months to get all the basic functionality in place, and ever since then my partners and I have been improving it - a process that I fully expect to continue 'forever'. Now, however, nine years later, the vast majority of the money we make is through the \$I entry fees that people pay to play in tournaments on our site.

Kib: In the years since then, what have been the major changes to BBO?

FG: Our company has changed a lot. In the beginning the only people working for our company were my wife, Sheri Winestock, and myself. Now there are dozens of people from all over the world who work for us. We are now a real and highly-successful business. I certainly did not foresee this happening - my original

hope was to do nothing more than make enough money selling downloadable content to pay our bills.

We have brought on new business partners over the years. Uday Ivatury came on board as a volunteer programmer shortly after BBO was launched. Sheri and I liked Uday so much and were so impressed by his work that we made him a partner. In 2007 Bill Gates, Sharon Osberg, and David Smith became our business partners by investing in our company.

The number of people using BBO has grown steadily (and continues to grow). I remember how excited we were the first time 100 people were logged in at once. Nowadays over 100,000 people log in to BBO at least once in a typical day, and there are over 16,000 people logged in simultaneously at each day's peak. BBO has members from just about every country in the world. We set a new record last fall when over 23,000 were logged in at once during our vugraph broadcast of the Finals of the Bermuda Bowl.

Our software itself has changed a great deal over the years. Some

highlights include the introduction of tournaments (2003), heavy integration of robot bridge-playing software (2006), and the introduction of new client software that runs in a web browser (2008).

I am happy to say that our core mission, to create a high-quality free online bridge site where players from all over the world are welcome to play, watch, socialize, and learn, has not changed. Something else that has not changed is that I still love the work I do - I have the best possible job in the world for me.

Kib: What were your reasons for leaving Toronto for Las Vegas?

FG: By the time the late 1990s rolled around, I realized that I had the ability to compete effectively at the highest level in bridge and some of the major American sponsors were interested in having me play on their teams. Although our CD-ROM business was generating a good income for Sheri and me, the absurd sums of money that I was being offered to play at the NABCs had the potential to make a big difference to our standard of living. But in order to really make this happen, I was going to have to start living in the USA (so that I would be eligible to play with my sponsored team in the US Team Trials). The concept of doing this had further appeal since, at the time, it was an important personal goal for me to try to win a World Championship. I thought that rated to be easier if I was playing for the USA.

So my move to the USA was mostly about bridge. Sheri and I chose Las Vegas for several reasons: sunny weather, no state income taxes, we had some friends in that city, and good real estate values (this was just before prices started to inflate).

In case some of your proud Canadian readers consider me a traitor for this move, I would like them to know that I was cheering (loudly) when Canada won the hockey Gold Medal in the Vancouver Olympics! Sheri and I are very happy living in Las Vegas, but I suspect we will always consider ourselves to be Canadians.

Kib: Your Canadian team came second in the Bermuda Bowl in Beijing in 1995. Bobby Wolff has stated that Canada was the best team in the event that year, despite losing to his team in the final. Did you consider keeping that team together and trying to bring a World Championship to Canada with that team?

FG: We did try that. The same team played in the 1996 Olympiad in Rhodes. I went into that event full of hope for a Canadian Gold Medal, but for whatever reason none of our three partnerships was able to play at the same level we had achieved in Beijing. No doubt it was our NPC John Gowdy's fault (just kidding, John). Minor variations of our Beijing team performed poorly in the next few CNTCs. The magic was gone.

By 2000, I had made up my mind that I was going to try my luck playing

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bridge in the USA. This was not an easy decision to make. Eric Kokish, George Mittelman, and Joey Silver were (and still are) among my closest friends. They were responsible for originally recognizing my talent and giving me a chance to play in the big leagues. They also served as my mentors - much of what I think I know about bridge now came from these three outstanding players. It was not easy for me to abandon them.

I did get a chance for one last hoorah playing for Canada when Joey and I were added to an Alberta-based team to play in the IOC Grand Prix at the 2000 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City. Only ten teams were invited to play in that event and, on paper at least, Canada was probably considered one of the weakest of those teams. But somehow we managed to shock everyone (including ourselves) with a strong performance to qualify out of the round robin. The shock-level kept increasing when we beat heavilyfavoured teams in both the semi-final (Italy) and final (Poland) to bring the Gold Medal home for Canada.

That great moment gave me some second thoughts about the move I was about to make, but so far I have no real regrets.

One of the things I miss most about Canada is Toronto's amazing bridge community. There are a lot of very good players living in Las Vegas, but the local clubs and tournaments here are nothing like what I became accustomed to in Toronto.

Kib: How did your relationship with Bill Gates develop?

FG: One day (in 1997) I received a phone call. "This is Bill Gates' estate manager calling." My first thought was that George Mittelman was playing a joke on me. Then it occurred to me that perhaps Bill had died and I had somehow become entitled to a share of his estate. That was my own joke on me.

What this was really all about was that Bill and Warren Buffett were about to take a vacation on a private train. They were planning on playing bridge on one leg of the trip (from Bozeman, Montana to Denver) and wanted to know if I was available to be the fourth in their game. Warren already knew who I was because he had enjoyed using some of the bridge CD-ROMs that I had created - I believe he was the one who suggested me as their fourth, I knew and liked Sharon Osberg, the other player in the game, through bridge - Sharon is a top-level player. Sharon was kind enough to vouch for me personally, hence my invitation to play in their game.

The next day I received a (first class of course!) airline ticket to Bozeman, got on the train, and played bridge day and night for the next couple of days. When the train arrived in Denver, I headed home to Toronto. Apparently Bill, Warren, and Sharon found me to be a suitable fourth as this was the first of many times that this group played bridge together (at Bill's house, in some tournaments, on the Internet, and in various other random places).

I have become good friends with both Bill and Warren over the years. I must say that I am rather fortunate to have these two guys to draw on for business advice! When I started playing bridge way back in the early I 980s at Ted Horning's club in Thornhill, I doubt anyone would have imagined that it would eventually lead to me hanging out with these truly historic figures. Life sure can be strange.

Kib: What is the current status of the Fred Gitelman/Bill Gates/BBO tie-in?

FG: Bill is one of the shareholders in Bridge Base Online, Ltd. (the name of the company that runs BBO). He is an ideal business partner, always being there to offer great advice when we ask for it and occasionally when he thinks we need it, but never forcing the issue. Every few months we send Bill a cheque that represents his dividends. Of course the money BBO generates doesn't mean anything in the grand scheme of things to Bill, but I'm very glad that the investment he and Sharon and David made has so far turned out to be a very good one for everyone.

Kib: Your partnership with Brad Moss has been one of the most successful in the USA in the past decade. Tell us what each of you brings to the partnership.

FG: Brad and I are two very different people. I have a strong tendency to be quiet and not particularly sociable, while Brad is the life of the party. These traits are part of our natural bridgepersonalities as well - Brad is an extremely aggressive player who has a great will to win while I am a conservative player. We represent two very different extremes, both as people and as bridge players.

One reason I think we work well together as a partnership is that we have both been moderating influences on each other. Our bridge styles and personality types are still very different, but we have both moved somewhat toward the middle as a result of our association.

Our partnership was fortunate in that we see more or less eye-to-eye in terms of bidding theory. We have worked hard on our system, but this process wasn't that much of a struggle since we tend to agree when it comes to matters of system. We have also been fortunate to have had excellent and personable teammates over the years. Brad and I are close friends and we share many common interests other than bridge.

Kib: You and Brad recently formed a team with three other players from the 1991 World Junior Championship (Diamond-Platnick, Hampson) and another junior (Eric Greco) who came along a bit later. Tell us about this team and your hopes for it.

FG:This really is a dream team for me as it is made up of the best American and Canadian players of my generation. Besides that, my teammates are all my friends.

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Aside from a hopeless result in last year's USA Team Trials, 2009 was an excellent first year for our team. We came 2nd in the Vanderbilt, 3rd/4th in the Spingold, and 6th in the Reisinger. However, winning a World Championship is really what we are after. We will get a chance to do that later this year in Philadelphia. If that doesn't work (or even if it does!), we hope to qualify to represent the USA in the 2011 Bermuda Bowl.

Kib: In your opinion, who are currently the best pairs in world?

I think the two best pairs right now are Meckstroth-Rodwell and Balicki-Zmudzinki. Probably it is only fair to include an Italian pair in the top three, but to me there is no clearly best pair on the Italian team - any of their three

pairs is capable of being the best in the world on a given day.


Kib: Tell us about your favourite hand of all time.

You saved the toughest question for the end! No great triumphs from major tournaments really stand out, but here is something closer to home.

I played this hand in a Toronto Sectional in the early 1980s before I became a Life Master. My partner was Roz Keri (Citron). I believe something fundamental changed about my brain chemistry as a result of this hand - I had what I think psychologists would call a "Gestalt experience".

Before this hand was played I lacked the ability to visualize all four hands in my head, but after I forced myself to figure out the end position that I reached, all of a sudden I could see the light. Really!



Partner had a right to expect me to hold six hearts on this auction and today I'd either pass one spade or rebid one no trump. But what did I know, I was I 8 years old. West led the two of diamonds and I ducked to East's king. He continued with the diamond queen and I won the ace. I thought if I'm ever going to win a trick with the jack, it was right now, so I led another diamond and East, hoping his partner held the jack, discarded a spade.

I tried a club to the king and a spade to the king, both winning, and led a second club. West won the ace and played a spade to East's ace. East returned the heart four and I put in the eight, losing to the nine. West exited with his last diamond and I ruffed after East pitched a club. These cards were left:



There was only one card in my hand that would allow me to take three more tricks to make my contract — that was the ace of hearts. When I played it and followed with a club, West was helpless. He discarded and I won the queen and then any card off the dummy allowed me to 'finesse' for East's jack of hearts.

Intermediate/Novice Corner...



THINKING BRIDGE: Cooperative Defence By Eddie Kantar

Bidding commentary: East is not strong enough, nor does he have the right shape, to make a takeout double of two spades. West has the right distribution to double two spades

(short spades, plus four hearts), but is not strong enough. With another king, even a queen, West could chance a takeout double, particularly at tournament bridge, where you compete like a tiger on nearly every board.

Lead commentary: In order to lead an honour against a suit contract, you only need the next lower honour. Against no trump the six of hearts is the proper lead from the West hand. To lead a jack playing standard leads, the suit should be headed by the AJIO(x), KJIO(x), JIO9(x) or JIO8(x).

Play commentary: East is marked with the ace-queen of hearts from the lead, and as South is no rush to see East win and return a trump, South plays low from dummy.

Defensive commentary: East, who has dummy's long club suit all bottled up, knows that this dummy is useful for only one thing – ruffing hearts. East overtakes the heart jack with the queen and leads a spade. If South ducks, West wins and returns a second spade. When South plays a second heart, East wins and plays a third spade.

Declarer stands a good chance of losing seven tricks against this defence. When West, looking at those scary clubs, sees East shift to a trump, a passive return, East is telling West (and South, for that matter): "Partner don't worry about clubs, let's stop heart ruffs in dummy. Our diamond tricks aren't going anywhere. Patience."

Ken Turner is one of Canada's most energetic finest and organizers of duplicate bridge. Ken enlisted in the Royal Canadian Air Force in 1942 and remained there until 1959. His last posting before he returned to civilian activities was in Ottawa. When he arrived there in 1952, he found that bridge activities duplicate consisted of one weekly 4 table Howell game and no tournaments whatsoever. He started a club that. five years later, was reaching 35 tables.

He got sanctions for and organized the first sectional tournament in Ottawa. He and his friends thought that Ottawa really needed a regional tournament also. To achieve this, he traveled to New York City and talked to Al Landy. Al told him that if he could get signatures of fifty people who would attend, he would get a

sanction. That was no problem, and the Can Am tournament was born.

Ken was Life Master 2628, and the 40th Canadian to attain that status. He retired from the RCAF in 1959 and then moved to the Hamilton area where he started 3 trust companies. He sold them all eventually; one still exists today under its original name.

Ken was always active in community work (Rotary for 40 years, Masons for 70) and in physical fitness.

He still drives to games (up to 35 km each way) twice a week, often with his son David, a youngster of 70. He also accepts invitations for more games.

Oh, by the way, Ken has not yet retired. He still prepares income tax returns for a few of his long time customers!

RAYN-OR SHINES

An alternative title for this article could be: "By George, IThink They've Got It.... Right". John Rayner, Canadian international player. It's not such a difficult name, you might think. Well, I entered our partnership in the Mixed Pairs and the Open Swiss Pairs only to find that his name had been changed to Raynor. Even before the Mixed Pairs started, I approached two officials to have the correction made. Eventually, it was remedied — at least for the Swiss Pairs.

John dragged me through the Mixed Pairs to first place, so then I realised that his name might well appear in this Bulletin (the Daily Bulletin from the Canberra Summer Festival of Bridge – Ed.) incorrectly. Over the years, our editor, Alan Taylor, has come to realise that I will contribute an article willingly; so I emailed him a somewhat threatening email regarding my intentions should he misspell John's name. There was no cause for alarm. The results list for the Mixed Pairs just

happened to omit the first-placed pair entirely, so he clearly did not misspell John's name.

With much enthusiasm I collected Daily Bulletin No. 6 to finally read the name RAYNER in print. Yes – he'd spelt it correctly. There was only one problem. John had become George!

So here's my article – with many references to a correctly-spelt John Rayner. It's a delight to watch John as declarer. Here's John in action from our first session...

I knew my hand was going to be virtually useless to partner, until he got the lead of the spade five. John won the ace and king of spades to discard his losing clubs. A heart to the queen indicated the trump break. Now he needed to keep control and establish the diamond suit.

The diamond six was won with the queen and a club led to the ace. Another diamond was ducked to the ace. Now East tapped John with a club, but he could counter this by leading another diamond and trumping it with the heart ten to draw the king. Whatever was returned, he was able to trump, cash the heart ace to draw the last trump and claim his diamonds.

For a Canadian he's very poor at claiming beer cards, thank goodness! (If you take the last trick with the diamond seven, you get a beer. - Ed.)

To win a pairs game, you must have the opponents be generous. Later in the same session they were extremely so...

After the weak no trump and partner's three clubs, all bids lack some appeal: if you bid three spades and partner has no support you are

in trouble; if you bid three no trump and partner has spade support, you may reach the wrong contract. After some cogitation I guessed three no trump - wrong again!

The heart queen was led and my RHO decided I was good enough to bid three no trump with a singleton king (as is his own wont). He won the heart ace and returned one, and his partner thankfully did not unblock the jack. With the remainder of the high card points now marked on my left, I led three rounds of spades. The queen won and the heart jack was cashed.

At this point, a club exit would have separated me from dummy but still would have left me with nine tricks, but the actual diamond exit was fatal for East. I could win the diamond jack, lead to my diamond ace, then cash two more spades, squeezing the East hand in diamonds and clubs for the remainder of the tricks. Plus 430 was a very tidy result for us.

In the second session my favourite hand is this, the first we played:

As West, you have to play three no trump. North leads the four of spades, which runs to the eight. You return the spade queen — it's always demoralising to the opponents when you return their suit in no trumps.

North now tried the nine of clubs, South winning the ace and continuing a club. The jack of clubs wins and the scene seems set for a classic double squeeze. Clearly North protects the spades, South protects the clubs, and neither will be able to guard the heart suit.

You lead to the jack of diamonds, cash the king of spades (in case the spade jack is short), lead the diamond king, cross back for two more diamonds and watch the opponents squirm.

When the last diamond was played, in order to guard the spades, North had to come down to two hearts; in order to protect the club queen, South came down to two hearts – and dummy's ace, king, and nine of hearts took the last three tricks.

By the way, we won very nice gold medallions, but there appears to be no trophy on which the name John Rayner can be spelt incorrectly!

Correspondence



Dear John:

I was very disappointed that the Toronto Regional was moved to the airport strip this past year. My concerns are economic and environmental.

Let's look at the economic impact first, particularly on Seniors. Last year a Senior living in mid-town Toronto, about 25 km. from the airport, paid \$15.00 per game at the Royal York and \$3.00 subway fare per day (\$1.50 each way). If this Senior played once per day, last year's (2008) cost was \$18.00

per day. This year at Doubletree one game per day cost the Senior \$28.00 (\$13.00 entry + \$5.00 gas + \$10.00 parking). If the Senior played twice a day last year the cost would have been \$33.00 If the Senior played twice per day at Doubletree the cost would have been \$41.00. It's only when two Seniors car pooled and played twice per day that the costs become about equal.

I do not know how many Seniors (or non-Seniors, for that matter) took public transit last year to get to the Royal York but I do know that everyone who attended the event at Doubletree had to drive. I think that my calculations above show that transit users were penalized dramatically this year.

Now, on to the environment, which is of greater concern to me. I believe that global warming is a potential catastrophe in progress. Governments at all levels, many corporations, and thousands of individuals are making efforts to reduce carbon emissions. Billions of dollars are being spent on urban transit to, in part, reduce pollution.

There are many things individuals and non-profit organizations can do to help and among them is to plan events where carbon emissions are reduced. It does not seem to me that the Board of Unit 166 even considered the environment in its planning for the 2009 Toronto Regional. Transit systems were totally ignored for both city dwellers and those from out of town.

Everyone had to drive to this year's tournament. The carbon footprint must have been immense. That's the legacy of the 2009 Toronto Regional -a horrendous carbon footprint. Our membership deserves better, our country deserves better, our grandchildren deserve better.

To the editor:

I am writing to request the ACBL to re-take control over enforcement of the much trumpeted Zero Tolerance Policy. After suffering through six separate incidents of intolerable behaviour, at four different clubs and under four different directors, it has come to my attention that the ACBL long ago relinquished enforcement of the Policy to the different club owners and directors.

These club owners are independent of the ACBL and operate their own separate businesses. I maintain that any enforcement has been abandoned, likely because it is in the owner's interests to maintain bums in the chairs and not rock any boats.

Meanwhile the ACBL gives the misleading impression that the bridge community operates under a policy of zero tolerance of rude and insulting behaviour.

This to me is unacceptable. Either there is a policy of zero tolerance or there is not; please don't suggest that there is when there is no control of necessary enforcement.


