

The remote villages of Laos have never recovered from the 'secret' war of the 60s. Laos is the most-bombed country in the world per capita - their infrastructure was totally destroyed. While rich in culture and tradition, their education, health care and hygiene conditions are severely lacking. The average lifespan is only 56 years, caused by poor quality water, poor hygiene and general poverty. BUT with your help we have already made a difference in the lives of thousands of villagers. We have built 5 schools, provided a two-room addition to a 6th school and completed Phase 1 of a secondary school. Three water source projects have been completed for two villages and a hospital (imagine a hospital with no water!). That's not all! We are also sponsoring 18 primary school kids, 2 new university students and a teacher in addition to the 3 university students we have already sponsored. 50 Bicycles were distributed to get even more kids to and from school and there were a number of smaller projects completed too. You can help in so many different ways. Sponsors for every project will receive emailed pictures and details of how the money was spent.

WAYNE RUTTAN WINS KATE BUCKMAN & AUDREY GRANT AWARDS

Wayne Ruttan has garnered both the Kate Buckman Award and the Audrey Grant Award for 2013, an unprecedented feat. Both awards are for people in Unit 166 and the winners are decided by the Unit 166 Board of Directors. The Kate Buckman Award goes to the person who most increases others' enjoyment of the game and the Audrey Grant Award is for the Teacher of the Year. Ruttan professed amazement when informed of the honours and gave full credit to his wife Joyce.

Like most bridge players of his generation, Wayne's introduction to cards came at an early age - cards were the main source of entertainment for his family. He remembers playing 'war' with his sister Sharon on the floor of the back bedroom, slapping cards down

one after the other. Sharon was five years old and Wayne seven. Their parents taught them euchre soon after, so they learned the concepts of 'trick' and 'trump' quickly. Later they played penny-ante poker.

Wayne's introduction to bridge came at the age of 17. He had just started working as a junior draftsman H.H. at Engineers. Bridge at lunch hour was popular with four of the engineers and Wayne quickly became interested because the idea of playing both one's own hand and partner's hand had advantages that were not available in euchre. Every once in a while the engineers let him sit in when one of them had to leave the table for some reason. He started playing in earnest at the age of 19 with a poker-playing buddy (who was, and still is, a great high-stakes poker player).

Wayne and his partner played at Kate Buckman's and the Japanese Cultural Centre a few times with moderate success. One time at Kate's, Wayne's friend suggested they enter the dollar pool, but Wayne confesses to chickening out, figuring there was no way they would win. They did win, and could have won around 20 dollars, a fact Wayne's friend never lets him forget. Then, at the age of 20,

Joyce and Wayne were married and his bridge-playing career came to a crashing halt. The combination of having kids but no money took all their time, as it did for many other bridge players.

Wayne got back on the bridge bandwagon at the age of 50 with money in the bank and the kids pretty much on their own. His friend and former partner was deeply involved in poker and golf so was not available. However, sister Sharon was, so they took a series of lessons at Kate's and started a partnership. Wayne says that he was unfortunately not the greatest partner in the world - he was, by his own admission, too competitive and made life miserable for Sharon. He still regrets that, but did learn to become a nicer partner. About a year later, Joyce decided she had enough of staying at home while Wayne played a couple of nights a and so began partnership. It was very rocky for the first five years, but eventually, he says, Wayne saw the light and they always enjoy their games together now.

George Halasi (father of David and Charles) is Wayne's other regular partner. They have been playing together for about 17 years and know each other well. Wayne enjoys their games and feels fortunate to have George as a partner. Wayne says George is a fine player, especially excellent on declarer play and defence, but best of all, he is very forgiving of Wayne's mistakes.

Wayne's bridge-teaching career began around 1998 when Barbara Seagram asked if he would consider taking over the Monday night 'Introduction to Duplicate Bridge' game for Barbara's students. Barb needed a replacement for Patti Lee, who was retiring. Having never taught before, Wayne eagerly accepted the new challenge and quickly found that he thoroughly enjoyed teaching and that it seemed to come naturally to him. He says it also helped to have students that wanted to learn.

Later, Barbara asked Wayne to start teaching her Basic and Intermediate courses at Kate's, where he got to see the Master in action - he sat in to watch and learn from Barbara herself, keeping copious notes and witnessing her skills as a teacher. Wayne says he owes Barbara a lot for giving him those opportunities. Wayne also gives credit to Bonny Norris and Alex Kornel for helping him to develop as a Director.

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When Kate's folded, Wayne prepared a letter for all of his Monday-night Beginner players and suggested other bridge clubs they could try. One of the players suggested that Wayne start his own club instead. He thought, "Why not?" Barbara Seagram agreed to have the game sanctioned through the Barbara Seagram School of Bridge and to have the results posted on her website. Barbara recommended Wavne's club to her basic and intermediate students when they finished their courses. Wanda Pearce and Shawn Mahood, who teach at the Toronto Board of Education also started sending their pupils and Enid Roitman began to recommend Wayne's game to her pupils. Wayne

feels he owes a debt of gratitude to all of them.

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Unblocking by the Defenders

(Continued from the Spring 2013 issue.)

In our last issue we learned that the defenders sometimes have to play high cards on their partner's honour cards to help establish and/or run a suit.

Defenders have to value link cards more than honours to avoid blocking suits. Consider this deal where West leads the five of diamonds against three notrump:

♠ 10 7 6 ♥ A O 6 **♦ 7 4** ♣ K 10 7 6 3 ♠ | 8 2 **♠** Q 9 5 ♡ 10842 ♡ | 9 3 ♦ A O 9 5 2 ♦ | 10 6 3 ♣ A **9** 8 5 **★** A K 4 3 ♥ K 7 5 ♦ K 8 ♣ Q | 4 2

To the first trick, we're playing third hand only as high as necessary and contributing the ten of diamonds. South wins the king and leads a club, which partner wins with the ace. With such a successful start, it looks as if we're defeating the contract. Partner plans to take the ace of diamonds, followed by the queen, the nine and finally, the two, the defeating trick.

The cards we follow suit with are critical. If we play the three of diamonds on the ace followed by the six on the queen, when partner plays the nine of diamonds, we'll win the trick with the jack. Although partner's two of diamnonds is a winner, we can't get there. It's up to us to get out of the way.

To defeat three notrump, we have to unblock; to throw the jack of diamonds under either the ace or queen of diamonds. Now when the nine of diamonds is played, our last diamond is lower than the nine. Partner keeps the lead and can now play the two of diamonds.

Throwing away the jack of diamonds might seem dangerous, but we can imagine partner has four or more diamonds to have led the suit against three notrump. We also have four, so declarer has at most three. The first trick was won by the king of diamonds and partner's ace-queen will remove whatever other diamonds declarer has. We don't need to keep the jack. Whatever diamonds partner has left will be winners.

Here's a difficult example from the other side of the table. We lead the five of hearts against three notrump and see this:

North (Dummy) ♠ J 7 5 ♡ A 7 ◇ J 9 8 4 2 ♠ K 10 5 West (Us) ♠ K 4 ♡ K J 8 5 ◇ A 7 3 ♣ 9 6 4 2

Partner wins the first trick with the queen of hearts and declarer follows suit with the four. Partner returns the three of hearts on which declarer plays the ten. It might seem automatic to play the eight, but that won't defeat the contract if the full layout is something like this:

Declarer wins the ace of hearts and drives out our ace of diamonds. We take the king and jack of hearts, but that only holds declarer to nine tricks. Meanwhile, partner is sitting with a fifth heart which we can never reach.

Once we are familiar with unblocking, we should consider the situation before playing the eight of hearts to the second trick. The return of the three of hearts - partner's original fourth best - and declarer's play of the ten are both indications that partner may have started with five hearts. In that case, it's up to us to get out of the way by unblocking the king or jack under dummy's ace. Then when we win the ace of diamonds, we can take our high heart and lead the carefully preserved eight of hearts over to partner's nine and let partner take the setting tricks. What a partnership effort!

DUPLICATE BRIDGE

South bid to game in spades and after playing the hand, he was four down doubled: he scored the board and the TD called the move for the next round: South moved the wrong boards to the lower table, keeping the boards he had just played and passing the ones just passed to him. No one realized his error; he then played the board again in four spades doubled down four! He called the TD and told him, "I cannot put in my score as somebody else has put his score in my place"!



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

Still round the corner there may wait A new system or bridge team-mate And though I oft have passed them by The day will come at last when I Shall take the relay bids that run West of the Moon and East of the Sun.


The bogs of the Dead Marshes were as tortuous as a result merchant, so Frodo Baggins and Sam Gamgee needed a guide. The strange, schizoid creature Sméagol-Gollum could help them, but only if he/they was mastered in a bridge encounter.

Sméagol opened one club, Sam preempted three diamonds, Gollum bid three notrump, and all passed.

Frodo's diamond lead was won in the dummy, and a low spade played to Sam's bare king. Sam returned the queen of diamonds to Gollum's ace. Frodo won the third round of spades with the ace, and made a transportation-cutting low-club return to dummy's ace. Gollum overtook the queen of hearts with the king – but Frodo won the ace and made a further transportation cut with a heart return. Dummy's ten won. When Gollum played Sméagol's king of clubs, discarding a diamond from hand, Frodo routinely unblocked the queen. Now Sam could take the setting tricks with the jack of clubs and winning diamonds.

Gollum hissed, "Baggins, we hates it, we hates it forever."




Gollum opened one diamond, which caused Frodo to pass throughout, and eventually Sméagol declared four hearts. Sam led a spade, Sméagol overtaking Gollum's nine with his queen. The jack of hearts won the second trick, and Sam's ace of hearts the third. Had Frodo been sitting West he would now have

found the killing king of clubs switch. Sam, however, chose a routine four of clubs instead.

Frodo did not give up. After he won the ace of clubs, he deceptively continued with the ace of diamonds and the seven of diamonds! Naturally Sméagol made the losing decision to attempt to ruff out "Sam's diamond king".


"Clever master," Sméagol whimpered.



Sam opened a weak notrump. True to his nature, Gollum perpetrated the evil Unusual Two Notrump convention. When Frodo now bid spades, he was unable to restrain Sam's enthusiasm for rope — Sam "hanged" Frodo by putting him into a precarious six-spade contract.

Sméagol led a club. Frodo won dummy's ace, and immediately ruffed a low club with the king of spades. The queen of spades was led to Sméagol's ace, and Frodo won the trump return with dummy's spade ten. Sam's remaining low club was ruffed with the jack of spades. Frodo now drew Sméagol's last trump with Sam's nine of spades.

Gollum's interference now guided Frodo to the winning path. Frodo called for dummy's queen of diamonds, which Gollum had to cover with the king. Winning the ace of diamonds, Frodo returned to dummy with the ace of hearts to cash Sam's remaining black winners. This was the position on Sam's last trump:



On the two of spades, Frodo discarded the four of diamonds and Sméagol was squeezed into submission.

So Sméagol-Gollum now had to guide Frodo and Sam on the safe path through the Dead Marshes. But could they successfully make an avoidance play when they arrived at the Black Gate?

BUNGLE THESE HANDS WITH ME

By John Cunningham

Saving Partner?

With neither side vulnerable, I hold ♠A952 ♡KQ ◇J4 ♣K9653 in a local pairs game. RHO opens one spade in second chair and I venture an unsound two clubs. Partner calls two notrump, which I take as natural, rather than some sort of club raise. I pass this, only to have LHO chime in with three hearts. When this comes back to me, I reflect that If they were vulnerable, I'd probably risk a double, but they're not, so I pass. The auction:


Partner leads the club deuce and dummy proudly tables:

Declarer wins the ace of clubs in dummy and leads a low spade. My ace wins, declarer following with the four and partner the six (standard count and attitude). What now? Not a spade. Playing a trump seems least noxious, but I choose the club king, in case that deuce was a singleton, having

momentarily forgotten that partner bid 2NT as a passed hand. It was not a singleton but at least the king wasn't ruffed. Declarer has shown three black cards. Now I play the heart king. It too holds the trick. Partner apparently holds the ace of hearts, the king of spades and the ace or king of diamonds, but not both.

If I play a diamond now, and partner has the ace perhaps we'll be disadvantaged if she plays it. It's likely that declarer is 6-4, but it is just possible she's 5-5, in which case a second trump back may help. Partner knows from the bidding and play that I don't have a high diamond honour; and even if I do, there is no hurry to cash it. A club from her upon winning her ace of hearts is completely safe.

So I play my second heart, forcing partner to win. Back comes a diamond, handing over the contract. Declarer easily guessed to play the queen, by then knowing the location of all the high cards.



My unlikely play of a second heart, rather than a diamond, was just too

greedy. My target should have been merely to set the contract. I should have protected partner and not given her a chance to make a mistake. As a passed hand, partner could not hold as much as the king of spades, ace of hearts, ace of diamonds and jack of clubs. So perhaps the mistake is my own after all.

The Marshall Plan

Filling in at the local duplicate club, as dealer, both vulnerable, I am dealt: ♠AQ8 ♥K10643 ♦10 ♣Q963.

I could pass, I suppose, but my intermediates are better than usual, so I unabashedly open the bidding with one heart.Partner bids two diamonds, and I have to consider my options. It happens that I am playing with someone who is also filling in, somewhat uncomfortably, as the Tournament Director of the game. Normally a reasonably competent soul, he is distracted by his other duties and we have not discussed our system in any detail.

I have a choice of repeating the hearts or rebidding two notrumps or three clubs. Three clubs has very little going for it. Two notrumps? Well, I do have stoppers in the black suits, and while I don't have the expected second diamond, at least I do have the ten.

What about two hearts? I generally play that as the default rebid: it doesn't promise anything more than desperation, but I am concerned that this partner might play me for six hearts.

Against my better judgement I opt for two notrump. Partner turns the screws by bidding four clubs. Since three clubs would have been natural and forcing, I suppose that he is making an enquiry for aces.

With no discussion on the matter, I bid four diamonds, I hope showing one key card for diamonds. Partner bounces majestically to six notrumps, then tables this dummy to go with my collection:

- ★ KJ54♡ 2♦ AKJ532★ A8
- ♠ AQ8

RHO's showing out on the opening spade lead portended bad things in the diamond suit. Sure enough, after I win the ace of spades in hand, East wins the ten of diamonds with the queen and returns the heart queen. A well-earned zero for us.

Partner was over-enthusiastic, I'd say, but the fault lay largely with my illadvised two notrump call. He was entitled to better diamond support. And the sad thing is that I bid it knowing it was wrong!

Here are the East/West hands:

♠ 1097632
 ♠ —
 ♦ QJ975
 ♦ 6
 ♦ Q9874

While opening the bidding turned out poorly (or was it my later rebids?), I expect I shall continue to do so, thinking it useful on balance.

Making Do

Early on in a game at the local club, I am dealt a perfect weak-notrump hand as dealer, both vulnerable, at match points: ♠J963 ♡A6 ◇Q94 ♣AJ63.

Unfortunately, we are not playing the weak no trump, so I must instead open one club. It's close, though.

Partner responds one diamond, leaving me to choose between rebidding one spade or one notrump. If I bid the reflexive one spade, partner will suspect that I have a distributional, or more concentrated, hand. So there is a case for one notrump. Be that as it may, one spade it is. Two hearts from partner. Fourth suit forcing to game: that pitiful crutch. It could be any number of hand types.


Oddly, for such a mundane hand, I seem to be having a plethora of choices in the bidding. Is two notrump automatic here? There is that heart stopper, and with only two of them, less of a lead advantage to having partner declare. It depends a bit on what partner is up to: I think it would be better to support the diamonds, though, so I'll risk bidding three diamonds.

Oops! Four diamonds from him. Now what? Can I pass four

diamonds? With some, I have the agreement that fourth suit forcing allows this. And, with the odd eccentric, a raise to four of our minor is key-card asking, for goodness' sake.

Anyway, pass is out. Four hearts? Seem automatic, doesn't it? But then, partner will place me with spades and be optimistic about my general strength. And, given my lack of a two notrump bid, may think four hearts depicts a distributional, not high-card, control. (He knows I don't have a no trump opener, I don't have concentrated spades, and I don't bid weak, short minors)

Should I bid six diamonds? No, I am quite some distance past junior age. So I bid five diamonds, albeit grudgingly. Partner passes. The complete deal:



So many decisions on the way to a bottom board! We were alone in declaring five diamonds. In retrospect, my refraining from calling four hearts was paternalistic and wrong. Masterminding even.




