CAMBODIA PROJECTS: 2014 UPDATE & EXCITING NEWS

Read about our new Family Health Clinic which we will build Save Thursday, June 19th in your calendar!

In 2011, we (Patti Lee and Barbara Seagram) began our work in Cambodia with clothing, pens, notebooks, rulers, sharpeners, toys, pencils, stickers. We met volunteers who'd built schools and we discovered that there was a programme whereby we could arrange to buy bicycles for the children of Cambodia. Our group bought 40 bicycles for \$50 each and gave them to the children in return for their commitment to stay in school. We returned home determined to do more.

We raised \$40,000 that year, built one school, furnished two others and built a library at one of the schools. Patti visited in 2014, Barbara will visit in 2015. Since then, we remain committed to sustaining FOUR schools: paying teachers, librarians, electricity, etc. The cost for sustaining all these projects is \$10,000 per year. You can see that money goes a long way in this country.

We now have 580 students in our schools, but there is a huge need in the remote villages for medical help. Many never see a doctor, so we have decided to build a FAMILY HEALTH CLINIC. It would be the first line of medical support for local families who do not have a doctor and who cannot travel to one. Our first guesstimate for building this project is approximately \$50,000. Patti and Barbara are excited and optimistic about all of these projects and are holding our Annual Fundraiser for Cambodia on Thursday, June 19th at 5 Glen Park Ave (Habonim Synagogue). The programme is:

- 9.30 am Seminar with Barbara Seagram
- 11.30 am Lunch
- 12 noon Presentation by Patti Lee with lots of photos of her 2014 trip to Cambodia, where she stayed a few weeks.
- 12.45 pm Until 3.30 pm: Bridge game with extra master points (sectionally rated)

We will also have a silent auction. We would be so grateful if you could all help us to solicit donations for our silent auction...dinners at restaurants are the most popular...vouchers for anything you think would be popular; we would so appreciate your help with this.

The cost for attending is a donation of minimum of \$40.00 per person. (Tax deductible receipts will be issued). At the door, there will be an additional fee of \$10.00 per person to cover costs for the event. These have to be kept separate as there is no tax receipt for the \$10.00). If you are unable to attend, we would still welcome your donation & of course the tax receipt will still be issued.

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Highlights of Unit 249 Board of Directors Meeting London, Ontario, Saturday, January 25th, 2014

- A. The date for Sarnia Tournament has been established as the third weekend of April unless it falls on Easter in which case it will be the second weekend in April.
- B. Unit 149 will support the Learning Bridge in a Day program and reimburse clubs who pay the \$150 sanction fee. Continued support will be reevaluated in one year.
- C. A "Coordinator of Duplicate Bridge Education and Newcomers" will be appointed to improve tournament attendance.
- D. New tournaments: Windsor, 4th and 5th of October, 2014, Chatham within a few weeks of that and Guelph, March of 2015[.]
- E. Unit 249 currently has a bank balance of \$24,213 with Accounts Receivable of \$1,100 and Accounts Payable of \$800 for operating expenses and HST Payable of \$2,294, leaving us with a working balance of approximately \$22,250.
- F. Current membership: 1209.

INA DEMME NAMED CBF EXECUTIVE ASSISTANT



Ina Demme, of Maple, Ontario is the new Executive Assistant of the Canadian Bridge Federation. Demme took up her duties on January 1, 2014, replacing longtime EA Jan Anderson of Regina. Irene Warner of Toronto, who was also the Secretary of Unit 166, preceded Anderson. Warner and Anderson reigned for about four decades as the CBF's first and second Executive Assistants.

SHAN HUANG WINS RICHMOND TROPHY



Last year, Shan Huang of Toronto, at 25, and still a Junior, became the youngest-ever player to win the Richmond Trophy, awarded annually to the Canadian player winning the most master points in the calendar year. Huang garnered 1318 master points in the competition.

The Richmond Trophy, named after, and donated by, Winnipegger Dave Richmond, has been dominated by players from western Canada. Huang became only the sixth local player to have won the trophy; Kenny Gee from Regina has won that many by

himself, all six of them consecutive. CBF Hall-of-Famer Mark Molson won the Richmond five times before asking the CBF to remove him from consideration as he began to spend more and more time in the United States.Bruce Ferguson did the same after his three wins in a row.

Shan has clear goals set for himself: he wants to win a North American Bridge Championship and a World Championship. The closest he has come so far was a second-place finish in the 2013 North American Swiss Teams.

Shan began playing bridge as a child since both his parents and grandparents played and then he played quite a bit of online bridge in high school. Shan's first duplicate bridge experience was at the University of Toronto's Hart House Bridge Club where, he relates, "the field was so weak that I did not realize how hopeless I was."

In an interview with BBO early in 2014, Shan was asked if he had a favourite deal to recount. He replied: "Recently I was playing in the final of a knockout in the Hilton Head Regional. We were stuck 38 IMPs at the half. On the last board of the second half, I was declaring a very thin three notrump. One opponent led out of turn so I forbade the lead of that suit and got a somewhat good start. Then, with eight tricks, I had to guess which opponent had the king of spades to decide between a simple finesse or a strip squeeze. While I was thinking, the opponent with the king of spades (offside) thought I had no chance and decided to show me his hand. That took away my guess and I made three notrump and ended up winning the second half by 39 IMPs and winning the Knockout by I IMP! I'm still not sure how I was going to play the hand."

2013 CBF MINI-RICHMOND AWARDS


In 2011 the Canadian Bridge Federation introduced the Mini-Richmond awards. The awards recognize CBF members who, during the previous calendar year, have won the most masterpoints in each of the masterpoint categories, up to and including Diamond Life Master (5,000-7,500 MP). Each category winner in each of the six CBF zones receives a special pin. In addition, overall national winners receive a certificate recognizing their achievement.

Opening lead: ♡J

Bidding commentary: Although a little "off-centre," it may be hard to describe the South hand if it's not opened one notrump. All's well that ends well. North-South have arrived at the best contract.

Defensive commentary l: East plays the four of hearts at trick one, denying a high honour: no encouraging signal, no overtake with honour doubleton, no overtake with K-x-x-(x) or A-x-x-(x) in case partner has led from the acejack-ten or the king-jack-ten. (If the lead of a jack denies a higher honour, South does not overtake with K-x-x-(x), but rather signals encouragement.

Play commentary: As declarer, take the first trick with the queen of hearts. Why? West knows you have the queen of hearts from East's discouraging signal and East knows you have it from West's lead of the jack. When both opponents know you have a card (in this case, the queen of hearts), get rid of it! Treat it as a hot potato, a scalding hot potato.

Defensive Commentary 2: As West, after South wins the queen of hearts, cashes the ace and king of clubs and leads a diamond, the ball is in your court. You know declarer has three heart tricks from partner's negative signal. Once declarer gets to dummy with a diamond, he will have five club tricks plus a diamond for nine tricks. In addition, South is known to have nine HCP in hearts and seven HCP in clubs for a total of 16 HCP. Partner must have the ace of spades and may have the jack as well. Grab the ace of diamonds and shift to the king of spades, followed by another spade. As East, do not signal encouragement with an honour when partner leads the king of spades. If you do, you are signalling with the setting trick! After all, if partner has two spades, declarer has four, and you definitely need to keep all your high spades to run the suit.

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COOL HAND DAVE By David Turner

I seem to run across more than my fair share of interesting play deals (perhaps because my standards are too low, but never mind). My partner Roy Hughes has appropriated some of them for his next book, but I come across lots of them, and now that I'm playing a little more, it might be fun to display them.

My old friend David Cravioto believes that most difficult bidding problems can be solved by leaping to six diamonds (in fact his BBO screen name is Mr6Diamonds). He wasn't involved with the first two exhibits, but they did occur on BBO, where I bid them with robots. They occurred within a few boards of each other, and definitely met my "cool hand!" criterion. See if they exceed your personal bar as well.

I. Six Diamonds Anyone?

This deal features a kind of play I hadn't really seen before. The contract is six diamonds and the ten of hearts is led ...

IMPs. Dealer West. EW Vul.

Of course, the jack of hearts is covered by the queen. What now?

I think the right play is to take the two top hearts, ruff one heart with a

middle trump, return to the king of diamonds and, assuming both opponents follow to the first diamond, ruff the last heart high. Then finish the trumps, coming down to the ace-eight-five of spades and the club king in your hand and the same shape in dummy. If either opponent started with honour-third in spades and the ace of clubs, he'll have to reduce to that, and then you can exit with a club and play for split honours in spades.

Was it right? Yes! Except that, in the event, North, on lead, started with a trump, and that messed up my entries to eliminate the hearts, and I was reduced to playing spades myself. Rats.

2. Inelegant Bidding

The next deal had a happier ending for me, and exhibited another relatively rare theme. The timing is a little tricky, so think hard about the ending you're playing for before you set about the play. The opposition bidding is very important too, if equally inelegant to our own:



North led the two of spades, three, ten, ace.

With the ace of clubs onside you have 11 tricks and threats against LHO in both black suits - but no immediate entries in either suit. You want to come to an ending where LHO has to pitch from the jack-nine of spades and the ace-queen-jack of clubs before dummy pitches from queen-low of spades and king-eightfour of clubs. Dummy then discards from the opposite suit to North and you lead a club up. All you really have to do is watch to see if LHO discards a spade at any point.

Is there a trap? Yes. You have to play off the ace of hearts once LHO abandons that suit to reduce to the five-card you desire. The play has the quality of a Vienna Coup but you can't play off the ace of hearts too early, or LHO will have a heart to cash when you lead a club up. So the right play is to cash five rounds of trump early (lefty is void), pitching the low hearts from dummy. At that point, LHO will have had to pitch three clubs and two hearts, leading to this seven-card ending:



NOW you play a heart to the ace, return to your carefully-preserved

spade king, and lead the last trump. Sweet! Happily all was well, with LHO holding:

North's best defence is probably to play his partner for the ten of clubs and come down to ace-nine-seven of clubs in the five-card ending, throwing away the ace of clubs when I lead the last trump! Wow! (But an overtrick for me this time!)

3.A 'Book' Play

Here's a deal that came up in the Toronto Team-of-Four League and that Roy Hughes used in his upcoming book. It turns out that the line I took was, according to Roy, the best percentage play, but no very good dummy player I gave it to chose my line. I usually assume that means my line is wrong, since I don't consider myself much of a dummy player. What would YOU do as West on this layout?

Despite our combined 33 HCP, the contract was far from laydown.

North led the third-best-from-aneven-number five of spades. I looked at this for a few minutes, and finally played off the two high spades, South following with the ten and eight, a heart to the king, and the two of clubs to the nine and queen. North returned another spade, and righty discards the five of diamonds; you pitch a diamond as well. Now what?

The consensus was to take another club finesse, and, if clubs did not run, take the diamond finesse. Instead, I played off the ace-king of diamonds and the hearts, then took the club finesse. Both lines worked (clubs were 3-3), but Roy told me that playing off the ace-king of diamonds was better percentage-wise. Additionally, South, looking at that East hand as dummy, would not do anything to jeopardize the defence's chances of taking a diamond trick and thus must have length in the suit.

So what caused the other declarers to plan to do it the other way? Perhaps they experienced a failure to adjust expectations in the face of the diamond discard by South.

COULD THIS BE MAGIC? By Ray Jotcham

My wife Gail (and others) have accused me of hypnotizing my opponents during the play in order to make seemingly-impossible contracts. Maybe she's right! Witness the following account of a deal from the Niagara Falls Regional. Steve Mackay and I were playing against a pair of sound, experienced players.



Having whipped myself into fever pitch to open the bidding in fourth seat on the South hand, there was no way I was going to sell out to two diamonds, which explains my bid of two hearts. By the way, I don't recommend that you bid this way unless you are a master hypnotist. Looking at all four hands, there appears to be six potential losers as well as only seven possible winners. WATCH!

West led the two of diamonds and I played the nine from dummy. East thought for a while and ducked, playing his partner for king-tenthree-two and me for the singleton ace. Dummy's nine won the trick. I travelled to my ace of diamonds to prepare for scoring one of my low trumps by ruffing. I led my king of clubs next; this was won by West's ace. West then made the second clear-cut error of the deal by returning the diamond king. I ruffed this and led a club to the queen in dummy. When I then led a club off dummy to ruff, East, remembering my dauntless two-heart rebid, discarded his 'useless' queen of hearts. (after all, I <u>had</u> to have the king to justify my bidding).

A heart toward the dummy drew the king(!) from West (after all, I <u>had</u> to have the ace for my bidding) and the ace from East. East returned a spade to dummy, and I led a heart toward my hand. For some reason, East declined to ruff (that's five mistakes by the defence if you're counting), and I scored the jack. I lost the next trick to West's ten of hearts. Here we were:



West, by now totally mesmerized, made the sixth and final error of the defence (this one being the most egregious), returning the jack of clubs. That allowed me to make all three of my remaining trumps separately on a cross-ruff. I scored six trumps, one heart, two diamonds, and a club for plus 170. Hypnosis?

By the way, after payment of a small bribe from East and West, I promised never to reveal their names. They also threatened grievous bodily harm if I did so. The next example comes from the Oshawa Swiss Teams Sectional, I picked up the following hand:

We were playing against one of the higher-ranked teams in the event, and both teams needed a win to stay in the hunt. The following auction ensued:

If partner held something like aceking to five in each major, my cards would make the deal a lay-down for ten tricks. The opening lead was the diamond ace, and the following dummy appeared:

The dummy was not what I had envisioned, but I wasn't doubled and I was not vulnerable. After winning the diamond ace, West thought for a bit and led the diamond king. I now knew hearts were 4-1, since West was trying to establish a long heart. I ruffed the diamond king in dummy, led a spade to the queen, and finessed the jack of hearts. The ten fell on my right, confirming the 4-1 break. I now cashed the ace and king of spades, pitching clubs as West ruffed with the seven of hearts.

It was the moment of decision for West. He reasoned that since I had bid to game holding only the two major suit queens, it was obvious that I must hold the club ace. He therefore led a diamond in an effort to force the dummy again. My queen and nine of diamonds won the next two tricks as I shed clubs from the dummy. I then finessed the nine of hearts and finished drawing trumps. The spade jack took care of one losing club, and I graciously conceded a club trick at the end, making ten tricks. This had been the full deal:

If we'd been playing matchpoints, West's defence would have been logical. However, playing IMPs, he had to hope that his partner held the ace of clubs in order to set the contract. After the spade ruff, he had to lead the king and another club to make another trump trick with the king of hearts.

After the match, one of our opponents came over and congratulated us for the win, and for my play on this deal, remarking, "Where there's a will, there's a way." Partner replied, "No! Where there's a RAY, there's a way!"

DONT: Go Home Without It By John Cunningham

One of the more popular convention types currently in vogue involves making a bid to show the suit bid and a higher-ranking suit, the idea being that the partner of the bidder can correct by going a step up ther ladder if he finds the first suit distasteful. The bidder then passes if that hits his second suit or, if not, bids his second suit.

Such a convention is Marty Bergen's DONT (**D**isturb **O**pponents' **N**o **T**rump) in which Marty recommended bidding rather more often than was usual at the time.

As partner of the bidder, if you remove partner's bid, usually you'll have at least as many cards in all the higher ranking suits as you hold in the suit you correct to. Either that, OR you're willing to wander up a level higher.

The other day, playing virtually no conventions myself, with both sides vulnerable, I suffered an impertinent DONT two-diamond overcall (diamonds and a higher-ranking suit) over my first-seat 14+-17 one notrump opening. RHO (South) advanced to two hearts (pass or correct). So, according to the above logic, I expect him to have three or more cards in both majors. Partner is staring off into space, seemingly uninterested

Well, there's no reason to bid, is there? Well, no, but, upon looking down at my cards, I see:

Oops. Perhaps I ought to have looked at my hand a wee bit more carefully before bidding one notrump. Hmmm. Maybe there is a reason to bid after all. So I bid an unbridled two spades, which all passed.

LHO leads the club king; I remark that I hope his second suit isn't spades. We all chuckle. Dummy is unwelcome, but not completely bereft:

Receiving a discouraging signal on the king of clubs, South shifts to the ace of hearts. North encourages and I unblock the king under the ace. South takes the ace of clubs, then plays another heart. I win in dummy and attempt, in vain, to cash a third heart, preparing to discard my diamond on the fourth, should they prove to be 3-3.

Alas, North, as expected, ruffs the third heart and plays a diamond through my ace. I cannot avoid the matchpoint kiss of death, minus 200. RHO had six (!) spades. The complete deal:
