# Bidding Quiz for Newer Players II

### By Barbara Seagram

- C. Responding to an Opening Bid of One of a Suit. Your partner opens the bidding with one club. How will you respond?
- I. ♠ J753 ♡ 874 ♦ 83 ♣ AJ76
- 2. ♠ 864 ♡ AKJ86 ◇ AJ ♣ 842
- 3. ♠ 742 ♥ K| ♦ AK7 ♣ 98652
- 4. ♠ AK4 ♡ KQ54 ◊ Q985 ♣ 6

### **Answers:**

- Bid one spade. If you were tempted to bid two clubs, that is the last choice on the list of things to do with 6-9 points. When you raise Partner's minor, you deny having a four-card major suit of your own.
- 2. Bid one heart. Don't even THINK about making a jump shift. That would show 19 points or so. Just bid one heart. This is forcing and partner MUST bid again. MUST. Your bid shows anywhere from 6-18 points. If Partner doesn't bid again, he needs to go back for beginner's lessons.
- 3. Bid three clubs. A limit raise showing at least five of Partner's suit, NO four-card major, and 10-12 points.
- 4. Bid one diamond. This is 100% forcing and does not deny a four-card major. Allow Partner to bid one of the majors if she has one. If she bids one heart, you then bid four hearts (same for spades). With four-card suits, Responder bids them UPTHE LINE! There is an exception to this rule: with a hand worth only one bid (6-9 points), it is permitted to bypass a four-card diamond suit to bid a four-card major.
- **D. Rebids by Opening Bidder.** You open with one heart, Partner

responds one spade, and it is your turn again. What'll it be?

- I. ♠ 9852 ♥ AKJ75 ♦ AQ ♣ Q6
- 2. ♠ 76 ♡ AJ863 ◇ AJ2 ♣ A82
- 3. ♠ A3 ♡ AKQ54 ◇ AQ87 ♣ 83

  On the following hand, your partner rebids two clubs to your one heart opening bid. It is your turn to rebid.
- 4. ♠ AK76 ♥ AJ854 ♦ 32 ♣ 42

### **Answers:**

- Bid three spades. This shows four-card support for Partner's spades and 16-18 points.
- 2. One no trump. You promise a minimum opening bid (12-14 points) and a balanced hand. With 15 points and a balanced hand, you would have opened one no trump. With fewer than 12 points, you'd have passed!
- Three diamonds. This is a jump shift (a bid of a new suit one level higher than necessary) by the opening bidder, and shows an unbalanced hand of 19 or more points.
- 4. I know you want to bid two spades. You must NOT! Your choices as opening bidder with 13-15 points include bidding a new suit of lower rank than the one you opened. If you bid a new suit at the two-level in a higher-ranking suit, you promise 17 or more points. This is called a reverse bid. The answer is that you must rebid two hearts. This does not always promise a six-card suit. Sometimes you are stuck and must rebid your five-card major.
- **E.** Rebids by the Responder. Partner opens one diamond and you bid one heart as reponder. Partner now bids one no trump. Your bid...
- I. ♠ 64 ♡ AK54 ◊ AQ87 ♣ 983

- 2. ♠ A3 ♥ Q97542 ♦ 874 ♣ 62
- 3. ♠ 853 ♡ KJ87 ◊ A7653 ♣ 7

### **Answers:**

- Bid three no trump. With 13 points as responder, it is your responsibility to get your side to game. You know that partner has 12-14 balanced points, but no more, or she would have opened the bidding with one no trump.
- 2. Bid two hearts. This shows a weak hand with six hearts. Perfect!
- Now you can bid three diamonds. Your first bid of one heart showed six or more points. Now you can show partner that you have 10-12 dummy points and at least four diamonds (probably five of them).
- F. When the Opponents Have Opened the Bidding. Your right hand opponent has opened one heart. What do you bid with each of the following hands?
- I. ♠ J864 ♡ -- ♦ AQJ65 ♣ Q976
- 2. ♠ AK872 ♡ -- ♦ J954 ♣ Q532
- 3. ♠ AKQ ♥ Q753 ♦ 87 ♣ QJ74
- 4. ♠ 98 ♥ A864 ♦ AK92 ♣ Q953

### **Answers:**

- I. Double. You have excellent support for all the unbid suits and will love whatever partner bids. Double asks her to show her best suit. You should have I3 or more points to make this bid, and with only I3-I5 points you must have at least adequate support for all the unbid suits. One more thing: remember that you are going to be dummy after partner bids her suit, so because you have excellent trump support for anything she might bid, count your void as 5 points (dummy points).
- 2. One spade. When you have a minimum hand (13-15 points) and a

- five-card major suit, bid the major rather than doubling. If you double and partner bids two clubs, you cannot now show her your good spade suit. That would show more points than you have.
- 3. PASS!! If you make a takeout double you promise to like ALL the unbid suits. Partner will probably bid two diamonds, and then what? You will now have to pass (with a minimum hand you must) and you'll become the dummy, exposing your fraudulence! Remember that the shorter you are in the opponent's suit, the better it is for bidding.
- 4. PASS!! Same reasons as for no. 3.
- G. Responding to a Takeout Double. Your LHO opens the bidding with one spade and your partner says double. What will you bid after RHO passes?
- I. ♠ 753 ♥ J875 ♦ Q65 ♣ 432
- 2. ♠ 987 ♥ J10865 ♦ AQ8 ♣ K8
- 3. ♠ 96 ♡ AK743 ◇ A87 ♣ J63

### **Answers:**

- 1. Two hearts. You are not promising partner a rose garden, merely 0-8 points and four cards in the heart suit.
- 2. This time you have a few more points. Partner wants to know your best suit AND your point range. With 9-11, you should bid your best suit one level higher than necessary. Bid three hearts. (If you only bid two hearts, partner will assume you have only 0-8 points.
- 3. You have 13 points, and your partner who doubled has 13 points. You must show your points and your long suit. Bid four hearts. In order to jump to game in a major in response to partner's double, you should have a five card suit or longer.

# The Rules: Convention Cards, Slow Play & Cell Phones By Debbie Bennett

The following quotes are printed in each issue of the Daily Bulletin at every North American Bridge Championship (NABC), followed by my opinion on each of these matters.

"IT TAKES TWO - Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership. If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only Class A conventions and may use only standard carding."

The article goes on to explain penalties and at which point any restrictions will be lifted after compliance with ACBL regulations.

"SLOW PLAY - Slow play, as opposed to careful or thoughtful play, is discourteous to your opponents - and to all other competitors as well. Players and pairs who take more than their allotted time are subject to penalty. In general, pairs who are rarely late will be warned while pairs who are habitually tardy and /or pay no attention to time limits will be penalized."

"TURN 'EM OFF - Cell phones, audible pagers or any similar communication equipment may not be operated or operable in the playing area during a session of play at NABCs except for health-related equipment or by permission of the director-in-charge of the tournament or event."

The cell phone resolution was passed by the ACBL Board of Directors meeting

before the start of the 2000 Summer NABC in Anaheim. While the resolution applies only to NABCs, the board stated, "sponsoring organizations of other ACBL-sanctioned events are strongly encouraged to adopt this policy."

TWO CONVENTION CARDS: I understand that at high levels of bridge, NABCs and international competitions, it is imperative that each member of a partnership has a convention card legibly filled out and available at all times. It is very important that this regulation be strictly adhered to. This is a good practice to follow at all times in order to avoid problems at any level of bridge. However, most clubs don't insist on this policy and I'm not sure club directors would ever consider being as strict. Most players at the club level would ask that at least one person in a partnership have a completed convention card available at the table.

SLOW PLAY: I'm sure most players would agree with the statement made regarding slow play. Although some hands do require a lot of thought and are difficult to work out, PLEASE, that deuce of diamonds is not going to change into the ace! If you have to go down, do it a little faster. It makes the game much more pleasant for everyone when the game moves along at a proper pace.

CELL PHONES: Last but not least, turn off your cell phone. In my opinion, it's disruptive and rude to answer calls during a session of bridge, and I don't think I'm alone in this matter. If it's necessary to talk to someone, go outside between rounds if you have time. A pager can be put in 'vibrate' mode.

# The Road to Monte Carlo By John Carruthers

If there is a team in this year's Bermuda Bowl which had a tougher time getting there than Canada's, we don't know who it is. For the Fergani Team (Jurek Czyzowicz, Vincent Demuy, Nicolas l'Ecuyer, Kamel Fergani, Darren Wolpert, Gavin Wolpert), the saga began in 2000. That year, Fergani (with Douglas Fraser-Jeff Blond in place of Gavin-Vincent who were 17 and 16, respectively, at the time, and not quite ready for prime time) won the CNTC. Normally that would have entitled them to a playoff among Canada, Mexico and Bermuda to qualify for the Bermuda Bowl in 2001.

However, because of the arcane rules in place at the time, Canada's, Bermuda's, or Mexico's team in the **2000 Olympiad** had to finish in the top half of their group for the Tri-Country Playoff to take place. When all failed to do so, the Zone, and Canada, lost a potential berth in the Bermuda Bowl for 2001 and 2003. Upon appeal, the World Bridge Federation relented partly, allowing that if any team from those countries reached the Knockout Round (32 teams) in the Rosenblum Cup in Montréal, the berth would be reactivated.

Once in a great while, justice is served. The only Canadian team to reach that round of 32 in the Rosenblum was...you guessed it, Fergani! That was not, however, enough for them to get to play in the Bermuda Bowl. They still had to win either the 2002 or 2003 CNTC, then the playoff with the other year's winning team, *then* the playoff with Mexico! Good grief. They won the CNTC this year, beat Maksymetz (last year's winner) in the two-day playoff, then beat Mexico in Montréal in another two-day playoff to finally earn the right

to play in the Bermuda Bowl! We wish them luck.

It would have been too excruciating by half for Fergani to lose a Bermuda Bowl berth due to the poor play of some idiots in an entirely separate event, then regain the Bermuda Bowl berth for Canada in another event with their own good play, then not win that newly-available berth. They could have been forgiven the feeling that fate was gainst them had that occurred!

The scoreline versus Mexico read like this:

Try your hand at the following declarer play problem. It foiled Nicolas l'Ecuyer, so don't feel too bad if you don't succeed.

The opening lead is the club four. How would you play?

Perhaps you were a bit over-exuberant in the auction. You'll need to set up a club

pitch for the jack of spades, or find the spade king onside. Not to mention setting up the hearts. It looks like you'll need good breaks in all suits to have a chance.

That club lead is very suspicious. But should you put all your eggs in the club finesse basket? You decide not. You win the club ace and ruff a club, the jack falling from the opening leader. A diamond to the ace reveals your worst fear, that West has all four trumps — East discards the spade five. Now what?

You may as well continue with the clubs, so you lead another and ruff it high as the king falls. You perk up. Are you going to make this after all? You now have two good clubs in the dummy for discards of the spade and the low heart. A three-three heart break with the queen onside will now see you home. Are there any residual chances?

Sure, you can cash the major suit aces and squeeze east out of a heart if he has the spade king and four hearts to the queen. You do so. The heart queen falls singleton from the opening leader. You draw trumps and claim. Partner says, "Nicely played." Opponents gnash their teeth. Their hands:

Is this what happened at the table? No; l'Ecuyer, nervous lest an early club be overruffed, led a trump to hand. When the vile break was revealed, he drew three rounds of trumps and took a first round heart finesse. When that lost, the losing spade finesse meant two off. Good lead.

This was only a temporary setback, however. The Fergani juggernaut was unstoppable.

When Diana Gordon last played in Monte Carlo for Canada (in 1976), Gavin Wolpert and Vincent Demuy were not yet born and Darren Wolpert was a baby! Still eager to add a team gold medal to her 1982 Mixed Pairs gold, Gordon's team (Brenda Bryant, Francine Cimon, Barbara Clinton, Joan Eaton, Beverly Kraft) staged a dramatic comeback over the last 48 boards to defeat Mexico by 17 IMPs over 128 boards, after being down 57.

The playoff was held over the August 23-24 weekend at the Hotel Inter-Continental in midtown Toronto. The score by segment:

This board was crucial in Canada's victory. Had Alicia Duran made the following slam, it would have been Mexico going to Monte Carlo instead of Canada.

Gordon and Bryant had contented themselves with four hearts in the other room, so 21 IMPs and the match depend on your play. Francine Cimon leads the queen of diamonds. Your plan?

With holes everywhere but clubs, you need to hold those combined suits to one loser. The first decision is in trumps. Who has the jack? You might decide that Francine would never lead the queen from a holding of queen, jack and others — you would be correct. What would she lead from queen, jack doubleton? Perhaps the jack? Is this the dreaded restricted choice at trick one? You decide to win the ace and lead a second diamond to the ten. Francine discards the club seven (upside down count and attitude, so you've jumped the first hurdle successfully.

You may as well take a spade finesse while you're in your hand. You lead the spade jack. It goes king on your left! You win the ace and lead a trump to the nine. Another club is pitched by Cimon. On the last trump, Francine throws yet another club.

You must eventually play on hearts – you play a low heart from hand to the queen. It wins! And better yet, the ten falls from Beverly Kraft. Now you are home, and you lead another heart, eventually losing to the king. But you have the rest. The opponents had:

Obviously, that is not what happened at the table. Duran successfully negotiated the trumps and spades, but then lost her way, trying to cash out the spades before playing on hearts. Thus, when Cimon won the heart king, she had a high spade to cash. This contributed 11 IMPs to

Canada's comeback instead of 10 to Mexico's lead. Whew!

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

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### **Book Reviews**

Play or Defend? 68 Hands to Test Your Bridge Skill, Julian Pottage, Master Point Press, 140 pp., paperback, \$16.95CAN

In just a few short years, Ray and Linda Lee have built Toronto-based Master Point Press into the largest bridge publishing concern in the world. Their authors come from Canada, the USA, Australia, Poland, Israel, and Great Britain. They include the best of Canada such as Paul Thurston, Barbara Seagram, David Silver, and Jim Priebe, as well as world-famous champions such as Eddie Kantar and Larry Cohen.

Julian Pottage is a regular contributor to Bridge Magazine (UK), where he writes a monthly feature on defensive play. Here he freely borrows from a technique developed by Andrew Diosy and the Lees, whereby all four hands are presented as part of the problem. The solution is then given in two parts, interrupted by the question, "would you rather play or defend?" The question is presented more subtly than that though.

I was a little leery at first, thinking that Pottage had perhaps produced merely a book of clever double dummy problems, but this turned out not to be so. A clear writing style, some truly great deals (with no duds), and pinpoint analysis (aided by the program *Deep Finesse*) have combined to produce an engaging book.

I took Pottage's advice and read only a few deals at a time, savouring them as I went, often stewing over a particularly thorny deal for a day or so. And, I must say, the answers did not always come!

The deals become more difficult as the book progresses, but don't be discouraged if you miss an early one, everyone will. A word of warning, however, this is not a book for beginners. It was, however, one of the most enjoyable reads I've had in years.

The Bridge Bum: My Life and Play, Alan Sontag, Master Point Press, 227 pp. (revised), paperback, \$26.95.

When *The Bridge Bum* was first published in 1977, it garnered praise from all sources. Many deemed it the book of the year – the most recent comparison would have been *To Bid or Not to Bid* by Larry Cohen – they created the same kind of stir.

Alfred Sheinwold, who wrote the Foreword to the first edition, closed with, "...*The Bridge Bum* is a book that every bridge player will enjoy reading and that every bridge writer will wish he had written." I agreed with Freddy then and I agree with him now. This is a great bridge book.

Between the publication of the first and second editions of the book, Sontag has solidified his reputation as a terrific bridge player by winning two Bermuda Bowls, in 1983 in Stockholm and in 2000 in Bermuda.

You may be familiar with some of the anecdotes Sontag relates in the book, but you won't necessarily know them from an insider's viewpoint. Even on a second read, the book was a pleasure. I envy anyone picking it up for the first time. Sontag has joined my elite list of authors - those I wish would write more.

### Dear Kibitzer,

The following hand, from the last Kibitzer, could have been played as a rare double trump squeeze, had trumps been two-one. You play six clubs after RHO opened one spade, and LHO raised to two spades. LHO led the spade gueen.

Ruff the opening lead and play the club king. If the opponents do not attack diamonds, play off all the trumps but one, and then cash hearts finishing in dummy. The following ending results:

- **•** 2

If West has kept the guarded spade jack and East the guarded ace, to prevent declarer ruffing out a spade trick, neither can guard diamonds.

A diamond shift does not defeat this squeeze, if declarer wins his king and reads the ending. The three-zero trump break does ruin the ending, for lack of an effective entry to dummy. A good try would be a heart to the ten, hoping that LHO had failed to play the jack.
