Feb 6: Fly from Toronto (or from your own home city) to Ho Chi Minh City (formerly Saigon)

#### Feb 7: Arrive HO CHI MINH CITY

**Feb 8: HO CHI MINH CITY.** Morning drive through typical southern Vietnamese countryside to Tay Ninh province. Visit Cao Dai Temple, a fusion of different religions that combines the mixture of elements from other world religions, observe noon service. Later, visit famous Cu Chi Tunnels, an incredible underground tunnel network constructed by Vietnamese resistance fighters during the long struggle for independence. (B,L)

**Feb 9: HO CHI MINH CITY – DA NANG – HOI AN. Fly** to Da Nang, Vietnam's fourth largest city. Visit ancient trading town of Hoi An, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. (B,D)

**Feb 10: HOI AN.** Walking tour of town's most famous landmarks, Hoi An Museum, old Chinese Merchants' houses, Assembly Hall and the Japanese Covered Bridge. Then, travel by sampan on the Thu Bon River or spend leisure time on the beautiful sandy beach of Cua Dai. (B,L)

**Feb 11: HOI AN.** Red Bridge Cooking tour in Hoi An. Visit colorful local village market and herb garden. Learn how to prepare some of Vietnam's best-known dishes in this hands-on experience, and enjoy the lunch you have prepared. Observe the local life along the river, as you take a boat ride on the Hoi An River before returning to the hotel. (B,L)

**Feb 12: HOI AN – DANANG – HUE.** Leaving behind the peaceful atmosphere of Hoi An, travel north to Da Nang and Hue. En route, visit Marble Mountains and enjoy a scenic view from the pagoda located inside the mountain. Visit a stone-cutting craft village nearby before continuing to Da Nang for a tour and visit to the Cham Museum. Continue heading north with stop at scenic Lang Co Beach. Cross the beautiful Hai Van Pass, before arriving in Hue, the ancient capital of Vietnam, whose monuments have earned it a UNESCO World Heritage Site designation. (B,L)

**Feb 13: HUE.** Boat trip along the serene Perfume River to visit Thien Mu Pagoda, the best known pagoda in central Vietnam. Then, drive to the Tomb of former Emperor Minh Mang, visit the elaborate tomb of Emperors Tu Duc and Khai Dinh, and the Royal Citadel with its Imperial Purple City. (B,L)

**Feb 14: HUE** – Fly to **HANOI, VIETNAM.** Welcome to Hanoi, Vietnam's vibrant capital city, known for its graceful colonial architecture, frenetic streets, verdant parks and ancient temples. After your airport greeting, transfer to the hotel. The remainder of the day is yours to explore the city on your own, or perhaps, visit the fabled Old Quarter. (B,D)

**Feb 15: HANOI.** A morning sightseeing tour will take you to Hanoi's most famous historical and cultural sites: Ho Chi Minh Mausoleum, Ba Dinh Square, One-pillar Pagoda and The Temple of Literature. In the afternoon, experience an authentic rickshaw ride (known as "cyclo")

in the Old Quarter, followed by a traditional water puppet show.

Feb 16: HANOI – HA LONG BAY OVERNIGHT JUNK. After breakfast, depart Hanoi for a scenic motorcoach ride to one of Vietnam's most renowned locations: Ha Long Bay. Board a traditional wooden Junk that combines classic beauty with modern conveniences, plus luxurious overnight accommodations. Set sail to discover the Bay's magnificent scenery set amidst stunning limestone cliffs. That evening, you'll enjoy dinner onboard, and overnight on the Junk.(B,L,D)

**Feb 17: HA LONG BAY – HANOI – SIEM REAP, CAMBODIA.** This morning, your Ha Long Bay Junk continues its scenic cruising while a delightful breakfast is served in the dining lounge. Late morning, disembark for a motorcoach transfer to Hanoi Airport. After a short flight, arrive in Siem Reap, Cambodia, gateway to Angkor, the former capital of the Khmer empire and one of the most renowned archeological sites in all of South East Asia. (B,L,D)

**Feb 18: SIEM REAP** – **ANGKOR.** After breakfast, begin a guided sightseeing tour of the Angkor Archaeological Park, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. Highlights include Angkor Thom, Terrace of the Elephants and Terrace of the Leper King, Bayon. This afternoon, visit the most iconic of all Angkorian temples - Angkor Wat. (B,D)

Feb 19: SIEM REAP – ANGKOR. This morning, travel through rural countryside to the pinksandstone temple of Banteay Srei. Then visit Ta Prohm, the temple famous for its intertwinedtrees (showcased in the film Tomb Raider).(B)

**Feb 20: SIEM REAP – TONLE SAP LAKE/EMBARKATION – KAMPONG CHHNANG.** Travel to Tonle Sap Lake to embark the luxurious MS La Marguerite. Enjoy your Welcome Dinner onboard as you cruise to Kampong Chhnang. The ship moors overnight. (B,L,D)

**Feb 21: KAMPONG CHHNANG – KAMPONG CHAM.** After breakfast, enjoy a motor boat excursion into the lakeside wetlands that form the mouth of the Tonle Sap River. Enjoy a stunning variety of birdlife, and observe numerous great fish traps, some over a half-mile long. Later, the ship enters the jungle as the river narrows. Temples abound along the riverbanks and offer a unique opportunity to observe the rich tapestry of Cambodian rural life. Arrive in the capital city of Phnom Penh in the afternoon and enter the Upper Mekong bound for Kampong Cham. The ship makes an afternoon stop, in time for a walk through the quaint silk-weaving village of Chong Kho. Overnight, the ship moors mid-stream in Kampong Cham. (B,L,D)

**Feb 22: KAMPONG CHAM – PHNOM PENH.** This morning, journey upriver to the hilltop pre-Angkorian temple of Wat Hanchey. Over lunch, sail back downstream to explore the Kampong Cham area. Travel by motorcoach to the 12th-century Angkorian temple of Wat Nokor, which has been "fused" with a modern Wat. Continue by motorcoach to the Eco-village of Cheung Kok. The ship departs late in the afternoon from Kampong Cham, arriving at Phnom Penh for an overnight mid-stream mooring. (B,L,D)

**Feb 23: PHNOM PENH.** Early morning, the ship cruises into spectacular Phnom Penh and docks at the passenger port terminal. A morning tour explores the highlights of Cambodia's capital city, famous for its French colonial architecture, busy cafés, vibrant nightlife and renovated river "corniche." Visit the Royal Palace and the spectacular Silver Pagoda. The National Museum is another highlight, with outstanding displays of Khmer crafts. After lunch onboard, another excursion leads to the infamous Killing Fields and the Khmer Rouge's grim Tuol Sleng or S21 Detention Center (Genocide Museum) situated in the suburbs of the city. An overnight on the waterfront provides an opportunity to dine in one of many nearby restaurants, and experience Phnom Penh's vibrant nightlife, should passengers so choose. (B,L,D)

**Feb 24: PHNOM PENH – BORDER CROSSING – TAN CHAU, VIETNAM.** Spend the day cruising the Mekong River, stopping at the jungle village of Preak Dach to visit fruit orchards before continuing to the Cambodian/Vietnamese border. The ship moors overnight mid-stream in Tan Chau. (B,L,D)

Feb 25 : TAN CHAU - SA DEC. After breakfast, transfer via small boats to the pier, where a

trishaw awaits to transport you around Tan Chau. Visit a mat-making workshop and silk-coloring workshop. Back at the pier, embark on a local boat for a channel cruise and visit to a fish farm before returning to the ship. Overnight mid-stream on the Mekong near Sa Dec. (B,L,D)

**Feb 26: SA DEC – HO CHI MINH CITY (SAIGON).** After breakfast, board small local boats for the village of Sa Dec, where you will enjoy a morning stroll. Noteworthy as the town where the French writer (and our ship's namesake) Marguerite Duras spent some of her childhood, Sa Dec is a sprawling town on the Mekong Delta. Visit the house of Mr. Huynh Thuy Le, Duras' Chinese paramour, which is now a small museum. After lunch onboard, the ship continues cruising to Cai Be. A local Junk trip in the afternoon will take you to Cai Be's spectacular floating market; then go ashore to see the French Gothic Cathedral and visit delightful flower gardens, ancient Kiet House and local rice paper manufacturers. In the evening, cruise to Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon, while enjoying a sunset cocktail party and gourmet Farewell Dinner onboard. (B,L,D)

**Feb 27: HO CHI MINH CITY – DISEMBARK.** In the early morning, the ship docks at the Saigon River Frontage. As the capital of the French colony of Cochinchina, Saigon was known as "Paris of the Orient." Today, Vietnam's largest city is an industrial, cultural and educational hub, but still retains vestiges of its colonial past. After breakfast, disembark for a city tour that explores famous landmarks, such as the former Presidential Palace, Central Post Office and Notre Dame Cathedral; Cho Lon (China Town) and its famous Binh Tay market and Thien Hau pagoda. Overnight at a luxurious hotel in Ho Chi Minh City. (B,L)

Feb 28: DEPART HO CHI MINH CITY. Transfer to the airport for your homebound flight. (B)

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#### Editor's Note:

Our Canadian teams in the World Championships fared poorly this year. The Open Team failed to get past Mexico in the playoff for a Bermuda Bowl berth; the Women's and Senior Teams both played in Sao Paulo, but neither made the knockout stages (eight teams), as both had done in the past.

Faring rather better was Master Point Press's collection of Frank Vine's writings, "North of the Master Solvers' Club", which jointly shared honours as the International Bridge Press Association's Book of the Year with Ron Klinger's "Right through the Pack Again". It was the second win by a Canadian; Roy Hughes "Canada's Bridge Warriors: Eric Murray and Sami Kehela" won previously (in 2007).

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# CANADA'S LEADING BRIDGE COLUMNIST, PAUL THURSTON

Paul Thurston is a kind of Renaissance Man when it comes to bridge. As a bridge writer he is the daily columnist for the National Post, has won the ABTA Book of the Year for "25 Steps to Learning 2/1" and is a frequent contributor to The Kibitzer, Bridge Canada and the ACBL Bulletin; he is a terrific player, having won the 1996 CNTC and represented Canada in the 1997 Bermuda Bowl; he captained the 2004 Canadian Olympiad Team in Istanbul; he is a wonderful teacher; and he conducts bridge cruises in his spare time, when there is any.

Paul can lay claim to being Canada's foremost bridge columnist, although he is much too modest to do so. He follows in the footsteps of other great Canadian columnists such as Ted Horning (Toronto Star) and Eric Kokish (Montreal Gazette and Toronto Star). Paul was the columnist for the St. Catharines Standard from 2000-2008 and has been the Post's bridge columnist since 2000 as well.

Paul Thurston was born in Tweed. Ontario enough years ago that he can now claim to shoot his age at golf for nine holes! He was introduced to cards by his parents and despite, as he says, a full minor in cafeteria bridge, managed to graduate from Brock University with an Honours BA in English. He and Jo-Anne Chisholm were married in 1970 - he refers to her as Saint Jo-Anne. They have one son. Matthew, who works in software development in Waterloo. The Thurstons lived for 40 years in St. Catharines before moving to Wellington in idyllic Prince Edward County, where they now live a mere six-minute walk to the first tee. Paul had mainly sales and management jobs while in St. Catharines, all, he says, which were a mask for his bridge activities. He went into bridge full-time in 2000. Two keys to successful defence: Do your best to read the distributional messages your partner (and declarer's play) provides and try not to waste a turn on play (you get few enough of those as it is!).

Despite the low combined pointcount, the double fit in the majors meant South's heart game was a reasonable undertaking and indeed would have been virtually bulletproof without the 4-1 trump split.

And still made at one table of a match after West's lead of the diamond queen went to the ace and South won East's return of the three of diamonds with his king. Ace and a spade to the king set that side suit up and left South in charge after he ruffed West's diamond jack exit. Declarer continued by playing three rounds of trumps ending in dummy before starting right in on cashing good spades.

Of course, West could ruff a spade whenever he wanted to, but South could ruff a diamond return and use the club ace to access the rest of dummy's good spades and claim his contract.

Not so at the other table. After the same start, West knew that a third round of diamonds wasn't going to cash as his partner's return of the three, his original fourth-best, made it a virtual certainty that South would be out of the suit. Accordingly, West didn't waste a time on lead by playing a third diamond but instead took the opportunity to force out dummy's ace of clubs.

And with that late entry to the good spades prematurely removed, South could only congratulate his opponent for his perceptive and effective play.




# The 2009 Master Point Press IBPA Books of the Year




For the first time in its history, the International Bridge Press Association's Master Point Press Book of the Year award has joint winners. "*Right through the Pack Again*" by Ron Klinger and "*North of the Master Solvers' Club*" by Frank Vine (from Hamilton) each collected precisely the same number of votes and marks for the award. In Solomonic fashion, there was no tie-breaking procedure. Vine was a regular contributor to *The Kibitzer* and *The Bridge World* before his death in 1987 at 59.

Vine is the second local to have won the award – Roy Hughes won for "Canada's Bridge Warriors: Eric Murray and Sami Kehela" in 2007.

# NORTH OF THE MASTER SOLVERS' CLUB

Frank Vine's trenchant commentaries on the game, often thinly disguised as fiction, appeared regularly in *The Bridge World,The Kibitzer* and other magazines in the 1970s and 1980s. A collection of his work from *The Bridge World* was previously published but has long been out of print. Readers who are familiar with Vine's writings are delighted to see them once more available, this time in a much more comprehensive collection. Those who haven't discovered Frank Vine's work before are in for a treat.

Vine was the master of parody, writing articles under such titles as The Man from La Mancha, Wednesday the Rabbi Played Bridge and How I Challenged the Champs and Made Them Cry. His article Rashomon, based on the Japanese film of 1950 in which each of four witnesses gives his or her version of events, rates as many players' all-time favourite bridge article.

Vine liked to take potshots at the authorities, and in the 1970s and 80s there was no larger authority on the game than Edgar Kaplan, publisher of *The Bridge World*, Chairman of the ACBL Laws Commission and, with Norman Kay, a member of one of the world's top partnerships. Here, in an episode from *The Coldbottom Chronicles*, Vine chides Kaplan for the views of sportsmanship and ethics espoused by *The Bridge World*. 'And so we arrived at the Nationals. What a thrill to meet the storied giants of the game, whom none of us had ever seen. I made sure to point out those I recognized to Coldbottom to ensure he would be suitably apprehensive.

Our first important encounter came on the third round. Our opponents were certainly somebodies, for the table was engulfed by kibitzers. One smoked a meerschaum and the other was called Norman. It was all affability until the second board.

The bidding was unexceptional. South (meerschaum) opened a weak no trump and North (Norman) put him in seven. I led the jack of hearts. The declarer let this come to his hand, puffed three times on his pipe, and pushed out the jack of spades. Whoa, I said to myself, I've got a problem. I could play the deuce and give count. I could ignore count and play a deceptive three, or I could pop the nine and try to muddle the communications. I took out one card, put it back, pulled out another, put it back, and so on for about four minutes. Finally, I played the three. The pipesmoker studied this, studied me, and finally finessed.

The director was polite but inquisitive. Why had I hesitated? I advised him it was not hesitation, it was thought. Thinking and huddling, I explained, though very different, often appear similar to an opponent. Luckily I was able to cite chapter and verse, namely the June *Bridge World*, page 26, where an identical situation had been carefully reviewed. I quoted the author. "If we had been hesitating over which card to play (whether to falsecard, whether to give count), we would say nothing. If declarer then misguessed, misreading our problem, we would be charmed."

As I left the table, I thought it appropriate to comfort my opponents. "When you decided to finesse," I said, "I was charmed. Really charmed.""



# Play of the Hand by David Lindop THE FEAR FACTOR (cont.)

As declarer we encounter many situations where there is a danger our contract will be defeated, perhaps by several tricks. In such situations, this isn't the time to freeze. A card must still be played the same day it's dealt, so we have to do something, and we might as well hope for the best.

In this next deal, we reach four spades and West leads the two of diamonds:

We have two sure spade losers and are in danger of losing two diamonds as well. The only way to get rid of a diamond is to establish an extra heart winner in dummy. If East has the heart king, it won't help to play the ace and lead the queen from dummy. East covers with the king and we ruff, but there's no entry to dummy's jack.

Instead, we have to hope that West holds the king of hearts. We win the diamond ace, play a club to get to our hand and lead our singleton four of hearts. When West plays low, we bravely insert dummy's jack or queen. If the finesse works, we can discard a diamond loser on the ace of hearts. If East holds the heart king instead of West, we will be defeated an extra trick, losing two spades, a heart, and two diamonds. But that's the type of chance we must be willing to take.

Let's try this deal. We're in three no trump.

We have nine sure tricks - a spade, three hearts, and five clubs – but that's only after we gain the lead.

West's lead of the diamond seven looks ominous. This is no time to panic, however. If we resignedly play a low diamond from dummy, we give ourself no chance. Instead, we must bravely hop up with dummy's diamond queen. If West has led from a holding such as ace-king-nine-seven-five, we'll make an extra trick. If not, it's on to the next deal.

Speaking of being fearless, suppose we get to three no trump on this deal:

West leads the five of hearts and we count sure tricks: a spade, two hearts, a diamond, and a club. That's only five; we need four more. The only hope is to get five tricks from diamonds. That's possible if West has the king and the missing diamonds are divided 3–2. It's inconvenient to cross to our hand with either the of our aces since that establishes tricks for the defenders.

Since we have to give up a diamond anyway, the best approach is to lead a low diamond from dummy after winning the king of hearts. (This has the added advantage that East might play the king of diamonds from a holding such as king-ten or king-five, saving us from taking a losing finesse.) Suppose East wins the diamond nine and leads a heart. There goes our last outside entry to dummy! Now we have to come to our hand with the ace of clubs or spades to lead our remaining diamond. When West follows with a low diamond, we finesse dummy's queen of diamonds and keep our fingers crossed.

We hope this is the complete deal:

Bridge is a game and, if we never go down a bunch of tricks while trying to make our contract, we just aren't having enough fun.



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
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# CANADA IN BRAZIL By Joan Eaton

My team (Barb Clinton, Pamela Nisbet, Karen Cumpstone, Kismet Fung and Susan Culham) was beyond thrilled to win the Canadian Women's Team Championship this year in Penticton. For Pamela, it was her fourth consecutive win with four different teams!

The event took place in early June and only five weeks later, we were off to Mexico City to play off for the right to be one of three teams representing North America in the Venice Cup in São Paulo Brazil, August 29 -September 12. Happily, we prevailed against the Mexican ladies, and made our arrangements to get to Brazil.

There were 22 teams in the Venice Cup - the result of playoffs in each of the World Bridge Federation's eight zones - so we would be facing the best women's teams in the world. We worked with Eric Kokish and Bev Kraft (BIG thank you's) in the weeks leading up to the tournament to make sure we were as prepared as possible. These days, with Skype and Bridge Base Online it is easy for a team that is scattered from Ottawa to Victoria to practice together, or have training sessions under the supervision of our Toronto-based coaches (Eric and Bev), without travelling. Thanks also to our Non-Playing Captain, Michael Yuen, for all his hard work on our behalf!

With hope in our hearts and fatigue in our eyes, Barb, Michael and I arrive in São Paulo midday Friday after an overnight flight from Toronto (midnight departure). I don't sleep well (ok, I don't sleep at all) on planes, so leaving Thursday night made sense. Play was to begin on Sunday. Teammates did not fare so well. Several flights were diverted to Rio de Janeiro because of fog in São Paulo. Karen spent hours in Rio – in a plane on the tarmac. Kiz and Susan made it in on Saturday. I heard stories of players arriving on Sunday.

Bright-eyed now, we began well on Sunday against Barbados. Sadly, we then proceeded to dig ourselves a bit of a hole by losing to some teams that we should have beaten, and allowing France to hurt us badly.With five more days of round robin play, we could still make the cut to the round of eight, but we would need to play very well, and be a bit lucky too. We had some good matches, so we have some bragging rights (USA I, USA 2, Australia, New Zealand) where we all have friends, but as the days went by, our hopes dimmed.

You can't play in an event like the Venice Cup without getting a few ideas about how to improve your game. The experience is priceless (has Master Card patented that phrase yet?). Actually, it does have a price, and it's pretty high, so major thanks to the CBF, Unit 166, Masterpoint Press, and Unit 246. Thanks to their generosity, we had over half of our expenses covered! We are only able to afford this venture with the assistance received from these supporters.

I am told that bridge players would like some deals. We played hundreds. I have chosen two on which Barb and I had good results. (Surprised?). They were in the same match, on similar auctions, and opponents, due to their system, faced unique problems.

Many pairs play that over opponent's one no trump opener, two clubs shows both majors, two diamonds is a single major, unspecified (they call it Multi), and two hearts or two spades show that major and a minor. There are variations about how many cards in the suits are promised and strength of the hands, depending on vulnerability. Sometimes, the twodiamond bid is a problem when partner doesn't know your suit.

We had these two hands against USAI, the eventual silver medalists, and we had a solid win in this match. Session 15. Board 3. Dealer South. EW Vul.

East would have loved to have known what her partner's major was, but tried double, and led the spade jack. Plus 550 for us. At the other table, South opened one spade,West bid her hearts, and our teammates wisely went to five hearts, doubled for minus 200.Win 8 IMPS.

On the next deal, (see top of page 28), West was feeling a little frisky because of the favourable vulnerability and tried two diamonds to show a major suit. Barb and I had discussed this specifically - my two-heart bid showed hearts, to play. Of course East knew her partner's suit was hearts when she doubled, but felt she had enough to cover the other suits, and expected a juicy penalty (or at least down one). Session 15. Board 15. Dealer South. NSVul.

I ruffed a club in hand, played a diamond to the ace, ruffed another club, and exited a diamond. Eight tricks were easy, for plus 670. We won 13 IMPs.

São Paulo was a wonderful experience, and besides the thanks already mentioned, thanks to my teammates, to all our supporters, to the many people who sent good wishes, and to the people who were just hoping for the best for us.

- Here we wander into uncharted territory – 4NT would have been invitational with 5-4 either way in the minors. South thought 5NT would be similar, but forcing to slam, with 6NT in the picture.
- North thought 5NT was simply, as experts play on many auctions, pick a slam, but in this case, pick a minor. He preferred diamonds and did not realize 6NT was being offered as an alternative if he did not like the minors.
- 10.Believing partner had a 4+0 diamond suit.

They would be the first to admit that six no trump by Daniel's hand (North) is where they wanted to be, but if everything were perfect, there would be no story. Fifty years ago the auction would have gone 3NT-6NT to the top spot – has bidding improved? They ended in six diamonds by South, which exposed the heart suit to attack.

Sure enough, I underled the ace of hearts – which was the only lead to give us a chance. I knew Daniel's hand was strong and balanced. In maybe two seconds, Darren called for the heart king from dummy (!) and quickly scooped up all 13 tricks. A truly great play.

Why did he guess correctly at trick one? Darren modestly said he was just "sure" it was right. Perhaps my tempo on opening lead varied slightly from other hands – which may have guided his decision; it was surely a tablepresence decision. So for all you kids reading this – PLAY IN TEMPO – ALWAYS.

As declarer, (a.) you have to always seek out any and all clues, and (b.) when you feel sure you are right – back up your intuition with a bold play and don't be afraid to look bad if you are wrong.

# OUT OF THE CLOSET By Dave Colbert

The Sudbury Regional in August was, as usual, a good tournament to attend: free refreshments - homemade desserts, coffee and juices - and a friendly atmosphere.

Daniel Korbel, Jonathan Steinberg, Mike Cafferata and I were playing the leaders in the third round of the Swiss Teams when a deal came up that had more excitement than I can recall

Mike, as North, had:

and saw, all vulnerable, the following bidding:

That's right, five diamonds from me, vulnerable. He knows I don't fool around with these bids so I probably had the other nine (nine!) diamonds. After five hearts, Mike passed, hoping the auction would end there. No, it went six clubs fairly quickly from the guy with the toothpick in his mouth on his left, a slow six diamonds from the nice lady on his right, then a slow six hearts from lefty and double from me! So now Mike knew that I had a void, which his hand indicated was in spades. It went all pass.

Mike dutifully led a spade, I ruffed and they had the rest. We were minus 1660. Mike said after the match that he should have come out of the closet and sacrificed in seven diamonds after my double, as he then should have known that they would run the spades and make six hearts, especially since my original bid indicated very little in the way of defence.

At the other table it was very different (isn't it always?). Look at it from Daniel Korbel's viewpoint. He held:

The opponents let them have a free rein until Daniel had seen enough to leap to the grand slam. NOW lefty did come out of the closet, bidding seven diamonds! When South's double came back to Daniel, he had a problem. He knew seven hearts was going down if righty knew what to lead and he knew seven spades might make if partner had good spades. But the five-spade cuebid wasn't much to go on.

Daniel finally decided his best chance was to gut it out in seven hearts and hope that the opening leader would get it wrong. The opening leader had Mike's hand, North. He had just seen the opponents go from seven clubs to seven hearts and his partner doubled that. He decided to lead...a club. Jonathan and Daniel scored plus 2470 and we won 13 IMPs and the match. A spade lead and we'd have lost 18 IMPs. And yes, seven spades was cold. Wow.

The opening queen of diamonds is ducked, and is followed by the jack. Suppose you, as partner did, decide to play on hearts rather than clubs. No quibbling. (Oh? It is not so clear as that.Those club spots are enticing. – Ed.) So you win in hand and advance the heart jack, covered and won by the ace.

What now? Persisting, you reenter hand with the spade king, then lose the finesse of the heart nine. Diamond back? Well, no. That's good news. A club to the king, instead. Now a club return, RHO hesitating, then playing small, leaving the ace and nine outstanding with you to play. These cards remain:



Notice that if the hearts split you have all of the remaining tricks (the heart eight has not appeared, of course, and you have a tenace against the eight.) You should assume that the opponents know this. There was once a comment by Terence Reese in contemplating an opponent's discard that set up a possible squeeze against partner: "That player was neither careless nor brilliant enough to do that."

I think such thinking applies here. We can rely on hearts not splitting. Since LHO demonstrably has five diamonds, there appears to be no need to risk overtaking the club. Play the king of diamonds. RHO must retain the club ace and his two hearts, thus is stripped of his possible (but unlikely, given the club switch) long spade or, failing that, his fourth club, the nine. On the diamond king, the nine of clubs appears from East and then the ace and queen of spades see him follow to both. He must have two hearts and the club ace remaining. So, then a club.

This was the full deal:

Back to Reese. Who would have ducked the club when the hearts were coming down? Hands up! Don't shoot!



Not every bridge teacher has authored a bestseller, written a newspaper column, or become wellknown enough to receive an entry in the Encyclopedia of Bridge.

Nevertheless, there are many teachers who continue to inspire their students day in and day out, promoting the game in their community and answering questions clearly, concisely and without judgment, whether it's about Roman Keycard Blackwood or simply,"What's a finesse?".Their work too often goes unrecognized, yet it is vital to the future of the game.

"At last there is an award for those in the trenches."

To nominate someone, students are encouraged to e-mail one or two paragraphs to Seagram (bseagram@ca.inter.net) explaining why their teacher deserves consideration. Nominees must have at least five years' teaching experience, and teach at least 75 hours a year. Nominations will close on April I, 2010.

The award will be given to a teacher who exemplifies what Seagram calls "love for the game."

"They may not have a famous name, but... their communication skills and enthusiasm promote bridge's future, adding to your enjoyment," Seagram said.

Master Point Press co-founder Ray Lee is "delighted" to be working with the ABTA to create the Teacher of the Year award.

"It is the bridge teachers who bring new people into the game, and we want to recognize their hard work and dedication," he said.

The first winner will be presented with a "Teacher of The Year" plaque and a cash award next July in New Orleans, at the ABTA's 2010 convention.

The ABTA is a professional organization of bridge teachers from Canada, Mexico and the USA. Its mandate is to help those who teach bridge to do it better.
