### Thinking Bridge

**Opening lead:**  $\Diamond A$  (ace from A-K at trick one versus suit contracts)

**Bidding commentary:** West's overcall is normal, North's double is negative, showing at least four hearts and 7 or more high-card points. It is an unlimited response but partner assumes 7-8 HCP for the time being.

**Defensive commentary:** East encourages in diamonds and West continues with a high diamond, which South ruffs.

Play commentary: As South, you have lost a diamond and are looking at a likely spade loser, as well as a possible heart loser. Is there a safe way to bring this home? Yes, assuming West has at least five spades for the vulnerable overcall, you have a 100% play available.

Draw trumps, play the ♠A and ♠K, leaving East with no spades. Now play the ♡K and a second heart, covering whatever heart West plays. Because of the power of the ♡8, East will be endplayed upon winning the trick. Say West plays low. You stick in the 8, East wins but cannot return a heart into the A-J without giving you a trick. If East exits with a diamond, you can discard your losing spade and ruff in dummy.

Say West plays the  $\heartsuit 9$  or  $\heartsuit 10$  on the second lead of the suit. You cover with the jack, East wins the queen, but again the power of the  $\heartsuit 8$  prevents East from safely returning a heart from his remaining 10-x or 9-x into the A-8. This line of play is foolproof so long as West has at least five spades.



# Could This be Magic?

After receiving positive feedback for my last article. I decided to carry on with some hands in the same vein. The following hand was played with my wife against a well-known local "pro" and his client. I have played against this gentleman for years, and he has gotten the better of me many times; here I got a little of my own back.

I won the spade lead in dummy and led

a heart to my queen, winning the trick. I now needed to establish a club trick to assure my contract, so I led a club to dummy's jack, which won. I now cashed my spade winners, on which client pitched his clubs. Now it was safe to try for an overtrick by playing the ace and a heart. When pro pitched the ♣8, I was now prepared to accept making 3NT. However when client cashed the last heart and I pitched a club, pro envisioned my holding A | x in diamonds, and threw the &K.I won the forced diamond return in hand, and led my last club. As pro won the ace, I carefully threw away dummy's ♣7, and scored the last two tricks with dummy's ♦K and ♣2, making ten tricks for a top.

Sometimes magic comes in the bidding. I picked up the following hand, playing against weaker opponents:

#### Both Vul.

♠ Q J 9 8 4 ♡ J 10 4 3 ◇ K J 5 ♣ 3 After two passes, I bid I♠, primarily as a lead director. Next hand doubled, and Gail redoubled. RHO bid 2♥. Since I was going to bid 2♥ myself, I doubled, and everybody passed. I led the spade queen, and dummy proudly laid down a 20-count!

**♠** K 2 ♥ A Q 8 ♦ Q 9 5 3 **♣** A K Q 10

The queen was covered by the king and ace. The ten was returned and I overtook this to return the nine. Dummy ruffed with the  $\heartsuit 8$ , over-ruffed with the  $\heartsuit 9$ . Gail returned a diamond and I won the king. I led another spade, ruffed by dummy's queen and over-ruffed by the king. Gail now returned a heart! Declarer had bid  $2\heartsuit$  on a three-card suit, probably hoping not to get doubled! Dummy's ace won, and declarer tried to cash some clubs. I ruffed the second round, drew trumps, cashed the last spade, and returned the  $\lozenge J$  so Gail could win the last two tricks. +1700.

Not all my stories work out quite as well. Sometimes the jack is referred to as the knave, and it can work its own magic all by itself. Witness these two hands from Bridge Week in Calgary.

From the Senior Team semi-final: I held



I had hoped Steve would bid 5\(\Delta\) so I could use the grand slam force (5NT) to find out whether he had both the ace and king of spades. He thought he had bid enough. A diamond was led, and dummy appeared:

This looked like a claimer if the spade king is onside: pitch my losing club on the diamond ace, and squeeze LHO in spades and clubs. WRONG! What I have to do is not take a pitch right away but trump the diamond. Now I draw trumps, and take the spade finesse. Another diamond is ruffed, making East the only defender who can guard that suit. The end-position:



Now when I play my remaining trump, West pitches his low spade—safe for the time being. Now a spade to the ace squeezes East who must hold onto two diamonds. The diamond ace now completes the squeeze on West, who must hold a spade. Now the clubs run, with the deuce taking the last trick Going down in the grand cost 17 IMPs. We lost the match by three! I was mesmerised by the club jack!

In the COPC, Steve and I were having a decent game going into the last round, when this hand came up:

 The opening bid of INT by South was passed out; Steve led a heart. I won the ace and continued the suit. Declarer ducked, and won the third round, with me discarding an encouraging club. Declarer now led a diamond to the king and a diamond to her ace, Steve following with the queen. Opener is now marked with the AK of spades, so it looks as though I must hold onto my four spades. Steve, on the other side of the table worked out the same thing, and decided he must hold onto his Q x x of spades, so he discarded his heart winners and the club ace so he wouldn't get end-played. Dummy's J of spades looked around slyly and giggled, as declarer made ten tricks. If we win the five tricks we should, we win the silver medal and share \$750 in prize money. If we take four tricks, we share the silver and half the prize money. We got a bronze medal, and a hearty hand-shake for our efforts.

### So Long, JC

John Carruthers edited *The Kibitzer* magazine for just over eleven years. 'JC' is also well known in Canada for the amount of time and energy he puts into developing up-and-coming junior players. As a way of saying thanks, a small token at that, it's time to put the spotlight on JC and celebrate some of his achievements in bridge.

There was his 1990 COPC win with Katie Thorpe, his wife and top Canadian player, to qualify for the World Open Pairs in Geneva. In those days each country had a quota of pairs. They were dead average after three of the four final sessions and in the final session doubled the opponents for penalties ten times (mostly in partscores). JC and Katie beat them at least two tricks, scoring +300 or better nine times and went -560 in one notrump redoubled the tenth time. So, starting from the middle of the pack, they won by more than two full boards.

JC won the 1999 CNTCs with Drew Cannell, Nader Hanna, Robert Lebi and honorary captain, Ted Horning. They beat Molson, Baran, Graves, Kokish and Mittelman in the final (plus Joey Silver,

Fred Gitelman and other very good players in earlier KO matches.

Another victory came in the 1991 Master Mixed Teams with Katie and 'the children' (as JC and Katie called them then): Brad Moss, Bronia Gmach (still Juniors at the time) and Jared Lilienstein. Katie and JC did not play together; throughout the event, each of them partnered one of the kids.

But JC is not just a player—he loves to share his winning ways. In 2007 he coached Pakistan's Bermuda Bowl team. "I went to Karachi twice and was treated like a king. It was a fantastic experience," JC says. JC has some helpful advice for any player, no matter the caliber, if sitting on the lead of a pairs or Swiss event at the dinner break: "Eat as early as possible and sparingly (salad, soup, fish—no meat); do not imbibe alcohol or any other mind-altering substances; try to relax (rest, watch TV, read). When you play, focus on the board you are playing in the match underway—try not to think of the end result."

Let's let JC describe his first Regional win with Bruce Ferguson in 1972—the Detroit Open Pairs: "As Bruce and others gathered around the scoring table



(scoring was done by hand in those days - no computers), someone asked, 'Who won?' Barry Crane (producer of TV's Mannix, Mission: Impossible, Dallas, Wonder Woman, and Hawaii Five-O, among others, and originally from Detroit) answered, 'Carruthers and somebody.' Bruce was incensed—even then he'd started to build a name for himself (or so he thought) and he was really annoyed that Barry had apparently not heard of him."

I asked JC for a deal—a favourite perhaps—that he played or defended well. He provided this one from a couple years ago but calls it his 'unfavourite.'

"We were playing in the Yeh Bros. Cup quarterfinals in 2009. The field was the best I'd ever played in - World Champion teams from Italy, USA, Norway, Poland, England, Netherlands and Sweden (the latter two to come). We had beaten Italy earlier and our quarterfinal match was a 3-way between us (Howard Weinstein/JC and Lew/Joanna Stansby), Norway (Boye Brogeland/Espen Lindqvist and Geir Brekke/Erik Sælensminde) and England (Paul Hackett/John Armstrong and David Gold/Tom Townsend). Only one team went through.

On opening lead, Brekke took a full five minutes before emerging with the three of diamonds (3rd from an even number/lowest from odd). How would you play? I played low from dummy and won East's queen with the king. (It seemed to me that East considered not playing the

queen, a play he could only consider with length in the suit, i.e., five of them). I'd escaped a club lead and all I had to do was bring in the hearts or, if as I thought, West's diamond was a singleton, take the top two hearts (if they were 3-I or 2-2) and play off the ace of diamonds. But why did West take so long to lead his singleton?

I led the jack of hearts and, of course, it went low. I wanted so much to run that jack but if East won and gave his partner a diamond ruff, I'd never forgive myself. So I went up with the ace and the reason for West's taking so long on lead became apparent when East discarded an encouraging club. I played the two top hearts and the ten to West's queen. He shifted to a club, knocking out my ace and I could no longer make the contract. I tried the queen of spades and after another two minutes Brekke ducked it and, since he indeed had a singleton diamond, I had no re-entry to my hand for the diamonds (had he covered, the spade jack would have been an entry). Minus 100.

At the other table, extraordinarily, they had exactly the same auction. Joanna found (in my opinion a better) spade lead and Boye ducked it, winning the queen. He also led the jack of hearts to the ace and continued with a third heart to the queen. Lew had encouraged in clubs so Joanna shifted to a club, forcing out the ace. Boye crossed to the ace of spades to draw the last trump and with no entry to hand, played the ace of diamonds and another to the jack for a club discard. Minus 1430 for the Stansbys and 17 IMPs

away. We beat England but lost by 10 to Norway, who'd lost to England. Norway went through on IMP quotient.

Notice that when she won the queen of hearts, if Joanna had ignored Lew's signal and exited with her fourth heart or the king of spades, Boye would have needed three diamond tricks from A6 opposite KJ1092. With an entry to hand intact (the ace of clubs) he might well have played the ace and king of diamonds, gaining when they were 3-3 or the queen dropped in two rounds). In practice, with the ace of clubs gone, declarer's best play was the diamond finesse. But, not shifting to a club would have looked silly if Lew had the ace of clubs-Lew had not to encourage in clubs to have a chance. West had: ♠K9842 ♥Q753 ♦3 ♣Q83;

West had: ♠K9842 ♥Q753 ♦3 ♣Q83; that left East with: ♠765 ♥— ♦Q8754 ♣K]1062

The board swung 34 IMPs. Either team could have won 17 or we could have pushed the board had I run the jack of hearts (or, yes, yes, risen with the ace of diamonds)."

Player, coach, editor, mentor, international man of mystery: JC is continuing to ply his editing talents as the bulletin editor at the International Bridge Press Association. ### Defense Wins BAMs

#### What is BAM?

BAM is short for 'Board-a-Match.' Translation: each board is a match. Each match (or board) is worth one point. In BAM scoring, you play as a team versus other teams, similar to Swiss Teams or Knockouts. BAM scoring is the same as match play scoring in Ryder Cup golf.

Say you and your partner bid and make 2 Hearts: you score +110. If the pair at the other table holding your cards beats a contract of 2 Spades one trick for a score of +100 then you win the board because your score is higher: Your team gets one point. If you tie (aka push) the board, each team scores one half point. If the other team outscores you on the board, you get zero points.

Nader Hanna and his partner Joan Eaton won a board by bidding to 6 Spades. Although they made 7, they feared losing the board because the Grand Slam was there to be bid. However, they ended up winning the board because the pair at the other table only bid to 4 Spades. Such are the intricacies of Board-a-Match.

I was North and led a spade versus West's contract of INT. Joan played three rounds of spades. Declarer won, discarding a diamond from dummy. Declarer now played a club to the king, then the club jack which I again ducked. She then ran the diamond ten to my king. I now cashed my 2 spades and declarer was squeezed. She had to keep 2 clubs so she elected to discard her heart ace. I returned a heart and declarer, attempting to make her contract, played the Jack. Joan won the Queen and put declarer

back in hand with a diamond to concede 2 clubs to my ace-eight for down 2,+200 and a win (partners were -100). Notice that if I win the first or second club declarer can safely discard one club and one diamond on my spades.



Against East's contract of 2 Hearts, Joan led the king of diamonds. Declarer won the diamond ace, finessed in spades, and travelled to hand with the ace of clubs to repeat the spade finesse. Joan played the king (the card she was known to hold) the second time. Declarer now had to guess in which order to take his pitches. With only six clubs and seven spades and Joan's play of the king, declarer naturally tried a third round of clubs first which Joan ruffed. She then drew two rounds of trumps with the ace and king of hearts and cashed two diamonds to hold declarer to 8 tricks for a win (partners were +140 at the other table but possibly in Spades).

### Tales of the Jack of Hearts

Board-a-Match is sometimes referred to as 'Ultra-Matchpoints,' but I'd like to point out a few peculiarities. At matchpoints you are trying to beat the field. Above average scores are good and tops are wonderful. At

BAM you only need to do better than one other pair – so it doesn't matter if you get I out of I2 on a hand if your opponents manage to get a zero.

As for the scoring, well that is my absolute favourite part. You read out your score and your teammates announce 'win,' 'push,' or 'lose.' That's all there is to it – no recriminations – no what happened on that hand? – just win, push, or lose.

After being asked to write up a few hands I really couldn't find any good ones – so I'll tell you about our first two boards at night and then I'll talk about the Jack of Hearts.

In the last final session we started off against the leaders. Karen and I managed to lose our 5-3 Spade fit in a competitive auction and sold out to 3Clubs for +100 into our own +140...not good. However

we did beat one other pair - the one that mattered.

At the other table our

opponents paid the price for finding their fit and got all the way to 4♠ down I... so 'win' for us.

The next hand was a normal 3♠ making for us +140 but it's

also a lucky 3NT our way. Not to worry as our opponents with our cards had a misunderstanding and played in the wrong partscore so we won another board.

The Tales of the Jack of Hearts, with apologies to Robert Darvas, author of 'Right Through the Pack'...a great book:

The opening lead was a low club won in hand as North pitched the  $\heartsuit 7$  (discouraging). I led a spade towards the dummy. If South had the Q9 or J9 I could take a lot of tricks but it wasn't to be. Note I had 8 top tricks. However after the AK of  $\clubsuit$  I led a low heart to the ten. Wrong!

Back to 7 tricks but I did manage to strip South of diamonds and eventually endplay him to get an extra club trick. At the other table the expert declarer was also in 2N and also finessed the  $\heartsuit$ 10! However the defense prevailed...+ 120 was a 'Win' for us.

The ♣A was led and I dropped the 8. South shifted to the ♠9 ."Ahaa," I said to myself, "I've seen this before" (See Board I5 above).

I won the  $\triangle A$  and led the  $\heartsuit$ I0 (holding breath) It won! Low heart to the 9... ruffed a club with the  $\heartsuit A$  and back in diamonds to draw trumps...making 5. +450.

We won the board and I am feeling smug, however the board was not won at our table...rather it was lost at the other table. After 3♣ was doubled my hand cuebid 4♣ and somewhat surprisingly the opponents ended up in 4♠, down 2.

Note that on both hands hearts were 3-3 but I'm glad I got back to 50% on finesses. I know the rule '8 ever 9 never.' What's the rule for 7?
